## GTE Begins Charging New Rates For Telephones

General Telephone Company of the Southwest began charging new rates for installing, changing or adding telephones effective October 12. The change is the result of a mandated Federal Communications Commission accounting change for all telephone companies, and has been approved by the Public Utility Commission of Texas.

The FCC order requires costs incurred for installing or changing telephone service to be collected from customers receiving the service as the services are rendered.

In addition to the changes in rates, residential customers now have the option of providing their own house wiring (wiring from the protector or fuse box on the house to the telephones) and save the associated fees charged by the telephone company. In addition, a \$5 wiring maintenance charge will be assessed whenever the company sends service personnel to do repair work on the wiring.

"Previously, costs for installing, changing, adding telephones or to do wiring work were partially paid by all customers, not just the customer receiving the service," said Oscar C. Gomez, rates and tariffs manager for General Telephone in San Angelo. This charge is the first of four annual steps which will result in full revenue recovery from the customers receiving the service.

The new fees are structured similar to

customer, depending upon the functions required to make the installation, change or addition to service.

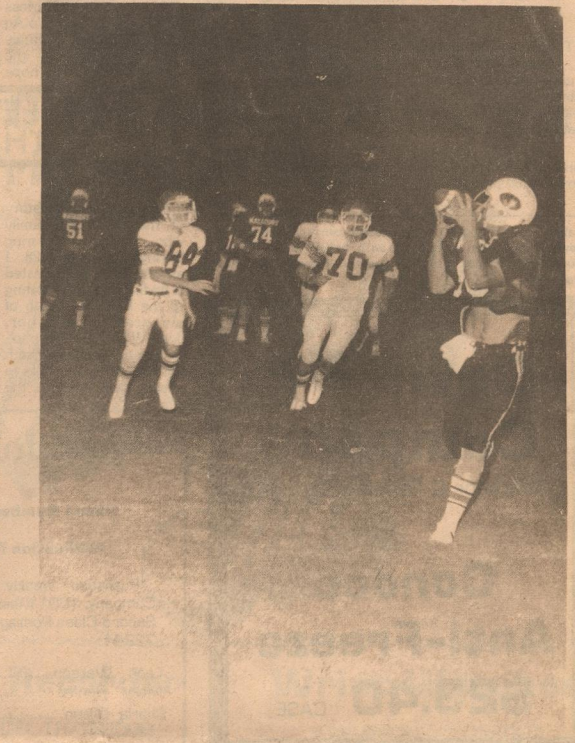

## Matadors Down Owls For First District Win

Quarterback Shawn Bearden threw one touchdown pass and ran for two others as the Motley County Matadors downed the Silverton Owls 28-0 in a District 2A North contest Friday.

Tailback Tim Shannon got the first points in the contest on a 12 yard run with 4:53 left in the first quarter. Glen Calvert kicked the extra point.

Bearden passed to Wesley Stafford to score with 8:57 left in the first half for another TD.

Shannon had 109 yards on 24 carries and Bearden had 69 yards on 15 carries. Harvey Lee, nursing a broken hand, carried the ball only twice for 12 yards.

Darrell Moore carried five times for 29 yards and Clayton Sims carried four times for 46 points.

Bearden completed three of seven passes for 37 yards. Stafford caught one pass for 22 yards and a touchdown. Sims caught one for 12 yards and Scott Read completed a pass for a two point conversion.

Jerry Long punted twice

in the game for 64 yards, an average of 32.

On defense Lee was credited with 11 tackles. Moore got 10, Long got 10 and Stafford got 10. Roy Thompson made nine defensive tackles. Calvert made eight and Brent Campbell and Rob Francis both made seven. Other defensive standouts were Kyle Hardin, Todd Washington and Alex Guerrero.

Bearden and Shannon each intercepted a

Silverton pass and Lee recovered an Owl fumble.

The Matadors had 265 yards rushing and 37 passing for a total of 302. The Owls had 46 yards rushing and 27 passing.

The Matadors will face district 2A North powerhouse Nazareth Friday, there, at 7:30 p.m. Nazareth is 5-1 for the season after knocking off Lazbuddie 21-7 last week.

The Matadors remain unbeaten with a 6-0 record.

# Social Security News

**By Ray Purcell**  
 Within the past couple of days, considerable information has appeared in the various news media concerning erroneous social security payments

to dead persons. We have received some additional information I would like to share with you.  
 The Social Security Administration and the Office of the Inspector

General of the Department of Health and Human Services are jointly investigating cases where social security benefits are being paid to individuals even though medicare

records show them to be dead.

So far this cross check of records has revealed about 8,500 discrepancies out of a total of 20 million checked. Although this is definitely a substantial number, percentage-wise it amounts to less than 1%. The actual figure is .04%. In some cases, uncashed checks payable to a dead person have been discovered and returned. In other instances relatives and representative payees have fraudulently endorsed these checks.

All cases known to involve fraud are being referred to the Justice Department.

There is also an aggressive effort underway to collect overpayments caused by this problem. The amount of money involved could be as much as \$60 million in erroneous payments.

In the State of Texas, 381 cases have been discovered. The number varies from state to state. Wyoming and Alaska have the fewest number of these cases with four and five respectively. On the other hand, New York has the greatest number with 1647 and California is second with 1130.

One final reminder to the reader. Please report the death of anyone in your family who received social security as soon as possible. You may do so by calling our toll-free number, 1-800-392-1603. With your assistance and the cross-check already mentioned, we will soon solve this problem.

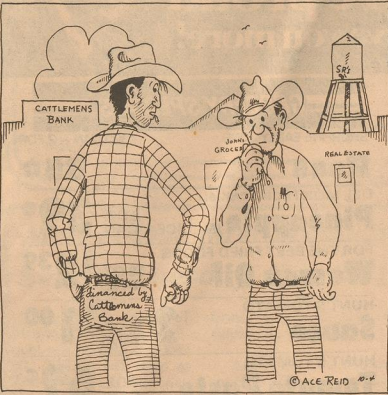
