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## Local Telephone Office To Open Here Sept. 15th

The advantages of a local telephone company business office will be available in town, beginning September 8, 1982.

Jim Davis, Operations manager for General Telephone, said the company will open a local service agency at the Matador Hardware & Supply, 1015 Main on September 15, 1982.

"The local service agency will have all the advantages of a business office, allowing customers to call billing or service personnel direct," Davis said. "In addition, customers will be able to save money by taking advantage of services offered through the service agency such as picking up phones which can be taken home and plugged into GTE Phone Mart jacks or returning phones when discontinuing service."

Davis said customers can use the service agency to pay their telephone bill; view a display and/or catalog to order telephone instruments; call the billing center direct concerning billing questions; call the business office direct to install, add or discon-

tinue service, or for other service needs.

In addition, customers can use the service agency to have telephone instruments tested to determine if they require repair; bring phones for minor repairs; Phones may be replaced if major repairs are necessary; return phones when discontinuing service to avoid the charge to have the company send an employee to pick up the phone, or the cost of purchasing the phones.

Also to pick up phones, take the phones home and plug them into GTE Phone Mart jacks to avoid the premise visit charge; purchase miscellaneous equipment, including GTE Phone Mart jacks to avoid the jack charge and premise visit charge that applies if the company makes the installation; purchase house wiring to do the wiring or repair of bad wiring to save the wiring charge and premise visit charge if the company does the work.

Davis said, "The local service agency gives customers a convenient location to allow them to take advantage of

the cost-saving service available which allows customers to participate in the maintenance of their service."

"As deregulation of the industry continues, there will be more and more changes to

recover the costs of services from customers receiving the benefit of the service and the new service agency will give customers a convenient way to save and conduct business."

## Matadors Drop Season Opener

The Motley County Matadors dropped their opening game of the 1982 season 23-26 to Paducah after leading 23-20 in the third quarter.

In the second quarter the Dragons led 8-20, but the Matadors came back in the third quarter with two touchdowns to take the lead.

The Dragons shocked the Matadors by returning the opening kick off 81 yards for a TD and then adding a two point conversion. Cody Meredith recovered an onside kick for Motley County.

Later in the first quarter Clayton Sims intercepted a Dragon pass and Motley County drove to the one, where quarterback Shawn Bearden went over for another TD. The two point extra point try was good and the score was tied 8-8.

Before the first quarter ended Paducah returned an intercepted pass 80 yards for a TD, making the score 8-14.

In the second quarter Paducah scored from the five to lead 8-20 at halftime. The third quarter belonged to the Matadors, as Darrell Moore scored from 50 and 12 yards. A kick for PAT and a two point conversion pulled the Matadors up to 23-20 over the Dragons as the last quarter started.

In the final minute of play the Dragons scored from four yards out to beat the Matadors 23-26.

Motley County had a total of 305 yards on offense to Paducah's 321. The Dragons had 62 yards passing to MC's five.

The Matadors will play Valley here Friday night, starting at 8 p.m.

## Deadline Is Near For Wheat Insurance

September 15 is the last date on which applications will be accepted for All-Risk insurance policies on 1983-crop wheat. All-Risk Crop Insurance Field Operations Director F. W. "Ted" Crouch, Jr. says that a list of local agents who offer the insurance can be obtained by contacting the county ASCS office.

Crouch says that the number of applications received to date and the interest expressed by wheat growers suggests that the amount of insurance in force will be a record high. "One major reason," Crouch notes, "is the continuing increase in crop production costs. Many wheat growers simply

do not have the necessary cash reserves or additional borrowing capability to take a chance on losing the money that they will have invested in their crops."

"Another reason," the insurance official contends, "is the reduced cost of purchasing insurance."

The federal government in an effort to encourage participation in the program, pays up to 30% of the cost of the protection. Anticipated sign-up also is expected to be higher because a growing number of lenders are requiring or suggesting that borrowers carry at least enough coverage to provide for repayment of production loans.

The park, located south of the jail, is maintained by Matador Garden Club as one of its projects, and the sign was designed by Mrs. Edgar Lee, a member of the Parks committee, who provided the redwood base. The original sign, erected in 1976, contained lettering made of aluminum used in the modern offset printing. The frame holding the sign is an old piece of printing equipment found on the site of the Matador Tribune building, where the first newspaper plant in the country started in 1892, is believed to have been located. The park site was donated by the late Douglas Meador, former publisher of the Tribune in memory of his pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. James (Jim) Meador. The south corner of the plot was the site of the old Mission Service Station in operation during the 1930's and early 1940's.

