Matadors Grab Big Victory In First District Game

The Motley County Matadors showed how good they are this year when they defeated a tough Crowell team 36-7 last Friday night.

"We had a good game against Crowell," Coach Danny Williams said. "They were pretty good but as the game wore on,

we tired them out."

With 4:53 left in the first quarter Darrell Moore put the Matadors on the scoreboard with a four yard run, but the extra point try was blocked.

In the second quarter Tim Shannon scored a touchdown with 8:22 left in the half, and Moore

scored the two point conversion, and MC led 14-0.

Then Crowell struck. They scored on a 60 yard pass play and kicked the extra to close the gap to 14-7.

Shannon broke away before halftime and scored again on a 26 yard run, with 3:36

left, and then he kicked the extra point putting MC out in front 28-7.

MC's final score came in the 4th quarter when quarterback Shawn Bearden threw an eight yard TD pass to Max Bearden with 5:01 left in the game. Shawn hit Max again for the two

point conversion, making the score 36-7.

"Offensive players of the week were Roy Thompson, John Russell, Max Bearden and Tim Shannon," Coach Williams said. "Defensive players were Darrell Moore, Coke Barton, Shawn Bearden and Bill Luckett. Overall the team did a fine job."

Shannon rushed 34 times for 260 yards, three TD's and kicked two extra points. Darrell Moore carried 10 times for 24 yards, with some big gains called back on penalties. Moore scored one TD and one two point conversion.

The offense had a total of 323 yards.

"We play Rule this Friday on Homecoming," Williams said. "It should be a good game. Rule has the potential to be better than Crowell. They have a good overall team, and we are going to have to contain their fast backs."

The game will begin at 7:30 at Burleson Field.

Jr. High Mavericks Defeat Crowell Here

Motley County Junior High Mavericks defeated Crowell Junior High last Thursday 30-0, increasing their season record to two wins and one loss.

In the first quarter Johnny Taylor ran 15 yards on a sweep play to score for MCJH, but the extra point try failed.

Also in the first quarter the Mavericks scored on a 60 yard pass from Jeffery Burkes to Rodney Doran. Burkes also passed to Doran for the two point conversion to put Motley ahead 14-0.

In the second quarter Taylor scored again on a 15 yard power sweep. The conversion failed and at halftime MCJH led 20-0.

In the third quarter Mark Roys ran up the

middle for a 40 yard touchdown, and Burkes ran over for two points to increase the lead 28-0.

In the fourth quarter the whole right side of the defensive line sacked Crowell in the end zone for a two point safety, giving MCJH a 30-0 win.

The Mavericks had another touchdown in the game called back on a penalty. George Mangrum had scored on a running play.

The Mavericks will play Silverton JH here tonight (Thursday) at 5 p.m. Three weeks ago the Mavericks defeated Silverton 20-6. Two weeks ago Valley JH defeated the Mavericks 14-8, but Coach Billy Wilson said he felt MCJH will beat Valley when the two teams meet again next week.

Paul Hobby Visits Here Tuesday

Paul Hobby, son of Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, stopped in Matador Tuesday during a campaign swing through the Panhandle for his father.

A graduate of Virginia University, Paul played linebacker for them and was president of Delta Kappa Epsilon fraternity his senior year.

"I am traveling across Texas, listening to the people, and relaying their concern about the future of the Lt. Governor," Paul said.

In 1972 Bill Hobby won the Democratic nomination for Lieutenant Governor against a large field of candidates and then was elected to a two year term that November. He was re-elected overwhelmingly to four-year terms in 1974 and 1978.

In his present office he has served as the chairman of the National Conference of Lieutenant Governors and on the Council of State Governments. His

additional state responsibilities include chairmanship of the Legislative Budget Board, which submits spending recommendations to the Legislature, and the Texas Legislative Council, which conducts research on legislation. He is co-chairman of the Texas Energy and Natural Resources Advisory Council.

This year he is a member of a legislative committee conducting a full-scale study on improvement of law enforcement.

