Matadors Win Homecoming

Motley County and Rule hadn't met on the football field in many years until Friday night, and the Matadors thrilled a homecoming crowd with a 35-14 victory.

"Rule was a dangerous type team with all that speed," Coach Danny Williams said. "Our defense did a real good job containing them and didn't let

them break a long run for a TD."

Williams said the offense also did a fine job of overpowering Rule's defense.

MC received the opening kickoff but on the second play of the game Rule recovered a fumble on the Matador 49 yard line. The Matadors held and forced Rule to punt.

"We did not have any trouble moving the football, at will, most of the game," Williams said.

MC drove 55 yards in nine plays, and capped off the drive with a one yard touchdown by Tim Shannon. Shannon also kicked the extra point and MC led 7-0 with 1:13 left in the first quarter.

Rule came back to score on their next possession going 51 yards in nine plays. An extra point pass gave the Bobcats two more points and they led the Matadors 7-8 with 10:13 left in the first half.

Motley County didn't stay behind long. On the next play from scrimmage

Shannon ran 80 yards for a TD, then kicked the extra, to put MC ahead again 14-8 with 9:57 left in the half.

The Matadors held Rule again, forcing them to punt and took over the ball again on their own 42. Behind the running of Bill Luckett and Darrell Moore the team moved to the Rule 21 in six plays, then Shannon again ran in for a TD. A trick play on the extra point try worked, the ball being snapped to Darrell Moore, who ran it over for two points. Motley County now led 22-8 with 5:08 left in the half.

Rule received to start the second half but MC held them in four plays, forcing them to punt. The Matadors then marched down the field again, starting at their own 48. Luckett picked up seven yards, Shannon ran for 19, Moore gained six more, then quarterback Shawn Bearden threw a pass complete to Brent Campbell to the two yard line. Two plays later Moore plunged in for the score. The extra kick gave MC a 29-8 lead.

MC again held Rule in four plays then went 67 yards in 12 plays, with Coke Barton carrying the ball much of the time. The score came when Shannon went in from seven yards out with 54 seconds left in the third quarter. The score was now 35-8.

Rule fumbled the next kickoff and MC took over again. Max Bearden came into the game as quarterback with Shannon Winn and Clayton Sims running the ball. The MC youngsters chewed up over five minutes of playing time before the team was forced to punt.

Rule was again held in four plays and MC took over again at

mid-field with 5:20 left in the game. Richard Potts came in as quarterback with Cody Christian, and Brandt Bearden carrying the ball. Also seeing action was Cris Gwinn.

After eight plays MC punted to Rule, and three plays later Max Bearden intercepted a Bobcat pass at midfield. However two plays later MC fumbled the ball back to Rule, and the Bobcats, with the help of two penalties, scored from one yard out with seven seconds left in the game. Their try for extra points failed.

Shannon gained 209 yards on 29 carries, Moore had 20 yards on six plays; Luckett had 30 yards in eight carries; Barton had 23 yards, Sims had 15 yards; Winn had four; Christian had eight; Max Bearden had 15; and Shawn Bearden had eight.

Shawn Bearden attempted three passes, completed two for 59 yards and Max Bearden completed two of four passes for 17 yards.

Offensive players of the game were Craig Turner, Thomas Garst, Roy Thompson, Brent Campbell and Tim Shannon. The defensive standouts were Bill Luckett, Coke Barton, Shawn Bearden, Clayton Sims and Max Bearden.

The Matadors will travel to Throckmorton Friday night for another district game. "Throckmorton should be tougher than Rule, especially at home," Williams said. "They are not as fast as Rule, but they are a better balanced team."

Everyone is urged to make an effort to travel to Throckmorton and cheer for the Matadors.

City Files For Grant

The City of Matador is planning to file an application with the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1977.

A firm has been hired to determine a target area -- the area in Matador most eligible for the CDBG program. The firm will be working closely with Matador's Community Improvement and Planning Committee, but the "target area" will be the decision of the firm.

Under the CDBG program regulations, the city is eligible to apply for a Single Purpose Grant, up to a maximum of \$500,000, or a Comprehensive Grant, up to a maximum of \$800,000.

HUD is funding the program, meaning the money is available and if Matador does not get the grant, another

community will.

This same program has helped numerous small communities and the local planning committee feels this is the only way to obtain grant money needed. There will not be a rise in any local tax dollars under the program.

In the course of planning its CDBG application, the City will evaluate its housing and community needs and priorities to determine the type of CDBG grant to be requested, the amount of funds and a program of proposed activities. A door to door survey may be conducted by the Planning Committee at a later date.

Due to the limited amount of dollars available, all applicant cities are not funded each year. HUD evaluates each city's application using an established rating system which takes into account the applicant's needs, the impact of proposed projects and several other factors.

Education Has Vital Role In Civilization Survival

Representative Jack Hightower of Vernon also had high praise for the educators and their role in the preservation of civilization. Education is vital to survival, the congressman stressed.

