## Economy Plan Set July 10

A MEETING designed to improve the economy of Motley County has been announced for Tuesday evening, July 10, at the high school auditorium in Matador, starting at 8:30 o'clock.

With the assistance of the South Plains Association of Governments, it is hoped that an overall economic development plan for the county can be formulated. Truett Mayes, regional service officer for SPAG will attend the meeting.

County Judge Forrest Campbell said this week: "It is important that concerned citizens have in mind various projects which they feel would be beneficial to the area. Each project will be examined, goals established and action proposed."

"We feel this is a very important program for the communities of Motley County, and we solicit the active support of everyone. The general public is asked to attend, and it is most important that committee members be present."

Action need to Qualify. This Overall Economic Development Program has been prepared to meet the requirements established by the Economic Development Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, for communities wishing to benefit from the Public Works and Economic Development Act. Under the provisions of this Act, counties designated as redevelopment areas by the Department of Commerce must prepare an O.E.D.P. in order to qualify.

The O.E.D.P. will also serve to provide a good background of the area's resources; it will assist the county in outlining economic development and community improvement goals. When the goals are established and well defined the county will have a realistic action program designed to get the economy moving ahead, stop the outmigration, and improve the communities.

It will also provide a basis for continued planning. It is a concerted effort made to control the use of existing and potential resources of the county so that a desired development takes place. The O.E.D.P. will be a motivating force for action because of the involvement of local people, and the growth of the communities and county is commensurate with the proportion of the efficient and economical use of public and private funds.

## Springs Will Not Be Closed To The Public

HISTORIC Roaring Springs which sold recently to C. L. "Chuck" Siewert, Lubbock capitalist, will not be closed to the public.

The statement was made Tuesday at the Matador Lions Club luncheon by native son Harry Hamilton, now a resident of Lubbock.

Mr. Hamilton said he had talked with Mr. Siewert the previous day and that he had assured him that the pool and recreation ground would be kept open to the public through the summer season.

After the sale of the property there had been apprehension that the lands might be converted to private use, and that the public might be prohibited.

Roaring Springs has long been a recreation spot, before the pool was constructed about 35 years ago.

The springs' recreational site is located on the South Fork of Pease River. Mr. Siewert purchased approximately 3,500 acres of land from the Matador Cattle Co., formerly a part of the original Matador Ranch.

## Boys Ranch Site Sought In County

A SITE for Texas Boys Ranch is being sought in Motley County, it was announced Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club, held in the First United Methodist Church basement.

The presentation was made by Johnny Moffitt, advisor, and native son, Harry Hamilton.

Mr. Moffitt showed a number of slides depicting boys ranches in other states. He stressed the need to place boys on ranches and said the city of Lubbock last year apprehended 792 juvenile boys. He said Cal Farley's Boys Ranch was filled with a long waiting list, as are other ranches.

Mr. Hamilton said he had stressed the natural resources of Motley County to the Lubbock board. He said he hoped to reverse the trend of losing population in the county. He said it would be necessary to raise enough cash to buy the land.

New President Ervin Willard appointed a committee to discuss the feasibility supporting the plan. Those appointed were Lions Forrest Campbell, L. B. Campbell, "Sonny" Russell and John Barnhill.

Members received a list of club committees for the fiscal year of 1973-1974.

ALMOST everything was for sale at Roaring Springs Saturday at the first "Flea Market" conducted at the former QA&P depot, which has recently become the property of the community.

Objects offered included guineas, a saddle (which did not sell), Airedale puppies, household articles, baby buggies, kitchen ware, art work. One unconfirmed report was that two dogs sold at \$50 each.

It was successful according to officials of the Predicta Study Club whose members conducted much of the operation.

Mrs. Grady Webb, newly elected President of the club said receipts were in the neighborhood of \$300 which included some generous donations from Roaring Springs businessmen.

"We are grateful to members of the Lions Club and other men of the community for their willingness to aid us in every way," Mrs. Webb declared.

"We want to explain to the public," Mrs. Webb continued, "that the project is a community affair and that the building will be used as a museum, community center and library. It will also be available for rent for family reunions."

The Flea Sale will be held the last Saturday in each month and all proceeds will be used to finance the project.

The ticket window in the waiting room of the depot was open Saturday, but no tickets were for sale. Passenger service on the railroad has long been suspended, and the attractive brick, tile-roofed building is the property of the citizens of Roaring Springs.

## STUDIES ABOUT THE BIBLE

The Flood was written by Alfred M. Rehwinkel, M.A., B.D., L.L.D., Professor of Theology, Concordia Seminary, Saint Louis, Mo., and was copyrighted in the year 1951. The eleventh printing was issued in 1967.

In this book Dr. Rehwinkel devotes Chapter XII to what scientists call "rubble drift and ossiferous fissures." According to Dr. Rehwinkel, scientists have found these drifts and fissures in several countries - U.S.S.R., Greece, Spain, Germany, France, England, United States, etc. Below note two quotes from Dr. Rehwinkel.

"A large deposit of bones in a cavity of the calcareous beds of the steppes of Russia was discovered in 1847 near Odessa. In this cavity were found 4,500 bones of bears derived from at least one hundred animals; with these were found remains of species of the cat family, hyenas, horses, boars, mammoth, rhinoceros, aurochs, and deer, together with the remains of numerous insectivores and rodents, such as hares, otters, marten, as well as wolves and foxes." Page 181.

"A similar deposit is found at Agate Springs in Sioux County in the northwestern corner of Nebraska. What remains of the hill covers about ten acres. This bone bed was accidentally discovered in 1876. It contains the bones of rhinoceroses, camels, giant wild boars, and other animals, buried together in a confused mass as only water would deposit them. It is estimated that the bones of about nine thousand complete animals are buried on this one hill. Clear signs indicate that the bone layer once extended over a very wide area; hence it is likely that many times that number of animals were brought together at this hill and buried there by the action of water." Page 183.

Rehwinkel further writes that "... these ossiferous fissures are usually found upon isolated hills of considerable height," and mentions one in France which is 1,030 feet above the surrounding plain. Page 180.

Harry Rimmer in his *The Harmony of Science & Scripture*, Chapter VII, gives several scientific evidences of the flood. There are many other writers, including scientists, who agree with the Bible about the Flood.

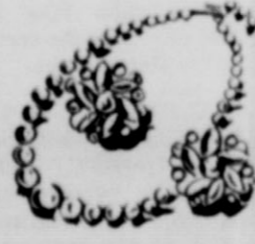
