## Matadors Win District

### MCHS Blanks Smyer 21-0

The Motley County Matadors captured their first district title since 1973 Friday when they defeated District 2-1A South Zone Champion Smyer 21-0.

The win moves the Matadors into the Bi-District game with Claude Friday at Memphis. The Matadors had won a few zone titles since 1973, but have not advanced this far in eight years.

Fumbles and penalties in the first half put a dent in much of the MCHS offense but a powerful defense held Smyer scoreless for four quarters.

Smyer received the opening kickoff and drove to the MC 13 yard line.

From there they tried a field goal which failed.

MC took over then on the 20 and on the first play from scrimmage they fumbled and lost the ball on the 19. Four plays later the Bobcats tried another field goal which failed.

MC again got the ball on their 20 and Tim Shannon carried for 23 yards to the 43. Two plays later Harvey Lee ran 57 yards for a TD.

Glen Calvert's extra point made the score 7-0 with 3:45 left in the first quarter. Early in the second quarter Lee ran 44 yards for a second TD, but a holding penalty brought the ball back. The score stood at 7-0 at halftime.

MC received the

opening kickoff of the second half and fumbled on their second play. Smyer could not move and punted. After that both sides punted once each, then with 7:08 left in the third quarter Shannon took a handoff from quarterback Shawn Bearden and broke loose for a 65 yard touchdown. The PAT try failed and MC led 13-0.

On the Matador's next possession Shannon ran 36 yards for another apparent TD, but another penalty nullified the score.

But after holding the Bobcats again and forcing them to punt MC drove 90 yards in 12 plays to score when Bearden hit tight end

Wesley Stafford with a 29 yard TD pass in the end zone. Bearden passed to Darrell Moore for a two point conversion and with 7:47 left in the game MC led 21-0.

"We were real pleased with the game with Smyer and with the district championship," Coach Gene Griffin said. "The boys have worked extremely hard and deserve the district title."

Griffin said the team didn't play as well as they are capable of playing. "We have to play much better if we want to keep playing."

Lee picked up 103 yards on nine carries, for an average of 11.4 yards per carry. Shannon gained 107 yards on 16 carries and Moore had 34 on five carries. Coke Barton carried once for five yards and Clayton Sims carried twice for eight yards.

Bearden completed two of five passes for 33 yards and one TD. Catching the passes were Stafford (for the touchdown) and Moore.

Jerry Long punted five times for 200 yards, averaging 40 yards per punt. Two of his punts were for 50 yards which helped keep the Bobcats in the hole.

The MC defense held Smyer to 54 yards rushing and 57 passing, while the Matadors rolled up 246 yards rushing and 33 passing for a total of 279.

Darrell Moore made 15 tackles to lead the MCHS defense. Lee had 12 tackles and Wesley Stafford had 11. Jerry Long, Kyle Hardin and Todd Washington each had seven. Shannon and Rob Francis each made five tackles, and Roy Thompson and Brent Campbell each had four. Also playing good defense were Calvert, (who also recovered a fumble), Bearden and Clayton Sims.

Stafford, Moore, Shannon, Hardin and Washington each made tackles for minus yardage.

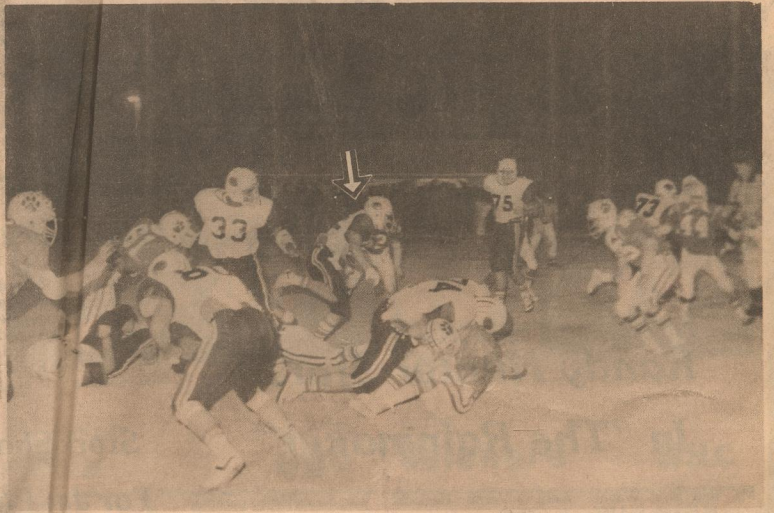
The win pushes the victory column to 11-0 for the Matadors. MC will face Claude for the Bi-District Championship Friday at Memphis, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

## MCHS Faces Claude For Bi-District Title

The Claude Mustangs are not only looking for the Bi-District title Friday in Memphis, they will also be seeking a bit of revenge for the 20-15 defeat the Matadors handed them during the regular season.

