Mr. Whitworth was a native of Silverton. He was raised in Motley County. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army during World

He started working for the First State Bank in 1924 serving as a in 1924 serving as Cashier and later as the assistant vice-president. He retired from banking in 1974 after

banking in 1974 after 50 years.
Being well known around Matador, he enjoyed meeting people and then staying in contact with them, even though they moved to distant moved to distant places. He often wrote short letters to every-one, especially the ones who went off to serve in

the Armed Forces.
In an Amarillo paper
in 1956, he was called
the "kindest man in
Matador". The ments may not be well known out of his home county, but there he is known as the man who: Visits patients in the two Matador hospitals, every day. Buys more flowers than anyone in Matador, and is especially thoughtful about sending flowers to older people. Writes more letters than anyone in town, although his letter writing is not quite so heavy as it was during World War II when he letters to Motley County servicemen all over the world. Has never refused to make a donation to any worthy

for Matador, as the commander for the American Legion, as a steward of the First United Methodist

Lodge and a member of the Odd Fellows. He served as secre-tary for 16 years for the Matador Lions Club. He also served as a president and was the only remaining active Chapter Member. In 1959, Lions International honored him for his

outstanding service to Lionism. At the time of his death, he had been a member for 53 years.

He was known as a one-man chamber of commerce in the Matador area.

He married the former Margaret Louise Caswell on August 10, 1925 in Bullard, Texas. She passed away on July 19, 1975.

Mr. Whitworth had lived in San Antonio for the past two years. He passed away on April 28, 1982, at 8:20 p.m. in the Audie L. Murphy






