## Doctor Not Coming To Motley Co. Clinic

Dr. Shelton Jackson is not going to open a medical practice here after all. That announcement came this week from the Motley County Clinic.

It was earlier reported that Dr. Jackson would begin medical practice at the clinic, was moving to Matador, and might even purchase the clinic at a later date.

However, a spokesman for the clinic said Tuesday that Dr. Jackson had changed his demands, and because of those changes the South Plains Health Provider Organization, Inc., and

the Motley County Clinic could not come to an agreement.

"This is no fault of the county or the clinic," the spokesman said. "Dr. Jackson changed his approach and made some very unreasonable demands on the clinic. This is regrettable, and the clinic staff is sorry, but they will keep trying."

Dr. Charles Hudson, D.O., Dr. Robert Brodtkin, D.P.M., and Roy Tippin, R.N., will still be on duty at the clinic. Dr. Brodtkin's next office day will be January 19, 1983.

William M. (Mel) Pope of Lubbock has been named as Assistant District Engineer of District Five, State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, Ben Alley, District Engineer, announced last week.

District Five covers a 17 county area with the headquarters office in Lubbock.

Mr. Pope has been serving as District Maintenance Engineer for the District since May 1, 1972.

Mr. Pope was born and reared in Motley County, and graduated from high school in Flomot. He is a graduate of Texas Tech University, with a Civil Engineering Degree.

After graduating from Texas Tech, Mr. Pope began employment at White Sands Proving Ground at Las Cruces, New Mexico, in the Photographic Measurements Section. Uncle Sam called in 1953, and after basic training with the U.S. Army, assignment was made to Aberdeen Proving Ground, Aberdeen, Maryland.

Mr. Pope accepted a position with the Texas Highway Department (now State Department of Highways and Public Transportation) on January 1, 1955, in Brownfield. He has held positions of Engineering Assistant and Resident Engineer in the Brownfield Residency.

## Three Matadors Earn All-South Plains Rank

Danny Williams knows a good thing when he sees it. When he took over as head coach at Motley County before the 1982 season, he installed a new defense but left the Matadors' high-powered offense alone.

Williams knew the formation was tailor-made for the Matadors' mammoth linemen and their prize tailback, Tim Shannon.

"We're going to use the same system on offense; the terminology is the only thing that will change," Williams said.

Shannon—who had taken over the tailback duties when last year's All-South Plains Player of the Year, Harvey Lee, was slowed by a broken hand—gained 1,160 yards on 164 carries while scoring 18 touchdowns to also gain a spot on the All-South Plains squad.

As a senior, the 5-11, 170-pounder took up right where he left off, rambling for 2,119 yards—the only area player to gain more than 2,000 yards during the regular season—on 267 carries and scoring 32 touchdowns during the regular season as Motley County captured its second consecutive district championship. Shannon also followed in Lee's footsteps as the Avalanche-Journal's All South Plains Player of the Year.

The Matadors, a state semifinalist last season, did not stroll through the league standings in 1982. Knox City, an outstanding squad, was breathing down Motley County's neck until the bitter end.

Thanks to Shannon, who carried the ball 30 times for 284 yards and all four touchdowns in a

28-0 rout, the end of the regular season for the Greyhounds was bitter.

Despite suffering from bruised ribs, Shannon ran for an additional 325 yards on 48 carries and scored three touchdowns in two playoff games.

Joining their teammate on the Class 1A elite team are a pair of standouts who opened many holes for Shannon this fall—guard John Russell, a 5-10, 200-pound senior; and fullback Bill Luckett, a 6-0, 170-pound senior who was named to the team as a defensive lineman.

Russell anchors the All-South Plains offensive line, which also includes Lazbuddie center Jeff Jesko, a 6-1, 170-pound senior; Ropes guard Calvin Glenn, a 6-0, 185-pound senior; Vega tackle Dale Marchman, a 6-1, 215-pound senior; and Whiteface tackle Keven Bentley, a 6-2, 235-pound senior.

That talented line would certainly open holes for Shannon and fellow super backs Robbie Creswell of Sands, a 5-7, 170-pound senior, and Danny Venhaus of Happy, a 5-11, 155-pound senior.

Creswell was the area's second-leading Class 1A rusher behind Shannon with 1,431 yards on 220 carries, which was good for 18 touchdowns, while Venhaus totaled 898 yards and 14 touchdowns on only 138 carries in nine regular season games.

Venhaus' twin brother, Donnie, a 5-11, 155-pound senior, heads the elite team as the All-South Plains quarterback. He was the area's third-leading passer, yardage-wise, completing 44 of 112 passes—only four were

intercepted—for 795 yards and seven touchdowns.

Venhaus was the Cowboys' general on the field, but the real master-mind of Happy's first appearance in the playoffs since 1971 was Bill Hulsey.

In his fourth year as head Cowboy, Hulsey turned the Happy program from a 4-6, fourth-place finish in 1981 into an 8-2—6-1 in District 2-1A North Zone play—league runner-up. Hulsey thus earned the All-South Plains Coach of the Year honors.