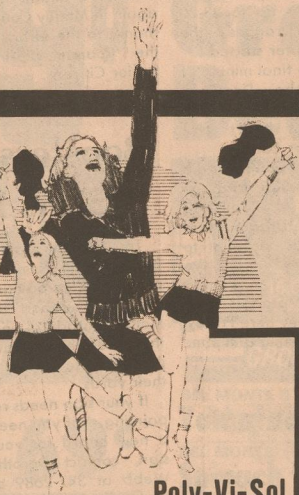

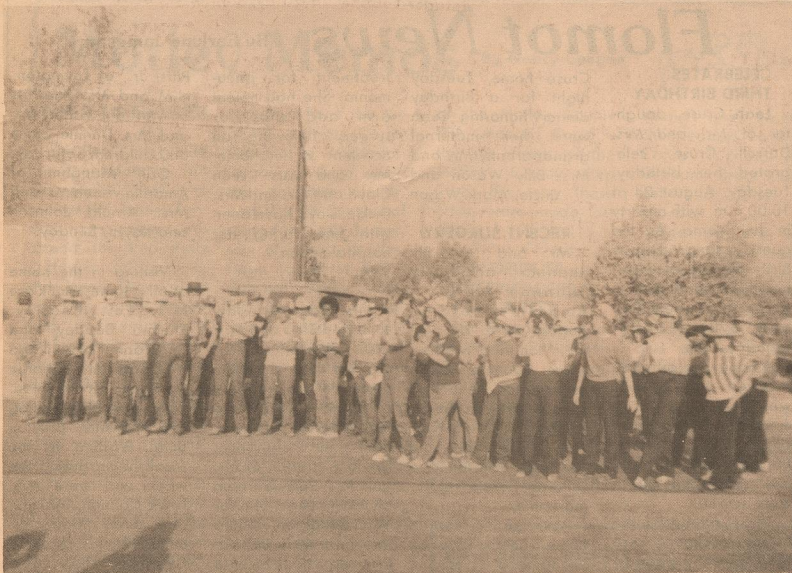

## All Trophy Youth Horse Show Set At Childress

The third time for anything has to be a charm. Hopefully this saying will hold true for the Open Youth Horse Show to be held in Childress on Saturday, September 18th. Twice this summer the show had to be canceled because of too much rain and sloppy arena conditions.

All area youth are encouraged to attend the show which is sponsored by the Childress County 4-H Horse Club. Weather conditions should be ideal for a horse show if it does not rain it out.

Competition will be divided into three age groups: 14 thru 18 years of age, 9 thru 13 years of age and 8 years and under. The high point individual in the two

older age groups will be presented belt buckles. Tack will be presented to the first place winners and each class. In addition to these awards trophies will be presented through fifth place in each class.

Activities will begin at 10:00 a.m. in the Old Settlers Arena in Childress. Bill Smith of Vernon will serve as judge for the show. Judging of halter classes will be first. There will be one class each of registered mares, grade mares, registered geldings and grade geldings.

The eight years and under age group events will include western pleasure, and flag race. The following performance classes for

the two older age groups will include: showmanship, western pleasure, western horsemanship, western riding, pole bending, barrel race and stakes race.

Entry fees will be \$4.00 per class. The Texas 4-H Horse Show

rules will be followed.

Entries close 30 minutes before each class begins. All contestants ages will be determined as of September 18, 1982. A contestant does not have to be a 4-H member to be eligible to compete.

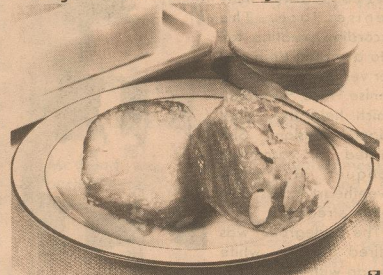

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## Strake Talk

PROPERTY TAXES—GOOD INTENTIONS AREN'T ENOUGH

I want to talk this week about taxes and good intentions. As I travel around Texas, I notice that what's known as the Peveeto Bill is the subject of much talk and controversy. This bill, named after state representative Wayne Peveeto, is a tax reform law: legislation of the best intention.

The law was designed to end confusion and unfairness in the way property taxes were assessed. Property was often on different tax rolls at different values. Older properties went years, sometimes decades, without being revalued or updated. New construction and newly sold property was on the rolls at more correct values and so people who owned it paid a higher share of taxes. Some property was simply left off the rolls entirely. The system was confusing and inequitable.

In an attempt to correct these problems, the Peveeto Bill created property tax appraisal boards for each Texas county. These boards were charged with the responsibility of setting all property at its full value—as residential or commercial property or as land used for agricultural purposes. Taxes could then be levied on this accurately assessed property according to the needs of the taxing entity.

It sounded good, but it hasn't worked. The biggest problem is that the people on the appraisal boards are appointed, not elected. They are not accountable to the taxpayers. So now we have a new, faceless bureaucracy to deal with. It amounts to taxation without representation.

My opponent has been on both sides of this issue, first supporting the bill in the legislature—then doing an about-face and calling it bad legislation after it was passed.

The Peveeto Bill, though well-intentioned, has created problems which *must* be dealt with in the next legislature and as your next Lt. Governor, I will do just that. If you have any thoughts on this subject, please write me at 1213 W. 34th, Austin, Texas 78705.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 2, 1982

**PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment repealing the state property tax."

**PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT**

House Joint Resolution 62 as amended by Senate Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would eliminate the \$80,000,000 ceiling on state welfare aid during any fiscal year.

The amendment would set the state welfare spending limit at \$160,000,000 for the 1982-1983 biennium.

The amendment further provides that, for each subsequent biennium, the maximum amount spent for state welfare shall not exceed one percent of the state budget.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

## PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

## PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

## PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

## PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

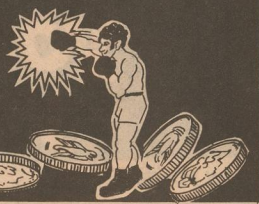
Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."
