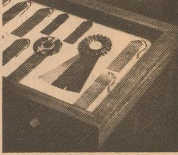

## PROGRESS IN MEDICINE

### Dramatic Change

A recent breakthrough in technology is partially responsible for a dramatic change in the ways diabetes is managed.

This breakthrough is a blood glucose (sugar) test, which patients can do anywhere, quickly, easily and inexpensively. Doctors all over the country are now teaching their patients how to check their own blood sugar levels and then how to make the necessary adjustments. Knowledge of the sugar level in blood enables the diabetic to alter his food, exercise or insulin intake immediately and bring his body back into balance.

Prior to the development of this new test, the only convenient test available for use at home was the urine test, which can be inaccurate.

This new test is simple enough for even youngsters to do.

First, they prick their finger and squeeze out a drop of blood (this is virtually painless), then they transfer the drop to the chemically treated pads on the test-strip called Chem-strip bG, developed and produced by Bio-Dynamics, a Boehringer Mannheim company. After 60 seconds, they wipe the excess blood off the strip. After another minute, they match the colors on the strip to the colors on the package. The blood glucose level is read by comparing the colors on the strip to the color chart on the container.

The color results remain fixed for as long as seven days. Thus a diabetic can do several days of testing and then bring the strips to the doctor for observation of the trends in the patient's lifestyle.

Among the benefits of this test is the fact that pregnant diabetics can bring their babies to full-term without complications, whereas previously there were many problems involved in the diabetic pregnancy. Now diabetics of all ages are living more normal lives.

Looking for a dessert that takes company in its stride — and very little effort from you? Search no more! The answer is our Ambrosia Parfait, a fabulous, fancy, fluffy concoction of fresh fruit, yogurt and Oreo chocolate sandwich cookies. Fixed in a jiffy but looking like hours of painstaking preparation, it is truly a Dessert to Dazzle.

**AMBROSIA PARFAITS**  
2 (8-ounce) cartons low-fat, vanilla-flavored yogurt  
2 1/2 cups fresh pineapple chunks (about half medium-size fresh)  
1 (3 1/2-ounce) can flaked coconut (about 1 1/3 cups)  
3 medium oranges  
1. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon spoon cookie crumbs. Chill Oreo chocolate sandwich cookie crumbs evenly in bottom of 6 (10-ounce) standard-size wine glasses mediate. Makes 6 servings, or dessert glasses.  
2. In medium bowl, combine yogurt, pineapple chunks and coconut; stir until well blended. Spread chunks in natural juice; about 1/3 cup evenly over crumbs in each glass to form a layer.  
3. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons Oreo chocolate sandwich cookie crumbs for garnish, top orange layers with remaining crumbs; cover with remaining yogurt mixture, using approximately 1/4 cup per glass. Sprinkle top of each lightly with 1/2 teaspoon of-season or unavailable, use 1 (20-ounce) can pineapple chunks in natural juice; about 1/3 cup evenly over crumbs in each glass to form a layer.
