Lee Guthrie acted as secretary and treasurer of the organization. Land was leased for \$100.00 per year and each member paid the staggering dues of \$10.00 a year for the privilege of playing. Sand was hauled in for the greens and rolled down with used oil from the local filling stations. A local man, "Chic Sale," used a horse and mower to keep

the native grass smooth. One of the first solfers remembered that it took him three days to get over the 9-hole course.

Early caddies were Alfred Barton Jr., R. L. Brandon, Johnny McAnally, Forrest Faulkner and Joe Campbell. Alfred began carrying golf bags when he was about nine years old and evidently picked up a good many pointers. He and R. L. were later members of the association and were good at the game. Alfred is the only member of the present association who has a zero handicap. The first caddies charged 15 cents for nine holes and 25 cents for an 18 hole round. Shortly after 1927 the men joined the members of the Caprock Golf Association which was made up of golfers from Floydada, Paducah, Spur and later Crosbyton, Lockney and Post. They played every Sunday afternoon in one of these towns. The local association frequently entertained wives and children with cookouts, picnics and weierer roasts.

weiner roasts.

So enthusiastic were those early golfers that they played rain or shine. They didn't wear golf shoes. As one early member said, "We couldn't have afforded them if they had been available." One Sunday afternoon a foursome composed of Erwin Rice, Bill Pipkin, R. E. (Don) Donovan and Elmer Steams put on their new knickers and their old shoes and set off for a round of golf. It had rained the night before and the clay soil was slick. When Don took a big wide swing at his ball, his feet went out from under him, and he sat down in the mud! He had an appreciative audience and it took him a long time to live that one down. to live that one down.

Golfers still remember Harry Campbell's experience with a wooden clubthe type used by most at that time. He made a drive, to see not only his ball but the club head and part of the handle go bounding off down the fairway. Harry was left with the rest of the shaft in his hand and a bewildered look on his face. *****

When the course was first laid out no cups were set, and the boys weren't quite sure of their golf terminology. Editor Grover C. Mitchell teed up for No. 2 green, a three par. With the first shot he got on the green, 175 yards away. Now we would call it a "greenie," but then he was credited with the first "hole in one" on the new golf course.

The present association is made up of 45 or more men from Motley County, who meet once a year, elect officers and committees and play at the Air Port Country Club as they wish, which is usually often. The county has some avid golfers. So avid, in fact, that this story might not be appreciated. As the hearse passed by the golf course, a golfer put down his club, took off his hat and put it over his heart. A companion commented on his respect for the dead. "It was the least I could do," he said, "we were married 30 years."
