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## Jack Hightower Speaks At Memorial Service Thursday

"I always appreciate the opportunity to come back to the Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion, and participate in the Memorial Service to honor the early pioneers," said Congressman Jack Hightower Thursday, as he delivered the main address in honor of the early settlers. "In our mobile society it is very important to remember where our roots are, to remember the pioneers who came and settled and developed a strong agriculture, and to do our part to help keep the rural area and agriculture strong," he stated.

Bill Young of Dickens served as Master of Ceremonies for the Memorial Service. The invocation was by Billy Joe Whitaker, and the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag was followed by the singing of "America", led by Mike Porter of Afton. Porter also sang several gospel songs.

State Representative Foster Whaley of Paducah, 66th District, was introduced and spoke to the assembly.

Plaques were presented to the oldest man and woman present, who were Emmett Lawrence and Miss Mary Keith. Receiving the plaques for having traveled the farthest distance to the reunion were Perry Hendrix of California for the man and Courtney Groves of California for the woman. Courtney is the three and one-half month old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pat Groves and the granddaughter of Mr. and Mrs. Algie Groves of Quanah. They are former Matador residents.

The woman who has been a resident of Motley County the longest was Miss Mary Keith, who has been here 88 years. She received a plaque for this. Receiving the plaque for the man living in Motley County the longest was Clarence Jenkins, who was born here in 1896.

The longest residents of Dickens County were Mrs. Curtis Goodwin, who has been a resident since 1905 and Roy Arrington since 1901. They both received plaques.

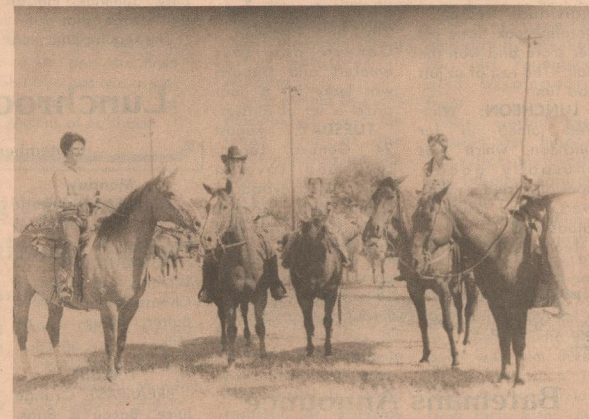
Billy Joe Whitaker announced that the Old Settlers Association has entered in a contract with the Motley County

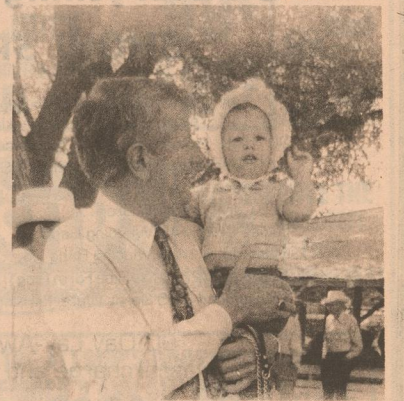

## Strake Talk

### TWO TERMS IS ENOUGH

Texans have a healthy skepticism of their elected officials, a wariness of entrenched power that they have embodied in the state constitution. They have historically refused to keep top state officeholders more than a few terms.

Now my opponent comes along, having spent nearly ten years in the Lt. Governor's office, one of the top state policy-making offices. Mr. Hobby wants yet another term to make it 14 years in that crucial job. That is unprecedented. Never in Texas' history has any Lt. Governor served that long—or wanted to.

His desire, frankly, puzzles me. You would think he would have other goals, other challenges he might want to tackle. As his primary opponent this year said, "If he had anything to get done, you'd think he would have done it by now."

My opponent will tell you that experience is what counts. I think voters need

to look at the experience they have had with him. After ten years, our high-ways are in bad shape, the quality of education has declined, we still do not have a new, statewide water plan and he has refused to tackle the growing crime problem. We can't afford more of that kind of experience.

I have a long-held belief in what I call the citizen-politician: someone who holds a job, serves his country or state for a reasonable time, then returns to that job and private life. For that reason, the first order of business after I am elected will be to have a constitutional amendment introduced in the legislature limiting the Lt. Governor to two terms—eight years. That is enough time for anyone. To great a concentration of power for too long is bad. That is a principle of democracy.

## 47 Traffic Deaths Estimated By DPS During Labor Day

Although motor vehicle fatalities are down by five per cent statewide as compared to the same time last year, the Texas Department of Public Safety is estimating 47 traffic deaths over the forthcoming Labor Day weekend.

DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams said he is not optimistic that the holiday period would reflect any fewer deaths than anticipated. However, he said that drivers could help limit the number of fatalities by using seat belts, maintaining a safe speed and refraining from drinking while driving. He said about half of the holiday deaths would probably involve alcohol.

