Emergency Alert System Tested But Not Tried

Have you heard strange voices or beeping recently on your television set?

Need not worry, it is only the Civil Emergency Alert System being tested by the Matador Volunteer Fire Department.

Installation on the alert system was completed Friday, July 16, and tested for several hours that day.

"The system will be used to give Matador residents early or immediate warnings of severe weather, or to alert the public of hazardous road conditions during snow storms or of water over

roads during times of heavy rains," Fire Chief Rodney Williams said.

The system works on the phone lines from the station to the transmitting tower out of town, but messages are relayed to the public over the TV sets. When the system is put into operation, a fireman dials in a code into a red "hot line" phone at the fire station. The operator then broadcasts the emergency message which comes out over all television sets which are on the cable.

"The emergency message will start out with a beeping tone

which lasts about five seconds," Williams said. "It blocks out the TV picture and a voice will come on the TV, instructing or informing the public about the current weather situation."

Williams said the message, which is transmitted by the fireman at the station, will only come out over TV sets which are turned on, and it will not turn on a set.

"We've raised \$1700 of the \$2000 needed to pay for the system," Williams said. "The system is paid for by donations which are earmarked for the

system. This is a one time cost. Donations are still being accepted."

The fire chief said the system came about and was installed thanks to the efforts of the Matador City Council and Matador Cablevision.

The system will be tested periodically, probably once each month to make sure all the lines are still hooked up, so if you hear the TV beeping or a voice say "testing", it is only the fire department insuring Matador residents have a safer place to live.

117 Attend Reunion Of Pioneer Family

The descendants of Al and W. B. Barton held their first Family Reunion, Sunday, July 18 at the Community Center building in Flomot. The one hundred and seventeen who registered enjoyed meeting family members, reminiscing with those they knew, good food and they learned about the Barton heritage.

Al Barton was foreman of the "F" Ranch in Motley, Briscoe, Floyd and Hall Counties under Charles Goodnight and remained with the ranch through administration of three ranch managers. He established his own ranch 16 miles north of Matador in 1886. He is mentioned in the books, "Charles Goodnight" by J. Evetts Haley and "The No Gun Man of Texas" by Laura V. Hammer.

Mr. Barton had three wives, two preceded him in death, Mollie Moreland Barton and Mollie Sams Barton. He and his first wife had three sons, Wilburn Burr, Sam and Clayton, all deceased.

He and the second Mrs. Barton were parents of Alfred, Charlie, Milda, all deceased and John Barton of Flomot who attended the Reunion and told some amusing stories of past incidents.

The third Mrs. Al Barton was a widow, Addie Bishop Seay. She and Mrs. Barton became the parents of Leora (Mrs. J. N. Scrivner of Alpine,

Calif.), Dick, deceased, Katherine (Mrs. Pat King of Matador) and Wilson of Flomot. Katherine and Mr. and Mrs. (Sibyl Scaff) Wilson Barton attended the reunion.

After Mr. Barton's death in 1921, Addie Barton remained at the ranch until her death in 1950.

Wilburn Burr Barton moved to Motley County in 1886 with his father, Al Barton. He was the oldest child in the family. He lived in the Flomot community eighty years where he farmed and ranched. His wife, Ella Orr, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sample "Samp" Orr, moved with her family to Motley County in 1891. Five of their eight children attended the Reunion. They are Opal, (Mrs. Wade Martin), Eliza, (Mrs. Crabil C. Jones), and Mary Ellen "Dude" Barton of Flomot; Allie (Mrs. Clay Hart) of Matador and Mollie (Mrs. W. E. Burleson) of Floydada. France Barton, of Matador, a son, was unable to attend. Clayton and Millard Barton are deceased.

Local people are invited to support the tournament and eat at the concession stand. All proceeds will be used to benefit the Motley County athletic department.

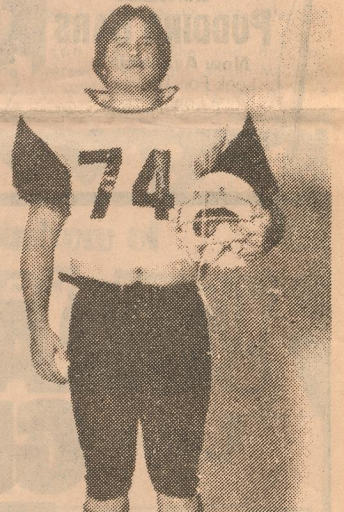
Youth Receives Degree Of Lone Star Farmer
