

Follett edges Motley County in 1A regional bout

Matadors Loose 12-6 To Powerful Panthers

The Motley County Matadors were knocked out of the state playoffs Friday as a strong Follett Panther team won the 1A regional tournament bout 12-6.

Follett will now face Knox City, who upset Vega last week 7-0.

The Matador-Panther game was played in Shamrock before 400 freezing fans, many who used plastic trash bags to stay dry in the steady rain.

The game was scoreless during the first half, but the Matadors came back in the third quarter to score first. MC scored the opening

TD of the game with 2:41 left in the third when quarterback Shawn Bearden executed a perfect fake to Tim Shannon and bootlegged right, going one-yard untouched for the TD. The PAT was blocked and MC led 6-0.

Follett, which was perched on the MC 6 in the first half and came away scoreless, began what eventually became its first scoring drive with 9:10 remaining in the game. Earlier in the final quarter, Follett fullback Todd Bourquin fumbled at the MC 13 and the ball rolled to the 7 where Brent Campbell recovered for MC.

With fourth and five MC was forced to punt from their own 3 into a stiff wind, and the ball was returned nine yards to the MC 29. Eight plays later Stacy Ragan tied the game with a one yard run with 5:19 remaining. The PAT failed, the score was 6-6, but Follett was ahead 5-1 on penetrations.

On the following possession, Motley County was held for zero yardage, and facing fourth-and-10 at the MC 12, the Matadors attempted a pass. The ball was tipped by a Follett player and landed in the hands of MC's Max Bearden, but the ball was jarred loose when he hit the ground.

"I would have tried the same thing in the Matadors case," said Follett coach Guerry Wright. "We prepared hard for the game, and prepared for Shannon."

Shannon, who had been averaging over 200 yards per game, was held to 94 for the night.

Two plays after Follett took over on downs on the 12, they scored on a one yard drive with 3:13 remaining in the game. The PAT failed but they led 12-6.

Motley County refused to quit, and drove to the Follett 34 before time ran out on them.

"It was a tough game. I didn't like playing in those type weather conditions, but we didn't have any choice," MC's Coach Danny Williams said. "Follett had a good team. They were real quick and we had a little trouble blocking and tackling them. But the game was still fairly close."

Williams said he was proud of this group of young men this year.

"They worked hard and were real coachable. I enjoyed coaching them more than any other team I ever had. We are going to miss the nine seniors we are going to lose. We can't say enough about the way they lead this team. They are Tim Shannon, Roy Thompson, Shawn Bearden, Bill Luckett, John Russell, Brent Campbell, Clayton Sims, Craig Turner and Lotus Winn."

All Motley County is proud of the team this year, as teams in the past. The Matadors have lost only four games in the past three years.

Additional Funds Needed For Cemetery Association

Directors of the East Mound Cemetery Association have advised that the Cemetery maintenance fund is in bad need of additional funds.

Maintenance of the cemetery grounds during the past summer months have completely depleted the cemetery's funds and additional donations must be received before spring maintenance work can resume.

During the winter months upkeep expenses are at a minimum, but some maintenance work is occasionally necessary during this time. During the spring, summer, and early fall months maintenance work is at a peak and the caretakers must work almost full-time. The past few years have seen a dramatic rise in labor costs, and a decrease in regular donations to the cemetery fund, forcing the curtailment of some badly needed upkeep work.

The cemetery is supported almost entirely from donations, with a very small amount coming from the sale of cemetery lots. The cemetery association receives no tax revenues, although

city and county employees do occasionally assist with major maintenance projects. Part of the donations are in the form of yearly "dues" and the balance consist mainly of memorial contributions. The amount of yearly cemetery dues has been declining steadily for the past several years and the cemetery association has had to rely primarily on memorial contributions.

The Directors would

like to remind everyone that memorial contributions in memory of a deceased friend or relative make an ideal way for the sender to express their sympathy, and to help insure the proper maintenance of the cemetery.

Contributions may be mailed to Hazel Donovan, secretary of the East Mound Cemetery Association, or may be given to the funeral home or any cemetery director.

Stamp Collecting Items Available At Post Offices

Postmaster Nell Clem invites holiday shoppers to consider several stamp collecting items available at the Matador post office for their gift-giving lists.

Postmaster Clem said that the post office has the ninth edition of THE POSTAL SERVICE GUIDE TO U.S. STAMPS, as well as the 1982 Mint Set which contains all 29 commemorative and special stamps issued during the year.

