Mr. Meador died Sunday, April 11, at 8:30 a.m. in Richards Memorial Hospital, where he had been a where he had been a patient the past month. He had been in failing health for several years. He was the brother of the late Ben Douglas Meador, longtime publisher of the Matador Tribune.

pioneers of Motley
County, had moved County, had moved after leaving Matador and living for a short time in Moore County The family later moved to Quanah, and in 1910, to Cottle County.

As a young man, Meador worked as a cowboy on the Matador Ranch, and on a dude ranch in New Mexico, later returning to Paducah. He was married to the former