The Mustangs won the District 1-1A championship with no losses in district, finishing the season 8-2. Claude's only losses were to Valley 21-8 and to Motley County.

The Mustangs clinched their district by a 15-12 win over Follett, and head coach Burns says his team has "True Grit".

"Against a team like Follett, you usually don't spot them 12 points and then beat them, but our kids found it down deep and came back in the second half. It was a great team victory."

Burns said they talked about relaxing, and taking it to Follett the second half and they did. Follett was undefeated. Claude also beat Booker (20-16) which they weren't supposed to do.

When MCHS first met the Mustangs this year it was a barn burner. Claude hopped on top 7-0 and MC came back in the first quarter to lead 8-7. MC scored again before halftime to lead 15-7.

In the third quarter Claude tied the game at 15-15, but again MC answered with a TD, but the extra point failed and MC led 21-15.

With 36 seconds left in that game Claude moved from the MC 48 to the one yard line on a long pass. They had first-and-goal. MC rose to the occasion and held Claude out of the

end zone. Time ran out for Claude, and they haven't forgotten it.

The Matadors realize now that each team they face from now on is a championship team, and one mistake could end the 1981 football season.

This is Claude's first district championship

since 1952, and they are "higher than a kite for the Motley County contest."

## Human Resources Provide Needs For Many Persons

A look at the needs of the elderly and disabled was the subject explored by the Keen-Agers Thursday, November 12 at a luncheon meeting at the First Baptist Church. Guest speaker was Norma Whiteley of Floydada, Social Worker with the Texas Department of Human Resources.

Miss Whiteley explained the many ways her department offers community care for the aged, blind and disabled. Eligibility for aid from TDHR, she said, depends on age, income and the need assessment. A need for any of the services offered may be filed with Bobby Brown at the Community Action Center, who will then contact the Floydada agency.

"Foster homes for the elderly, and transportation for medical needs are

among aids most needed. However, "meals on wheels" serves a very vital service," Miss Whatley pointed out. In order to provide meals for shut-ins in Matador, there must be a community organization for this purpose.

"We do save the taxpayer money," she said. "The DHR medical programs help pay costs for physician services, medicine, nursing, hospitals and special items such as eyeglasses, hearing aids and family planning for anyone who qualifies."

Most local residents are aware of the home services which include a visiting nurse who is available in the county. She is Mrs. James (Michelle) Bearden.

The general services are aimed primarily in helping clients to remain in their own homes as long as possible, through outside

volunteer help.

Rev. Gary Hillyard, pastor of the First Baptist Church declared, "We need help from younger adults to aid in a program in helping the needy elderly of our community. Our Keen-Agers organization isn't just for the senior citizens group. Younger people need to get involved to the point of assisting with the program. We invite people of all ages to join us and help us put into action, a good, working program to meet these certain needs in the community."

Sometimes, just sitting and visiting in the late evening with an older person who lives alone fills that person's needs, it was pointed out by Mrs. Billie Self. "Loneliness is certainly a need," she said.

The Keen-Agers will meet in December, on Friday the 4th.

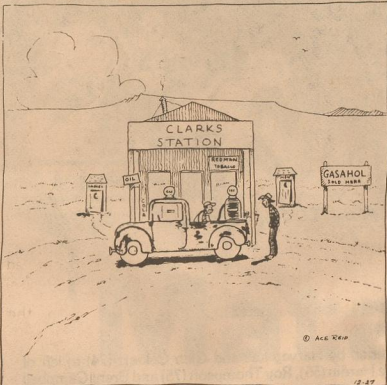

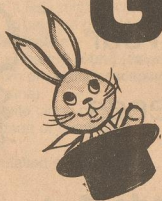
