To build a good a good first you are iump To build a good newspaper first you must know how to jump the story, shoot the page, strip the negative, burn the plate, blow up the picture, kill the ad, bury the filler, float the ad, size the photo, make the PMT, and proof, trim and wax.

Always be careful not Always be careful not to have bumping tombstones, but if you do, you may just box a head. Always give the ads plenty of air, and keep fresh soup in the darkroom. Be sure to check the halftones, dummy and runsheet. There are basically two types of pictures. First you have the action

Two types of pictures. First you have the action shot, which of course, shows action. Then there are the Castro shots. They are the ones where you line up the subjects and shoot them.

You will learn that a newspaper has a lot of lines in it. There are by lines, cut lines, see lines, date lines, jump lines, credit lines, border lines, head lines, name lines, and that dreaded

dead line.

In no time, after a brief lesson in the camera room at the press you will be

yelling, "Five by seven, 50 per cent, 40 over nine, shoot." But that will come later, if

anyone is interested in lesson two.

At the larger At the larger newspapers, where they run different colors, you will learn how to do color separations, but for now we will try to keep these lessons simple and easy to understand. Besides, we can't run color very often in our paper. We can't run red because our entire stock of red ink is used in

stock of red ink is used in

stock of red inkis used in the bookkeeping department.

At the typesetting machine, after you get the proper setting for justification, and program the lead, you click out the galley. But long before you ever crank out the copy to be cut and processed you will do all kinds of dividing, flushing and pausing to try and figure out what on earth the writer was

This is the end of lesson one. We hope you learned a lot. If lesson two is published next week we will be surprised. If not, then you will know someone either, burned down either burned down our office or shot the editor.