The 280-page THE POSTAL SERVICE GUIDE TO U.S. STAMPS is priced at \$3.50 (the same as last year) and contains full-color reproductions of all U.S. stamp issues and the most current values assigned to each one. The book, designed to provide interesting philatelic information for both the novice and the experienced stamp collector, also includes many stories and philatelic articles about the stamp subjects and designs.

The 1982 Mint Set, priced at \$6.50, is the latest in a series of annual sets of commemorative and special stamps released by the Postal Service each year prior to the holiday season. The cover of the colorful set features a montage of artwork related to the stamps

inside.

Postmaster Clem said this year, the mint set is designed to be used as an album. Individual plastic mounts are included for mounting and protecting each stamp issue. Informative copy about each stamp issue is also included.

In addition to these two items, the post office also has several popular topical stamp collecting kits available, priced from \$2-\$3 each. Of particular interest to beginning collectors, these kits focus on topics ranging from "Outer Space" and the 1982 U.S. Collecting Kit to Masterworks and Animal Kingdom and Sports.

Each kit includes a small 20-page album, 25-30 stamps, mounting materials, insert sheets for additional stamps and a booklet entitled "Introduction ABCs of Stamp Collecting."



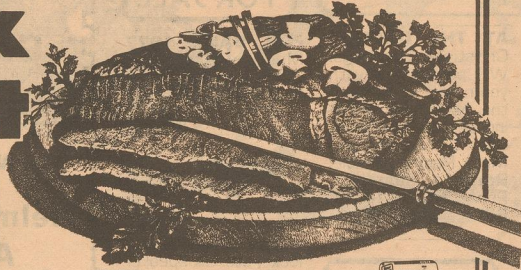

Ranchers' Heritage Chronicled

THE MATADOR LAND AND CATTLE COMPANY, by W. M. Pearce, Univ. of Oklahoma Press, \$19.95.

It is entirely possible that a new generation of Texans have had little opportunity to become acquainted with the rich heritage of ranching in this state. And it is possible that it would come as a surprise to young people to learn that a group of industrious Scotsmen from Dundee, Scotland, came to West Texas in the 1880s to raise cattle.

Henry H. Campbell, Murdo Mackenzie, Alexander Mackay and Henry H. Johnstone were the men behind the Matador Land and Cattle Co., and Dr. W. M. Pearce has written an excellent informative and interesting book on the Matador Ranch. When the ranch was organized in 1882 by the Scotsmen, holdings consisted of a herd of

cattle and 1,500,000 acres of West Texas range. The ranch covered nearly all of Motley County, a good part of Dickens County, and parts of Floyd and Cottle Counties.

Students of Texas history, of the land and cattle business, and of economics will enjoy and benefit from reading this book. In a scholarly manner, Dr. Pearce cites the business management of the company, tracing its enormous success not only in Texas, but throughout the West and into Canada. When

the company was liquidated in 1951, the property was valued at \$19 million.

The book was first published in 1964, when Dr. Pearce was academic vice president of Texas Tech University. He later became president of Texas Wesleyan University, and is now retired. With meticulous adherence to detail, Dr. Pearce has written a book sure to be invaluable as a reference in business, economics, and ranching.

make fuller use of the opportunities the Library offers. Funds received by Friends are used solely for the Library needs beyond the grant money and the budget provided by the city and the county.

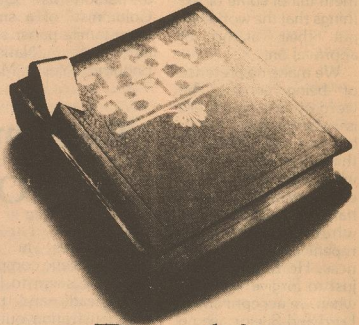
Friends are going on a calendar year as of January 1, 1983, and the following is a financial statement for 1982:

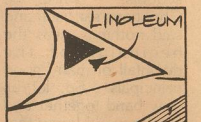

Social Security In Motley County

Are you a teacher not covered under Social Security? Maybe you aren't a teacher but still work under a Federal, State or local government pension not covered by Social Security. Either way, there is something you may need to know more about. It's called government pension offset.

In 1977, Social Security law was changed to establish the government pension offset. Basically, the law provides that a social security benefit to a spouse or surviving spouse be reduced dollar for dollar by the amount of their government pension.

Are there any exceptions to the rule? Yes, Congress did provide for a "grace period." The offset does not apply if two requirements are met. The first requirement is that at the time of filing for the spouse or surviving spouse's benefit, the individual would meet the eligibility requirements as they were in effect in January, 1977. A person applying for a wife's benefit or widow's, mother's or father's benefit will meet this requirement because there have been no changes in the law since January, 1977.