Another such interim panel -- the Special Committee on Higher Education Financing -- led to one of Hobby's most recent accomplishments. As chairman of that committee he helped mold a program for higher education that included faculty salary

improvements to offset a 17% drop in purchasing power during the last decade.

As presiding officer of the Senate and a skilled legislator in his own right, Hobby has given public and higher education first priority throughout his service. More than half of the state's tax dollar is now devoted to education. Hobby has placed equal

A candidate for Democratic Representative to the Vermont Legislature is a former Matador resident and graduate of Matador High School, class of 1940.

Mrs. Brewster Baldwin, the former Marie Hunsucker won in the primary election, Sept. 14, and is now campaigning for the office, subject to the general election on November 2. She has been interested in politics for a number of years and has served as president of the

League of Women Voters. A resident of Addison County, Vermont, 24 years and of Cornwall 21 years, her past positions also have included Friends of the Cornwall School, Cornwall Zoning Board, and Addison County United Way Board. She was employed 11 years on the Executive staff of the Vermont Girl Scout Council.

Currently, Mrs. Baldwin is a volunteer legislative aide, 1981 House session and Member Advisory Council, Governor's Commission on the Statue of Women.

Mrs. Baldwin is a graduate of Texas Tech University with a B. A. degree in Education. She began a four year career as classroom teacher in Corpus Christi, where she met her future husband. Mr. Baldwin has taught geology at Middlebury College since 1958. They have four grown children and a granddaughter.

Although not born in Matador, Mrs. Baldwin can claim roots here. Her maternal grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Moore were Motley County pioneers, and her mother, the late Charlotte Moore Hunsucker was born here.

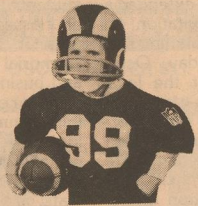

Spelling Bee Director Named For Motley Co.

Mrs. Edith Timmons of Northfield has been named to serve as Motley County's Spelling Bee director for 1983. She has served as director since 1964.

The National Spelling Bee is sponsored nationally by the Scripps-Howard Newspapers and in the area by the Amarillo Globe-News and West Texas State University, Canyon. Gene Parker, director of placement at the university, and bee coordinator, announces the continuation of the educational program for the 35th year for public and parochial school students.

Rules, established by the national sponsors, say that no student who will be older than 16 by June 1 of 1983, or in a grade higher than the eighth, will be allowed to enter, beginning at the classroom level.

Each director will set the date for his/her respective elimination event and report the winner(s) to the newspaper no later than April 9, 1983.

The district contest to be held in Amarillo on April 30, 1983, will include champs from a 45-county, four-state area. The Bee will be in the afternoon, beginning at 1:30 p.m. in the auditorium of Stephen F. Austin Junior High School, 1808 Wimberly.

In Amarillo all of the champs will be vying

for a trip to Washington, D.C. for June, beginning on the 6th, plus other numerous gifts from the sponsors.

Once again the Amarillo Globe-News is making available the study book, "Words of the Champions" for 40 cents. The newly designed book, containing in excess of 3,000 words, plus 550 new ones over last year, is available to any principal, superintendent or contestant. The book is not available by mail in the City of Amarillo and the City of Canyon.

Orders should be addressed to the Spelling Bee Editor, Amarillo Globe-News, Box 2091, Amarillo, Texas 79166.

The 1981 and 1982 regional winners came from Clovis, N.M., representing Curry County. Jason Trobaugh competed in the national bee in 1981 and Chris Russell in 1982. Chris finished in 32nd place, among 112 national finalists.

The district sponsors also promote a Junior Bee for students in the sixth and lower grades. These county winners will be invited to Amarillo as guests of the sponsors on April 30 and will be given special recognition. It is not unusual for a Junior County winner to also claim the Senior County championship.

Director To Be Elected For SWCD Dist. Board

An election for a director to serve in Zone IV on the Upper Pease Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for October 8 in the Roaring Springs Cafe announced W. H. Marshall, chairman of the board. The election will be held from 8 to 10 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district.