Joe Potter, who ran and kicked for 68 points as Vega captured the 2-1A North Zone championship, is the All-South Plains kicker.

Joining Shannon with the distinction of being named All-South Plains for the second consecutive year are defenders Mike Taylor, a 6-0, 210-pound senior linebacker from Smyer; Stacy Price, a 5-11, 175-pound senior linebacker from Valley; and Shane Reagan, a 6-0, 160-pound senior defensive back from Silverton.

Price was selected to the elite squad as an offensive lineman in 1981.

In addition to Luckett, the remaining members of the All-South Plains defensive line are George Hochstein, a 5-11, 195-pound senior from Nazareth; Lance Edgemon, a 6-0, 237-pound senior from Anton; and Mark Lust, a 6-0, 170-pound senior from Lazbuddie.

Robert Reyna, a 5-8, 193-pound senior from Ropes, joins Taylor and Price in the All-South Plains linebacking corps.

Reyna's teammate, Scott Satterwhite, a 6-0, 145-pound senior, was a defensive back on Ropes' outstanding defense in 1982. He, along with Reagan, Vega's Dwayne Vogler, a 5-9, 165-pound senior; and Whiteface's Ricky Jackson, a 5-7, 146-pound senior, make up the All-South Plains secondary.

Keith Spears, who doubled as Wilson's quarterback and averaged 35 yards a punt on 48 kicks, is the All-South Plains punter.

## Local Cagers Have Difficulties

The Motley County varsity girls basketball team won their first game of the Silverton Tournament last Friday but lost two games on Saturday.

Led by Darla Dempsey with 18 points, the Lady Matadors defeated Claude 56-45. Renee Renfro had 12 points and Dixie Nimmo scored 10 in that game.

The girls lost to Hart 35-49 in the second game Saturday morning, then were defeated

by Valley 44-46 Saturday afternoon.

On December 7, the junior varsity girls defeated Paducah JV 29-26 with Danielle Wittler turning in a 10 point game. The varsity girls defeated Paducah 40-35 the same day with Dempsey getting 13 points and Renfro and Tracey Jackson each scoring 10.

The JV boys lost to Paducah JV 26-79, while the varsity boys lost 53-56.

The only frontier left us is science. We are gratified that the Reagan administration recognizes this fact and is willing to do something about it.

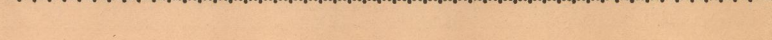

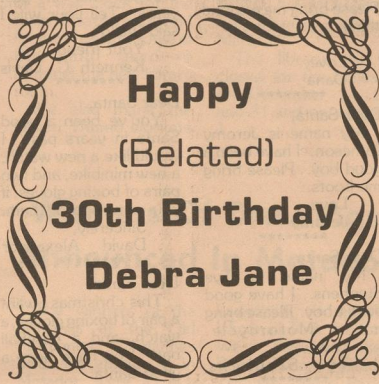

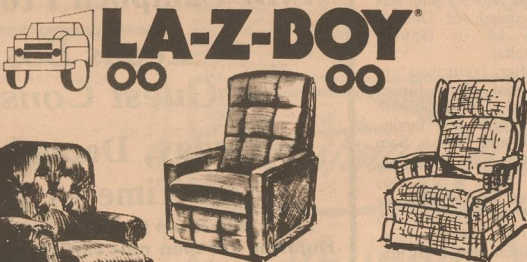

## Peanut Butter Flavors Brittle



Peanut brittle, a traditional candy favorite, is ideal for gift-giving and to keep on hand for the holidays. This new variation calls for super chunk peanut butter in place of peanuts.

**PEANUT BUTTER BRITTLE**

2 cups sugar	1/4 cup Skippy super chunk peanut butter
1/2 cup light corn syrup	1 teaspoon baking soda
1/2 cup water	

Grease 2 large baking sheets. Place on wire racks. In heavy 1 1/2-quart saucepan stir together sugar, corn syrup and water. Stirring constantly, bring to boil over medium heat. Cook without stirring until temperature reaches 300°F on candy thermometer, or until syrup when dropped into cold water forms threads etc., or until brittle. Stir in peanut butter until well blended. Remove from heat. Quickly but gently stir in baking soda. Immediately pour onto baking sheets; do not spread. Cool 3 to 5 minutes or just until cool enough to handle; take the candy by the edges, and lifting it slightly, pull as thin as possible. Cool. Break into irregular pieces. Store in tightly covered container. Makes about 1 1/2 pounds.

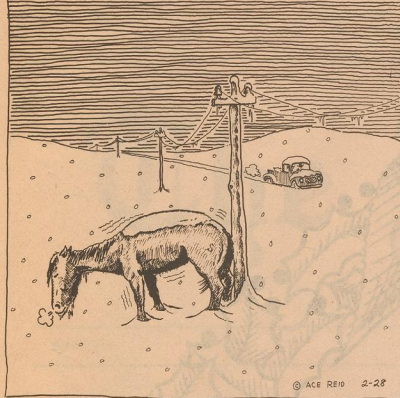
