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### Salary Increase Reduced By Upcoming Legislation

A state education leader voiced concern this week that campaign promises made to strengthen the quality of public schools in Texas already are being compromised. Mike Morrow, executive director of the 35,000 member Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE), cited proposed cutbacks in Teacher Retirement system (TRS) funding and lower percentage increases for teacher salaries.

Commenting on the Legislative Budget Board (LBB) recommended cuts in the salary increases requested by the State Board of Education,

Morrow said, "These cuts will definitely make it impossible to achieve stability among the ranks of those who have dedicated their lives to the future of Texas. We can't build quality education by verbalizing support on one hand while fiscally raiding it with the other."

Just one month after the election, during which the general public as well as the education community was led to expect that education would be a priority with the 68th Legislature, the LBB recommended paring the state's contribution to TRS by \$210 million. Recommendations include reducing the employee contribution to TRS from its present level of 6.65 percent to 6 percent and reducing the state's matching contribution from 8.5 percent to 7.1 percent.

The Education Agency's request for a 6.8 percent increase in teachers' salaries each year of the next biennium was reduced to 5.5 percent by the LBB in its final recommendations for the upcoming legislative session.

"The general public as well as Texas educators

expect campaign promises to be kept," Morrow said. "We can only hope that efforts to improve public education will receive the same priority by the elected members of the Texas House and Senate as was demon-

strated during the November elections."

ATPE supports local control of public schools and is not affiliated with a national organization. The association is against collective bargaining for school personnel.

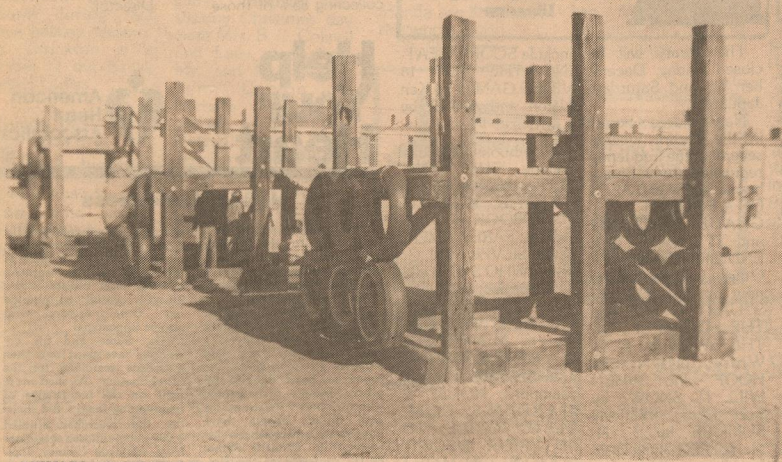

## Texas Farm Bureau Largest In Nation

Texas Farm Bureau, now the largest state Farm Bureau in the nation with 306,359 member families, has made significant strides during the decade since Warren Newberry first became executive director of the farm organization.

"In 1972, when I made my first report, we had 136,943 members. In 1982, we have 306,359 member families, a gain of 169,416," Newberry noted during his annual report to TFB members.

Not only does TFB rank as number one in total membership among state Farm Bureaus, but it showed the largest single-year gain in Farm Bureau history with a 30,112 increase, Newberry said. It marked the first year TFB ranked first. TFB was the first state ever to top 300,000.

Illinois FB is second with more than 304,000. TFB has also made significant advances in four other areas—legislation, services to members, Farm Bureau programs and finances, Newberry said.

Newberry cited the passage of Proposition 3, a constitutional amendment to exempt implements of husbandry from ad valorem taxes, as the primary state legislative achievement in 1982.

"This exemption of implements of husbandry will save farmers and ranchers \$4.5 million each year from now on," Newberry said.

TFB improved its services to members with the establishment of the Texas Farm Bureau Rural Health Association, Newberry said.

"We changed carriers to The Travelers. We put the sale of the program in the hands of the agency force," Newberry stated. Since October, 1981, the group has doubled from 30,000 to 60,000. This includes the over 65 group and 13,000 new contracts, Newberry added.

The Safemark group purchase program has also come a great distance in the past 10 years. Whereas, \$9,596,330 in Safemark products were sold in 1972, there were \$34,956,570 in total sales in 1982—nearly a 400 percent increase in a decade, Newberry reported.

That occurred in spite of the four-month-long strike at the General Tire Plant in Waco. During July alone, sales exceed \$4 million, Newberry said.

The insurance program posted impressive showings in 1982, too, Newberry said. Whereas in 1972 there were 270 agents, in 1982, 605 agents were on the sales force. Life sales in 1982 exceeded \$1 billion in coverage. There are 264,984 auto and 181,143 fire insurance policies in force.

One of the TFB programs is the Commodity Activities Division will 11 state

committees and 419 county committees. The program began in 1974.

The Young Farmers and Ranchers program included one-year's free use of a pickup to the person chosen as the Outstanding Young Farmer and Rancher for 1982.

Ben Dieterich Jr. and his wife, Lou Ann, of Riesel were the winners. The pickup was furnished by Friendly Chevro-

let of Dallas.

The youth activities include queen, talent and free enterprise speech. There were 71 contestants from 57 counties in the speech contest.

