Bill Luckett, one of the Matadors' unsung heroes all year, made first team all-district center on

offense. Rob Francis was picked first team guard and John Russell was Honorable Mention guard.

Tim Shannon was picked as first team running back, and was the only junior in the district to do so, while Harvey Lee was chosen as second team running back.

Shawn Bearden was named all-district first team quarterback, and Glen Calvert was picked as first team kicker.

Council Names Committee For Community Planning

During October the City Council formed a committee of five persons to prepare a community plan for Matador. Alan Bingham, Mrs. L. B. Campbell, Mrs. Roy Hobbs, Mrs. Bill Jones and Gerald Pipkin were appointed to the committee.

They are responsible for evaluating existing conditions and services in Matador and recommending ways for resolving critical needs or problems in Matador. In short, the committee will develop a method for planning for the future of Matador.

In preparing the community plan the committee will compile a profile of present services,

facilities and conditions in Matador. By reviewing the profile, examining financial information and resources, and, most importantly, analyzing results of a community survey, the committee will have statistical data proving that needed improvements are necessary.

The mentioned survey will consist of a three page questionnaire. Each family in Matador will be asked to evaluate services and to answer questions on housing, health care, and the economy of Matador. Also, the form will have plenty of space for written comments. Distribution of the questionnaires will take place on **Wednesday**

evening, December 9 starting at 5 p.m. Completed questionnaires will be picked up later on the same evening.

After the responses are counted, committee members will meet in early January to begin determining the improvement needs. This meeting will be open to the public. Date, time and place will be announced.

With the overall goal of improving the chances of Matador having as bright a future as possible, the questionnaires should be completed by each family this coming Wednesday. Should there be questions about the survey, contact one of the committee members.

WTU Files For Increase

West Texas Utilities Company has filed for a general increase in its retail rates, citing inflation, high interest rates and an essential major construction program as the reasons for the action.

Fred Welling, local manager in Matador, said the application is a system-wide request for higher rates. Simultaneous filings were made in incorporated towns which have retained original jurisdiction over electric rates and with the Public Utility Commission of Texas for customers in unincorporated areas and in towns which have ceded jurisdiction to the PUC.

Matador is one of eight municipalities in WTU's service area which chose last year to yield jurisdiction and ask the PUC to analyze their rate cases. The city may, however, take part in any hearings involved in the case.

WTU filed October 15 with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for a rate increase to wholesale cooperative and municipal customers.

The proposed rates would produce an increase in total revenue of \$32,256,983. This amounts to 15.4 per cent based on adjusted revenues of \$209,402,398 for a 12-month test period ending September 30, 1981.

WTU requested that the new rates become effective January 1, 1982. Welling said that a rate increase granted WTU last year "did not get the job done." That increase was for an average of 8.3 per cent and was only the

second in the Company's entire history.

"The relief you granted us has been overrun by inflation and high interest rates and the need to build additional facilities," he said.

Growth in demand for electric energy, caused by a steady increase in new customers and higher usage by old customers, is forcing WTU to expand its facilities.

WTU's newest power plant was completed in 1977, and since then the summer peak demand has grown to a point termed "uncomfortably close" to the system generating capacity.

The current construction program includes a coal-fired power station at Oklaunion, near Vernon. Although ownership of this plant will be shared by two sister companies in the Central and South West Corporation, Oklaunion will be the most costly project ever undertaken by WTU.

So far, WTU has lagged well behind most of the industry in increasing its rates. A recent report from the Public Utility Commission shows WTU's rates to be second lowest in the state among investor-owned companies and fifth lowest among all utilities.

Under the proposed rates, an average bill for basic residential service would be increased by 19.1 per cent. For example, a residential customer using 600 kilowatt-hours per month would pay \$40.95, compared to \$34.39 under the present rates—a difference of \$6.56. This would include fuel costs.

Hornets Upset Matadors

The number one ranked Motley County Matadors were upset 44-12 last Friday by an awesome running attack by the Aspermont Hornets in the state quarterfinal playoff game at Spur. The Matadors had a total of 287 offensive yards with Harvey Lee gaining 130 yards and Tim Shannon picking up 97, but the effort fell short

of the 443 yards gained by the Hornets.

"Aspermont's speed was the key to the game," Coach Gene Griffin said. "We knew what they were going to do, and had prepared well for their wide sweeps, but they ran them anyway."

Aspermont's Coach Ron Clifton was a bit surprised at the margin of the score. "We couldn't beat them

like that again if we played them a hundred times," he said in a post-game interview. "They're a good team, but couldn't get anything going."

The Matadors out gained the Hornets 166 to 135 yards in the first half, but went to the dressing room down 12-15 at halftime.

MC received the opening kickoff and

drove quickly to the Hornet 15 yard line, but at that point lost the ball on a fumble.

The Hornets could not move the ball and punted to the MC 48, but two plays later the Matadors fumbled again. This time the Hornets moved 54 yards in eight plays to score with 2:41 left in the first quarter. The kick for PAT was good and

Aspermont led 7-0. MC got the ball on their own 32 and moved 68 yards in seven plays to score as the first quarter ended. The TD came when Tim Shannon

crashed in from inches out, after Harvey Lee and Darrell Moore recorded big gains during the drive. The PAT failed, and MC trailed 7-6. See **Upset Page 6**

The Hornets will play Wink at Big Springs in the semi-finals game. Wink defeated Gorman last week 21-0.

