Former Physician, Dr. "Y" Speaks At Lions Meeting

By Lila Meador A tormer physician here, Dr. Y Hoang Do, who is now practicing ophthalmology with offices in Plainview, was speaker at the May 18 meeting of Matador Lions Club, at the United Methodist He was introduced by

He was introduced by Lion John M. Russell, who explained, "We all knew Dr. Do, as Dr. "Y" (pronounced "E") when he served this county, because another physician who was here at the same time was also a Dr. Do, although not related."

The two physicians came here in 1975 as medical refugees from Saigon, when an effort was being made to re-open the Motley General Hospital in connection with the connection with the clinic. After leaving Matador three years later, Dr. Y Hoang Do enrolled at Lubbock Medical School, where he completed a course in ophthalmology.

He spoke on various diseases and surgery of the eye, and showed a film, "Diabetes and the film, "Diabetes and the Eye," showing symp-toms and treatment specifically of persons suffering from diabetes and hypoglycemia (low blood sugar). He explained that fluctuat ing sugar level affects the eye. He explained laser treatment and other methods of removing cataracts, but advised that the patient should check with an optometrist or family doctor before taking

any action.



Bases, Farmers Advised

Protect Crop Acreage

"Now that the signup period for the 1982 farm programs has ended, the next step will be certification of crop areas," Dean Turner Chairman of the Motley County Agricul-tural Stabilization and Conservation committee, said.
This step is necessary

to assure eligibility for program benefits and to protect 1983 crop acreage bases.
Therefore, both program participants and

report crop acres, he said.

Acreage bases for participating crops will not be reduced in 1983, according to Mr. Turner. "This means that the 1983 acreage base for program crops will equal the 1982 crop acreage base except for rotation farms." The 1983 acreage base for crops with zero planted equal that 1982 crop

acreage base except for rotation farms.

"To protect their 1983 crop acreage bases, it is important for farmers who are not participating in the 1982 acreage reduction programs to report their acreages," the ASCS official said. Motley County

farmers have from now to August 2, 1982 to report cotton, grain sorghum, corn and peanuts.

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

display of fashions worn
by women of the
century, was presented

The design, "Scarlett in Crinoline" is featured on the first plate in the display series, and is similar to gowns worn by Scarlett in Gone with the Wind

Other plates included Sarah, introducing the bustle (1875); Collette, Sportswoman (1890); Lea' - New Elegance, with leg-omutton sleves (1900); Albertine - New freedom with soft, fancy fashion, sans the corset (1910); - the fashion introduced by the famous dancer, Isadore Duncan bethe tamous dancer, Isadore Duncan be-tween 1901 and World War I; Edith protrayed the Practical look of 1915, a World War design named for Edith Cavell;

The first World War changed the picture for women, as the Roaring 20's advanced," Mrs. Pipkin narrated. Daisy the Rebel exposed legs and introduced cigarand introduced cigar-ette smoking, and was modeled after Zelda Fitzgerald, wife of the author F. Scott Fitzger-ald. Marlene the Vamp was fashioned after Marlene Dietrich of the 1930's. With World War II came the short War II came the short suits of 1943, as fashioned by Helene, followed in 1947 by the

followed in 1947 by the New Look displayed by Sophia. Frankie, the Inde-pendent Woman is shown in 1960 in trousers as the last visage of the Victorian age fades away, and Brigid wears the Mini Skirt of 1965.
