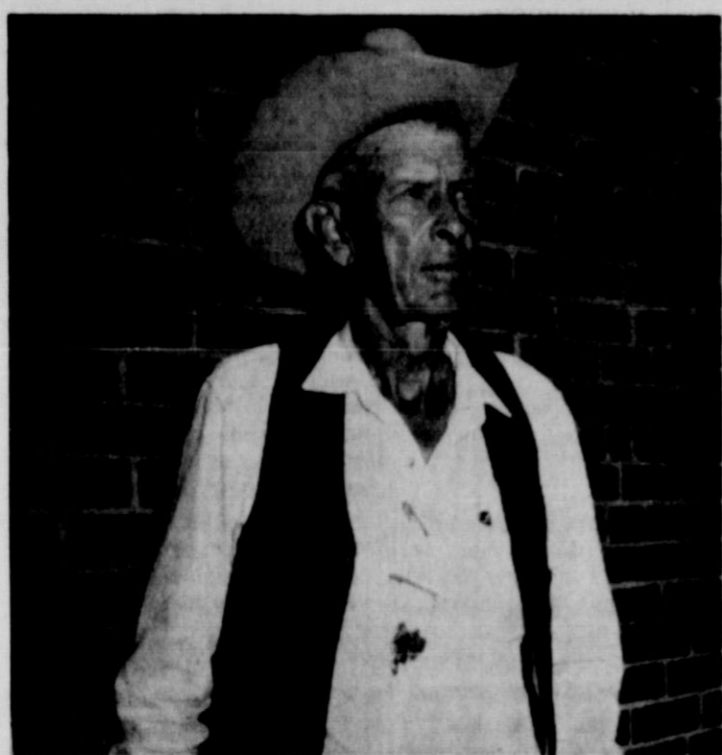
Born in Navarro County October 6, 1886, Noble Pierce was six years of age when his father died. He came to West Texas in 1914 and first worked on the LK Ranch, north of Paducah. Later he drove a covered wagon for a man to Plainview. At Crosbyton, he broke and out of a job, he borrowed money from a merchant and bought a cotton sack and picked cotton until he could get on his feet.

His first work in Matador was helping pour the concrete for the Homer Sheats Building. Later he got a job as a cowboy. He has worked for the Swenson, DDD (Waggoner), Three Circles and Buckle L, but most of his life in the saddle was as a cowboy on the Matadors.

Flu Hits Range Wagon The war was over but the flu was raging in the winter of 1918. Big John Southworth was wagon boss and Ed D. Smith was cook. A herd of 3300 yearling steers and heifers was penned at Russellville awaiting shipment.

The wagon was camped on Dutchman, when Big John couldn't move from his bed roll. Slim heated rocks all night, wrapped them in some old newspapers in the chuckwagon, and kept them at Southworth's feet. He sent a message to John Jackson, manager, who sent a car for the ailing wagon boss. When the car arrived, the cook had been struck by the flu.

So Slim Pierce became wagon boss, cook and cowboy. He had seven men left but they loaded the cattle, with the aid of some neighboring Afton farmers and the railroad crew. Pierce first went to Arizona in 1919, but he returned again to work for the Matadors. The flu

## Cowboy's Memory Refreshed by Visit

AFTER 44 YEARS Noble "Matador Slim" Pierce returned to the range where he worked half a century ago. Despite the many changes in the country and the life he knew as a cowboy, his memories were refreshed. Slim Pierce, who will be 73 next week, has changed less than the country.

He continues to buy Bull Durham by the carton, and holds the tag in his mouth to tighten the strings, as he did 50 years ago. His love for horses has never diminished, and a good horse would always turn his head quicker than a pretty girl. Once in Arizona he was on the verge of matrimony but the girl told him the horses would have to go. Slim remained single. He washed dishes in an Arizona Harvey House to buy oats for his favorite horse, "Schweitzer," until he could get a job on a ranch. The horse was named for his friend, the late Houston Schweitzer, famous Matador saddle maker, whose handcrafted masterpieces now sell for much more than their original cost.

The high school students have been given the privilege of ringing the church bell at First Baptist Church each time the team wins, and residents unable to attend the game, learned of the victory as the bell pealed out the news Saturday night.

Lance Jameson, Matador Brand (school newspaper) sports editor told it this way: Saturday night was the night for the offensive. Matador had 19 first downs to Meadow's nine and gained 411 yards to Meadow's 146. The offensive line was also due its share of glory for opening up the line and blocking out the defenders.

Halfback Darrell Cruse scored the first touchdown for the game in the first quarter from the 4-yard line. The try for the extra points failed.

Meadow Scores Touchdown In the second quarter, Kenneth Marshall scored on a one yard drive and Broncho's halfback, David Watson went over the goal line for Meadow's only touchdown with the try for the extra point no good. The half time score was 12-6.