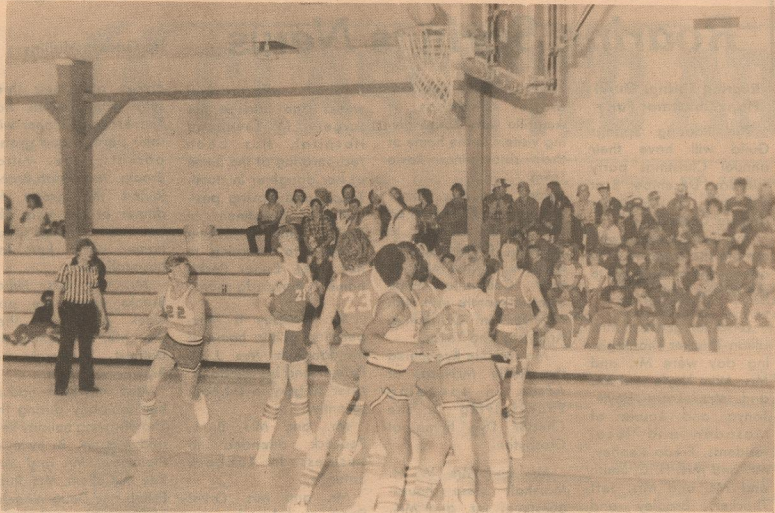

Conservation Program Out For Review

The Secretary of Agriculture has invited the public to comment on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposed soil and water conservation program. The Secretary's preferred program features expanded roles for local and state governments and the targeting of USDA dollars and personnel to conserving critical resource problem areas.

People who are interested in the program, or potentially affected by it, are urged to comment. Responses will be accepted through January 15, 1982, and can be mailed to State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service (SCS), P.O. Box 648, Temple, Texas 76503.

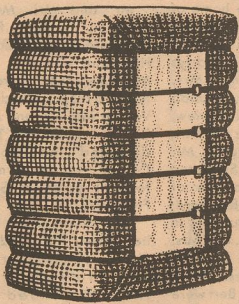
James Gillespie, district conservationist for SCS at Matador said the Secretary's proposed program would concentrate more USDA assistance in areas where soil erosion and other problems threaten to reduce agricultural productive capacity as to increase agriculture production costs. Basic USDA technical and financial assistance would continue in all areas.

The program would use local and state conservation coordinating boards to identify critical problem areas, set priorities, and develop program for local and state action to solve the problems. These boards would be based on existing organizations—conservation district boards, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) committees, extension advisory boards, and other groups.

Based on the recommendation from these local and state boards and national priorities, more USDA assistance would be aimed at reducing the most serious soil erosion and related problems.

Gillespie said the program is the secretary's proposed response to the Soil and Water Resources Conservation Act of 1977 (RCA). It is contained in an RCA Program report and a summary leaflet with response form that can be reviewed at the local SCS or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office.

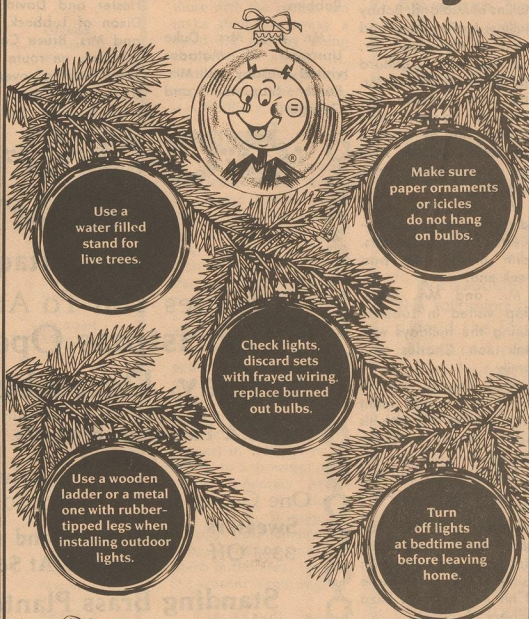

EDITORIALS

The Needy

It's the custom in many parts of the country for newspapers to call attention to the plight of the community's needy at Christmas time. This is a worthwhile undertaking and it is appropriate to make a special effort at Christmas to see that every child, especially, is remembered in some way. If there are nearby families in distress, if there are children likely to have little to be happy about Christmas morning, those with the means can make their Christmas a satisfying one by doing something about it. Parties, good food and expensive presents are less fulfilling, inwardly.

Progress?

Twice in recent weeks, PLO leader Yasser Arafat has hinted that he could live with a Saudi Arabian Middle East peace plan that would recognize Israel's right to exist in the region in return for creation of a Palestinian state and return of seized Arab lands by Israel. The eight-point Saudi peace plan has been denounced by hard-line Arab countries like Syria and Libya, and the U.S. has refused to publicly support it. But it has an appeal to a growing number of moderate Arabs and to many Americans and Israelis. It may be Israel's best chance to bring about permanent peace in the area, though the present Begin regime has rejected it. The Saudi peace program could be modified, of course, and Israel should have its security guaranteed. Other objections to the plan might be negotiable.