Some 50,000 people in 82 counties attended demonstrations in the TFB safety program. New presentations were developed on safety with anhydrous ammonia, pesticides and grain bins. Two

seminars dealing with farm labor safety were held in the Rio Grande Valley.

The TFB information department also made advances. The TFB broadcast services reported some 14,041 calls from radio stations for the two daily recorded reports. Twelve video-taped TV reports were carried on 214 newscasts. Forty-three news releases were sent out and 1,390

clippings were received from the news clip service.

Twenty-one area news conferences on the farm crisis were conducted for state and county Farm Bureau officials during May and June. The monthly publication, TEXAS AGRICULTURE, circulated 3.7 million copies in 1982 and its circulation topped 300,000 for the first time.

### About the House

#### Meals For Two

Preparing a meal for one or two often poses a problem, because most recipes are designed for four or more people. That usually means leftovers for the next two or three days. But many dishes just don't lend themselves to reuse. Three days of Chicken Kiev might jade even the least demanding palate.

Reducing the ingredients in a recipe to make a meal for one or two often can lead to problems. Measurements may not be easily divided. Recipes may call for an ingredient which comes only in a large can or package. Using partial cans or packages may cause waste or unnecessary expense.

Spices and other flavorings are particularly difficult to divide, because of the relationship of flavor impact to recipe size. For example, a teaspoon of salt divided in half does not necessarily equal a half-teaspoon, as any cook will tell you. Usually it's less.

What to do? You could do a lot of experimenting, but that's expensive in both time and money, and a body tends to taste of the same dish after three or four repeats. What we need is a sure-fire, one-time winner that will solve a lot of the taste and leftover problems.

Is there an answer? Yes... small cans of broiled in butter mushrooms packed in their own broth, such as the BinB brand. They're more flavorful than unprepared fresh mushrooms, and add a delicate flavor to cooked dishes and salads. They're easier to use because they require no preparation. Be careful about canned mushrooms packed in brine... the extra salt may destroy the recipe's seasoning balance.

The best part of all is that canned mushrooms come packed in small and smaller cans (ideal for one- or two-person meals) and are either whole, sliced or chopped. Toss the contents of a 3-ounce can of sliced mushrooms (drained) into a casserole or into a meatloaf. Replace liquid called for in the recipe with the can's buttery broth contents. Save one or two mushrooms to garnish. Breakfasts take on an extra dimension with the drained contents of a 3-ounce can of mushrooms folded in the center of an omelet. Season lightly to make the most of the delicate mushroom flavors.

Casseroles, meats, salads, anything you can devise, there's hardly a dish that won't be enhanced by the elegant flavor of mushrooms.

### Help Your Heart



#### Holiday Loneliness

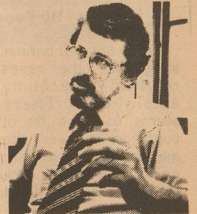
The holiday season is a great time to get together with relatives and friends. Such gatherings may have a beneficial effect on our hearts if they occur regularly.

Recent scientific evidence suggests that people who have close friends and family ties and belong to social and religious groups may be less prone to heart disease and other illnesses than people who are loners. "Relationships with other people have important consequences for health," S. Leonard Syme, Ph.D., professor at the University of California School of Public Health, Berkeley, said at a recent American Heart Association conference.

His research team's efforts are directed at preventing heart disease. The problem with prevention is that the known risk factors — high levels of cholesterol in the blood, high blood pressure, and smoking — while important, leave many cases of

heart disease unexplained, Dr. Syme said. Only 10 percent of men with two or more of the risk factors actually develop heart disease over a 10 year period, he pointed out. Other factors must also be important.

Dr. Syme and his co-workers have spent more than a decade searching for the other factors. To shed more light on the importance of maintaining family and social ties, the researchers studied 7,000 people chosen at random from Alameda County, California. The scientists found that those who were classified as socially isolated had death rates two to three times higher than those who were more socially involved — independent of other factors such as age, sex, diet, smoking, obesity, social class, medical care.

The idea that social isolation somehow lowers a person's resistance to disease may help explain several findings made by other scientists over the past 10 years or so. Rates of disease are known to be higher among people who change jobs and move from one community to another. Another well-established finding is that divorced, widowed and single people have higher disease rates than married people.

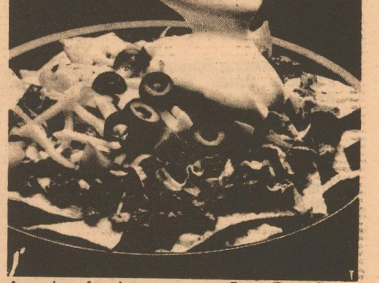

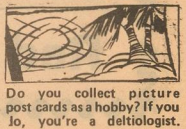

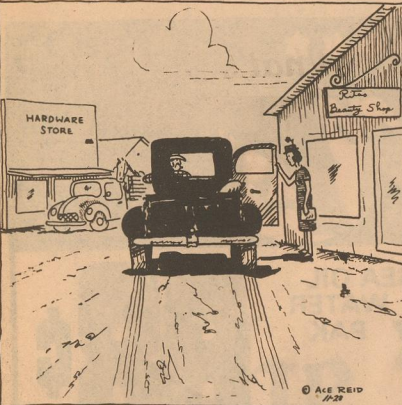