"Some people tend to drink more during the holidays and then attempt to drive. By doing so, they show a low regard for the well-being of themselves, their passengers and other motorists. Drunk driving is obviously one of the most dangerous risk factors facing motorists today," he said.

DPS statistical reports show 23 per cent of traffic deaths reported last year involved alcohol. However, Adams said, "About 50 per cent or more of the traffic deaths in Texas are alcohol related."

"State law does not provide for mandatory blood alcohol testing on drivers who were believed to have been drinking. When we

compare accident reports and national statistics, it is easy to estimate the number of accidents which involve the drinking driver," he said.

Last year during Labor Day, 50 persons were killed in urban and rural traffic accidents. Eight more persons died later as a result of injuries suffered from accidents which occurred during the 78-hour holiday.

At the discretion of command officers, the DPS will have extra patrols assigned to areas where heavy volumes of traffic can be anticipated or where drinking drivers can be expected.

"Local highway patrol commanders will assign the additional troopers as they deem appropriate to assist the holiday traveler and to watch for drivers who violate traffic laws," said Adams.

The Labor Day holiday is traditionally one of the last holidays of the summer vacation period and extensive travel and heavy traffic can be expected.

The DPS is urging motorists who take long trips to utilize the many rest stops provided by civic and business clubs and the State Highway Department.

Additionally, the DPS will conduct Operation Motorcade whereby the city police departments, county sheriff's offices and troopers report the number of traffic deaths directly to the news media.

## Hobby Says Session Will Prevent Crisis

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby said recently that he is confident that the Special Session of the Texas Legislature called for September 7 will resolve immediate problems with the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund.

Gov. Bill Clements called the special session early Thursday after meeting with Hobby, House Speaker Bill Clayton and State Comptroller Bob Bullock.

Hobby said the session is needed to insure that jobless Texans will continue to receive unemployment benefits and to prevent an unreasonably high tax increase when the Legislature meets in regular session in January.

"The perilously low balance in the Unemployment Compensation Trust Fund should be dealt with promptly, rather than in the jaws of crisis later this year," Hobby said. "There is a real chance that the fund may be exhausted before November."

State law requires the fund to maintain a balance of at least \$225 million. Once the balance falls below that amount, an unemployment tax increase automatically goes into effect.

"A timely special session could avoid the dangers of jobless Texans failing to receive unemployment benefits and an unreasonably high tax increase," Hobby said. Hobby explained that the Texas Employment Commission receives only 37 cents of every federal unemployment tax dollar collected in Texas. Legislation pending in Congress would increase the federal tax. Hobby said that Texas, due to recent increases in unemployment

caused by the recession, should receive more federal funds.

"Dollars contributed by Texas employers to the federal fund should

be brought back to Texas to avoid appropriating Texas tax dollars badly needed for our schools, hospitals, highways and prisons," Hobby said.

### How Smoking Encourages Heartburn

Cigarette smokers who enjoy a cigarette at the end of a meal should not be surprised if they have heartburn later, according to Dr. Donald O. Castell, Director, Digestive Diseases Division, and Professor of Medicine at the Uniformed Services University.

Since there are so many types of stomach disorders, many people do not understand what heartburn is and what causes it. "There is a high-pressure zone between the stomach and the esophagus," says Dr. Castell. "Since the pressure of the esophagus is considerably less than in the stomach, the high-pressure zone acts as a barrier against the regurgitation of gastric acid into the esophagus. When the pressure is relaxed for any reason (e.g., after that cigarette), there is a backup of stomach contents into the esophagus, accounting for the burning sensation and sour taste known as 'heartburn.' Gravity also plays a contributory role; that is why most heartburn sufferers feel worse when they lie down."

Dr. Castell offers several suggestions for people who suffer from heartburn:

- Cut out that cigarette following a meal
- Take GAVISCON®
- Avoid foods that may stimulate acid secretion in the stomach, such as coffee and alcohol
- Sleep with the head of your bed raised about six inches (preferably by placing blocks under the legs at the head of the bed)
- Don't lie down right after eating
- Don't wear clothes that fit tightly around the waist
- Reduce if you're overweight
- Avoid fatty foods and chocolates, as well as greasy and spicy foods
- Stop or cut down on smoking



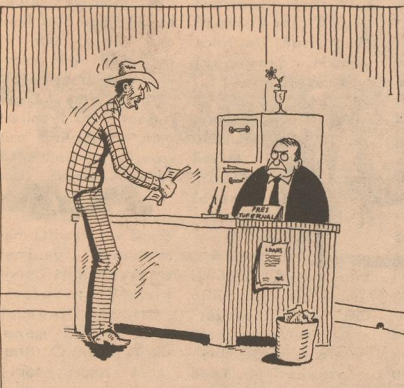
