## New Fire Station Open In Matador

Matador firemen were able to move their fire fighting equipment into the new fire hall on May 24, after months of hard work and waiting.

The six thousand square foot building was built with funds from the city, county and money raised by the fire department, plus a lot of private

contributions, according to fire department spokesman James Gillespie.

"The firemen worked on the building after hours," he said. "And there was a lot of volunteer help from people not in the fire department."

Although the fire-

fighters are able to operate from the new hall, located on the east side of the courthouse square, it is not completely finished.

Plans are that the building will also have a meeting room, rest-rooms, a shower, living quarters and a kitchen area. There will also be a console containing

communication radios and emergency broadcasting equipment, plus the new storm warning system.

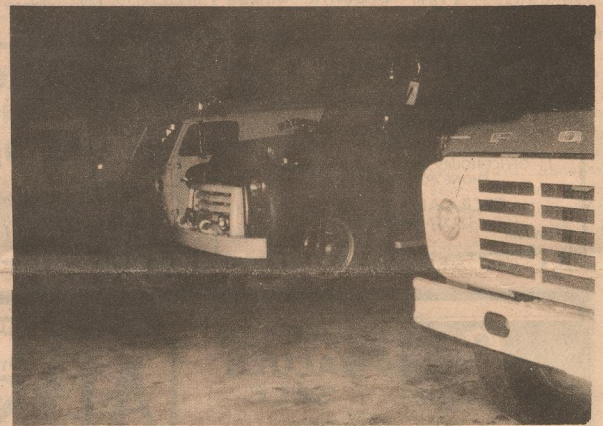
Contributions may be made to the fire department or residents may volunteer their time to help the department complete their building project.

## Summer Reading Program To Begin On June 12th

The Motley County Library will be the brightest star in the galaxy this summer. "Space Capers" is the theme of the Texas Reading Club and will focus on space exploration and travel, the mysteries of the universe, and the finest in science fiction.

The payload that each participant will receive includes a space age bookmark, a reading log to record books read, paper games and puzzles to challenge young Earthlings, and a celestial certificate for those who complete the program.

Special films, story hours, and other activities are planned for the summer months in the Motley County Library. Participation in all of the activities of the Reading Club is free, and all ages of children are invited to participate.

Each child will contract to read a certain number of books or magazines during the program (the number is determined by the child himself). Preschool children may also participate by having parents or other interested adults read books to them. In addition to the reading of books and magazines, the child may also count listening to stories

on records, tapes, filmstrips, and films and attending planned library activities, such as story hours, towards his contract completion.

The theme this summer is "Space Capers". The library collection already contains "space" and

"science fiction" books, and several new books on these subjects are expected to arrive soon. However, any book (no matter the subject) may count toward the child's contract number.

Dates for story hours (ages 4-6) and films (all ages) will be an-

nounced later in the library column of the Tribune.

# Couple Takes 15 Day Tour Of Scandinavia and USSR

Mr. and Mrs. L. H. Dirickson have returned from a 15 day trip to Denmark, Sweden, Finland and U.S.S.R. The tour was sponsored by Lubbock National Bank's Leading Ladies, of which Mrs. Dirickson is a member.

There were 34 people making the trip. They left Lubbock May 13 on Texas International via of Denver, landing at La Guardia airport in New York City where eight waiting Chrysler limes whisked them to J.F.R. airport where they enplaned on Finnair for Denmark, after passing over Newfoundland, Scotland, Britain and Amsterdam, Holland for a brief stop before reaching Copenhagen.

Three days and nights were spent in this Danish capital where tours and boat rides were taken and other attractions for tourists visited, not to leave out the "Little Mermaid" and famed Tivoli Gardens. From

Copenhagen the group left by a luxurious and clean Scandinavian express train for Stockholm. The sights of Sweden's capital included the unique City Hall, situated on the waterfront, the Royal Palace, Ridderholm Church, site of coronation of the kings of Sweden, and the old town with its narrow streets and ancient houses.

The seventh day was aboard the Silja's line, the "Fenna", a huge and magnificent ferry liner—a floating hotel, with restaurants, bars and night clubs and into Helsinki, Finland.

The next day they visited the "White City of the North" including Senate Square, the imposing Lutheran Cathedral, the amazing, "Big Church" made from granite rocks and situated partly underground, the Parliament Building, the Market place, where "Amanda", the second most beautiful woman's

statue is in a sparkling fountain. The next day was spent in Helsinki where everyone who had enough marks left shopped.

Saturday dawned bright with a mid-morning flight on Finnair to Leningrad, U.S.S.R.'s second largest city and once the capital of the czar's Holy Russia. The group transferred to the Deluxe Intourist Hotel, the Leningrad, second largest in the city which was home for the next few days. A sightseeing tour was taken the next day of this beautiful city, which was planned and laid out by Italian, German and Scots architects. The winter and summer palaces of "Peter the Great", St. Isaac's Cathedral with its typically Russian bulbous towers, the Nevsky Prospect which is Leningrad's main avenue took most of the day.

That night the group enjoyed a very gay and colorful folk dance

performed by Russians in the south part of Russia in one of the old majestic theaters. The fourth and last day in Russia was a visit to the Hermitage Gallery which has the richest collection of western and Russian art in the world.

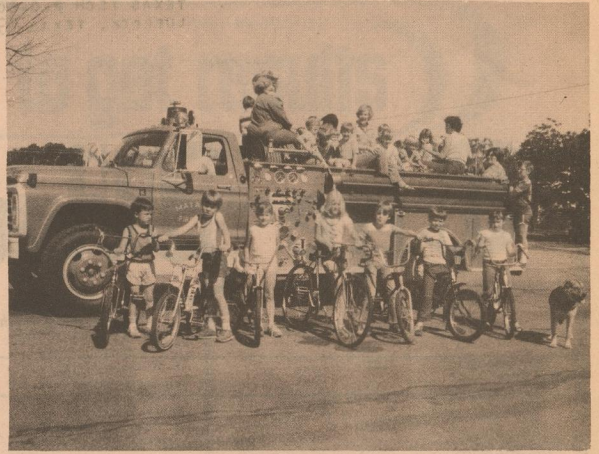
After lunch and again aboard Aeroflot, a Russian plane, it was back to Helsinki. In Finland, the last night the group had a late dinner at the Adlon restaurant which was established in the 18th century and still operating. On the last day about 3 p.m. on Finnair the group enplaned for home.

Going home a brief

stop was made in Montreal, Canada, then to La Guardia and a change to American Airlines for Dallas where the night was spent. About noon the flight headed for Lubbock.

Tour guide from Lubbock was Dr. Dudley Strain, eminent pastor for over 20 years on Broadways Christian Church, also an employee of Lubbock National Bank, aided by Rita Wallace an Lubbock National Bank employee.

This is Mr. and Mrs. Dirickson's third trip to Europe. The second time was via the original Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth.