The program which followed included presentation of the club's highest honor, the Lion of the Year award, which went to Lion Bill Durham. Lion Ronnie Vandiver, in charge of the presentation, invited the Lions Queen, Deanna Durham, to hand the plaque to her father. Receiving the Past-President's plaque was Lion Alan Bingham, with the current president, Lion Donnie Jackson

making the presentation. Both awards were for outstanding service and dedication of the recipients, to the club and its activities in the community.

After leading the assembly in singing "America," Richard Campbell sang several songs, closing with "The Star-Spangled Banner." He was accompanied at the piano by Lion Gerald

Pipkin. A new member, Jack Van Eaton was presented his membership credentials by Lion Bingham, and School Supt. Lion Charles Johnson introduced the school faculty members and their spouses.

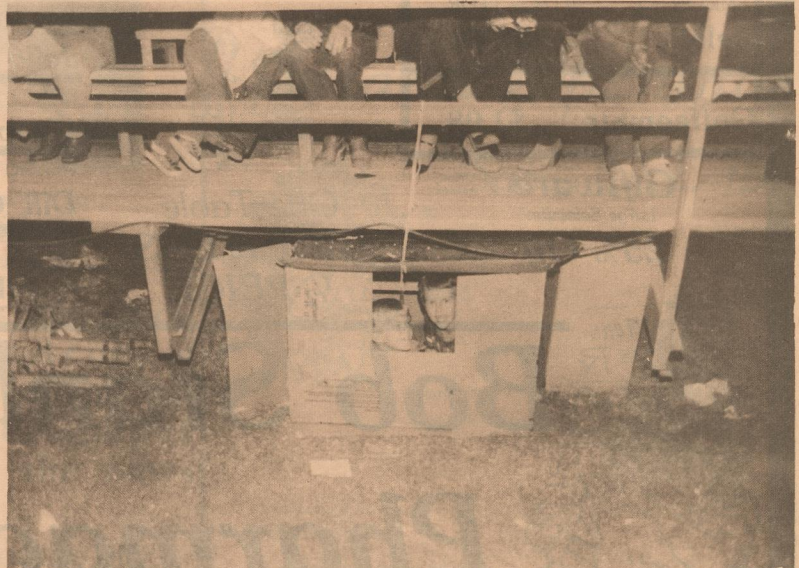

Congressman Hightower touched on national issues: "There are fears and we should be concerned. If there is a major catastrophe, things we depend on might break down. We must not have an atomic war. For the survival of society we must do what is necessary. We must preserve a strong domestic economy. We must not lose confidence in our ability to govern ourselves. Nothing is more important than education to understand the process of government."

It is very important that we have teachers—they are responsible for teaching the next generation. They can give so much to our support. I believe we will continue the march of progress if we have competent teachers. How very appropriate that a Lions Club should have a teacher-

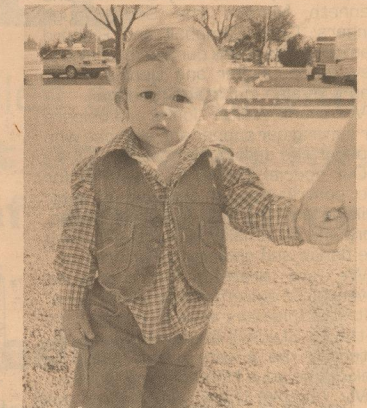

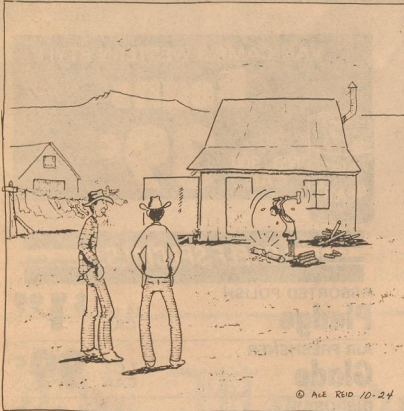

A bold plan recently unveiled by the General President of the Teamsters Union may make the American Dream of owning a home closer to reality for many people. Roy Williams, the union's head, suggested to President Reagan that home mortgages be financed through pension funds at rates well below the current market—perhaps as low as ten percent.

William's plan pinpoints the high cost of money today as the culprit in our "current sad housing situation." He agrees that there is ample money available at rates from 16 to 18 percent but concludes that this puts owning a home out of reach of all but those in the highest income brackets.

The Williams plan asks that the Employee Retirement Income Security Act of 1974 (ERISA) be amended to allow union pension fund trustees to lend money for home mortgages. His proposal would put mortgages in reach of middle-income earners but would also guarantee the integrity of the pension funds themselves.

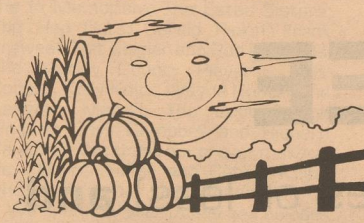
