A program on Child Abuse was presented April 8, for EI Progresso Club, by Mrs. James Bearden, R.N. with the Visifing Nurse Services for Motley County. The meeting was at the home of Mrs. Robert Darsey, with Mrs. Frank Pohl presiding in the absence of the president, Mrs. Furman was program leader. The clubwomen wer surprised to learn that surprised to learn that child abuse in this county, as Mrs. Bearden explained that the malady was not confined to physical injuries, but could be verbal, emotional and even neglect, on the part of the parents. conditions these brought on by stress," Mrs. Bearden said. "So many parents ignore their children and are not aware that they are abusing them emotionally. And surprisinly, it is not always the children in low income tamilies who suffer trom neglect and abuse. Many offluent parents are guilty."
"Most children feel insecure, she pointed out, continuing, an abused chid generally
grows up to be an grows up to be an one has the responsibility of reporting cases of involved. If authorities think a child's life is in danger, they take the child from the parents. After counseling, if the parents are given the child back, they are checked often." Mrs. Bearden said that there is a penalty of six months in jail and $\$ 10,000$ fine for failing