Zone IV of the district includes an area from a line beginning at Matador east along the Paducah highway to the

county line and south along the Dickens Highway to the county line.

Current members of the board of directors of the Upper Pease SWCD are W. H. Marshall, James Bearden, Coy Franks, W. D. Lipscomb and H. R. Jameson.

The purpose of the Upper Pease SWCD, with headquarters in Matador is to promote soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights to landowners.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner and operator.

emphasis on improvement of teaching quality and the extension of equal educational opportunity to all Texans.

Hobby led the fight to keep Texas highways the best in the nation and help the state's fast-growing cities cope with the traffic congestion and inadequate arteries and bridges. He was one of the first state officials to warn of an "inhumane and dangerous situation" in Texas prisons because of severe overcrowding. In the last legislative session he led efforts to fund two new units in the Department of Corrections. Long recognized as an expert on welfare reform, Hobby also has worked for better services for the handicapped and for older Texans. He has strongly supported more effective programs for the mentally ill and the mentally retarded.

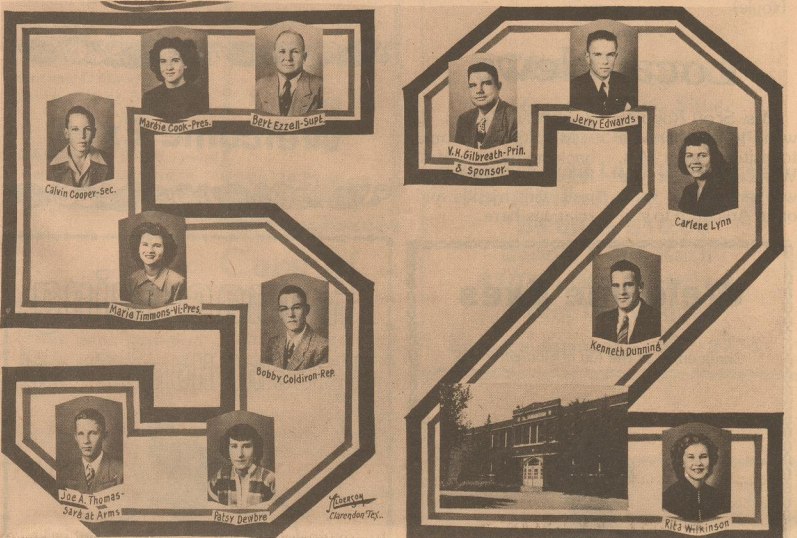
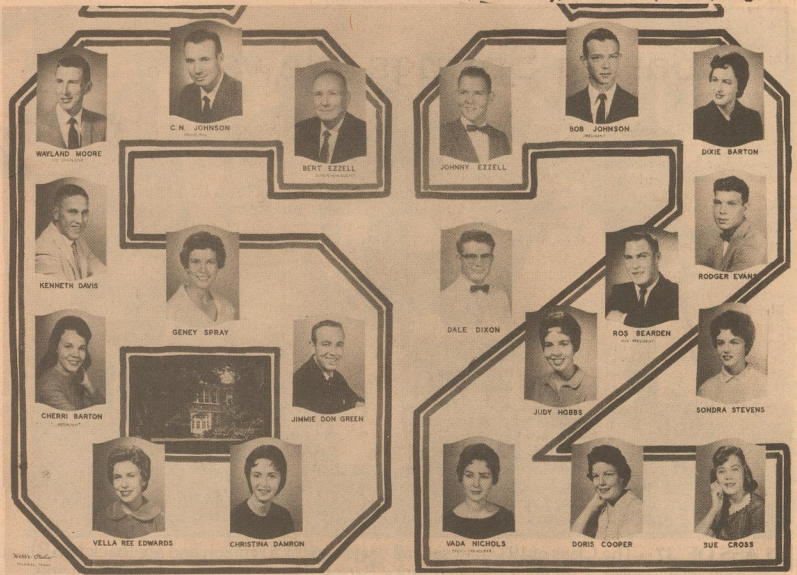
Significantly, state government during Hobby's tenure as Lieutenant Governor has operated in the black while meeting its responsibilities without new or increased state taxes. Texas retains its enviable record of avoiding a state income tax, either personal or corporate, which is a prime attraction for new businesses and greater job opportunities for Texans.

