Guest Presents Program For El Progresso Club

A program on Chila Abuse was presented April 8, for El Progresso Club, by Mrs. James Bearden, R.N. with the Visiting Nurse Services for Motley County.

The meeting was at the home of Mrs. Robert the home of Mrs. Robert Darsey, with Mrs. Frank Pohl presiding in the absence of the presi-dent, Mrs. Furman Vinson. Mrs. Carl King was program leader. The clubwomen were

surprised to learn that there are instances of child abuse in this county, as Mrs. Bearden county, as Mrs. Bearden explained that the malady was not confined to physical injuries, but could be verbal, emotional and even neglect, on the part of the parents.

"Any of these conditions can be brought on by stress," Mrs. Bearden said. "So many parents ignore

many parents ignore their children and are not aware that they are abusing them emo-tionally. And surprisinly, it is not always the children in low income families who suffer from neglect and abuse. Many of the more affluent parents are

"Most children feel insecure," she pointed out, continuing, "An abused chid generally grows up to be an abusive parent. Everyone has the responsibility of reporting cases of child abuse and getting involved. If authorities think a child's life is in danger, they take the child from the parents. After counseling, if the parents are given the child back, they are checked often."

Bearden said that there is a penalty of six months in jail and \$10,000 fine for failing to report child abuse cases. The nearest agency is Parents Anonymous in Lubbock,

she said.