"People resent the

intrusion of government into their lives. Most of us want government to produce the needed services and do it on the most cost-effective basis."

Hobby has taken that position in developing a better process for budgeting and the delivery of services. He instigated zero-based budgeting in the appropriations process, bringing about a more sophisticated way of ranking the state's needs and funding programs aimed directly at those needs; the new system also identifies outmoded programs which can then be eliminated. "We know how state tax dollars are spent much more accurately than anyone did eight years ago," he says. "We follow up and see how effectively the money is spent after it is appropriated," as part of his campaign for better government, Hobby has worked to reduce unnecessary regulations, contending that state efforts in this regard should be copied by the federal government.

Hobby's wife, the former Diana Poteat Stallings, has been equally active as a writer and editor. They have four children -- Laura, Paul, Andrew and Katherine. The Hobby family has been active in the Episcopal Church and in educational and civic programs.

A diplomatic correspondent on the Wall Street Journal, Washington bureau, Mrs. House, in April of this year was in Jordan and was a dinner guest of King Hussein and Queen Noor. From there she traveled to Baghdad and went into Iran, where the Iraqis and Iranians were fighting. She also visited an Iraqi POW camp.

She had previously been on assignment in Jordan, at which time she had interviewed the king's younger brother, Prince Hassan.

Her political assignments have taken her to Egypt, Syria, Israel, Saudi Arabia, China, Japan, New Zealand and England, to mention a few. With other press corps personnel, she has accompanied former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger, former Vice President Walter F. Mondale, Energy Secretary

Schlesinger, Special U.S. envoy Philip Habib, current Secretary of State George F. Shultz and other dignitaries on their visits to heads of state.

Mrs. House is a regular guest on ABC, "This Week with David Brinkley," CBS, "Face the Nation," and NBC "Meet the Press." Her most recent television appearance was on August 22 when Secretary Shultz was interviewed on Meet the Press.

In conjunction with her work, Mrs. House entered Harvard University the first of September for a four-month study of Russian culture and as moderator for a series of lectures. On Sept. 16 she was one of seven Institute of Politics Fellows to appear in a forum of the Kennedy School of Government in Cambridge.

Mrs. House, (in private live Mrs. Arthur House) is a native of Matador, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ted Elliott, and is a graduate of Matador High School, class of

Study New Anti-Cancer Drug

A new pharmaceutical firm in Israel is among a dozen companies in the world working on fibroblast interferon, a human protein that helps fight viruses and has been touted by some scientists as a potential anti-cancer drug.

The three-year-old firm is also involved in the production and marketing of human growth hormones and in researching the use of an embryonic protein for potential treatment of diseases engendered by the body's immune reactions to itself.

Working together with the prestigious Eeizmann Institute of Science, Interpharm Laboratories are in the clinical trial stages of developing fibroblast interferon. The interferon substance is synthesized in minuscule quantities by most body cells when alerted to a viral infection in a nearby tissue. Secreted into the tissue, it allows for biochemical changes that increase the tissue's resistance to the virus.

In Israel and other countries, it is being clinically tested as a possible cure for eye infections, caused by adenovirus, herpes, some forms of hepatitis and conjunctivitis.



Israel scientists are working at research that may spell exciting news in fighting a number of diseases.

Interpharm scientists believe that careful research over a long period of time may yet demonstrate interferon's usefulness in controlling cancer.

Clinically produced interferon is not available for sale to the public but last year, Interpharm began selling small quantities to research institutes.

The firm is marketing human growth hormones, extracted from post-mortem pituitary glands, that allow children suffering from pituitary malfunction to achieve their genetic height.

In yet another project, Interpharm is working with Hadassah-Hebrew University Medical Center on the use of a protein produced by the human fetus that may be useful in fighting autoimmune diseases that often lead to loss of muscle control.