Mother's and father's benefits are those paid to a surviving spouse of a wage earner with your children in his or her care. Examples of benefits that have changed, either because of a Congressional Act or court decision, are husband's benefits,

widower's, divorced wife's and divorced husband's benefits.

The second requirement is that the claimant be entitled or eligible for their government pension before December 1982. It is not necessary that a person file for the social security benefit before December, 1982. It is also not necessary for the person to actually retire to meet this requirement as long as a benefit would be payable if the individual were not employed and if an application was filed for the pension before December, 1982.

In summary, the government pension offset may affect your benefit as a spouse if you work under a Federal, State or local government not covered under Social Security. This offset reduces your benefit dollar for dollar by the government pension. There is an exception to the law. It is not necessary to file the social security application or retire from the government job to meet this exception.

Let me make one final point. Your Medicare coverage is not affected by this law. The offset reduces the amount of benefit received. Since the individual is still technically entitled to Social Security, this right to Medicare protection is preserved.

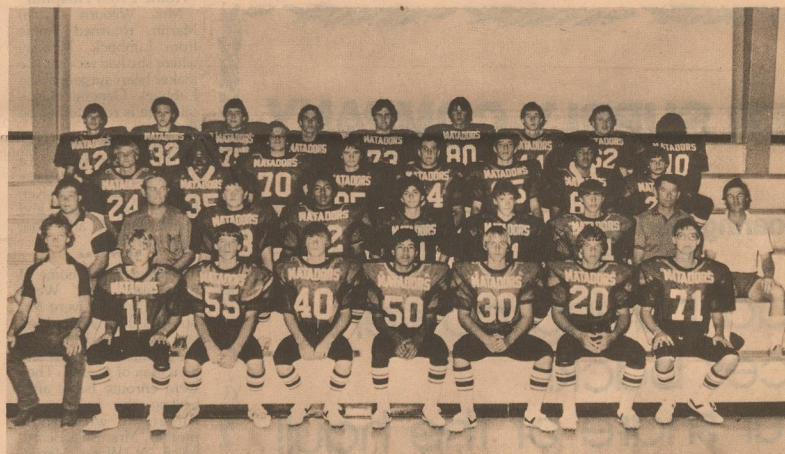

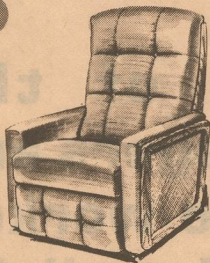
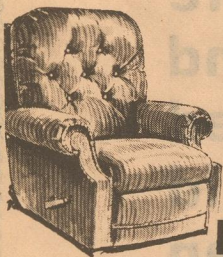

Verde Kleingrass To Be Released Soon

Verde Kleingrass, a good forage producer with larger seed, will be released in early 1983 through the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station's Foundation Seed Service at Texas A&M University. Verde Kleingrass seed are larger and 20 to 30 percent heavier than seed of Kleingrass 75. The larger seed size will make the grass more valuable as a feed source for quail and other game birds and will improve seedling vigor and establishment.

Forage yields and quality of Verde Kleingrass are about the same as from Kleingrass 75.

Verde Kleingrass will be registered as a variety under the Plant Variety Protection Law and will be sold only as certified seed. Individuals interested in producing seed will have to become licensed certified seed growers and will require certification inspections by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Individuals interested in obtaining Verde Kleingrass seed should contact the Foundation Seed Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Seed requests must be made by Jan. 15, 1983, to the Foundation Seed Service, Texas A&M University, College Station, TX 77843, which will provide information on the time

and arrangements for seed sale. Certification procedures will be provided by the Texas Department of Agriculture, P.O. Box 12847, Capitol Station, Austin, TX 78711.

Verde Kleingrass was developed by the TAES and A&M's Department of Soil and Crop Science and Department of Animal Science. It will be released jointly with the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Agricultural Research Service and Soil Conservation Service.

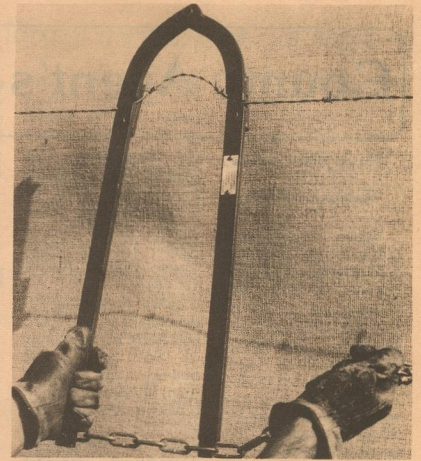

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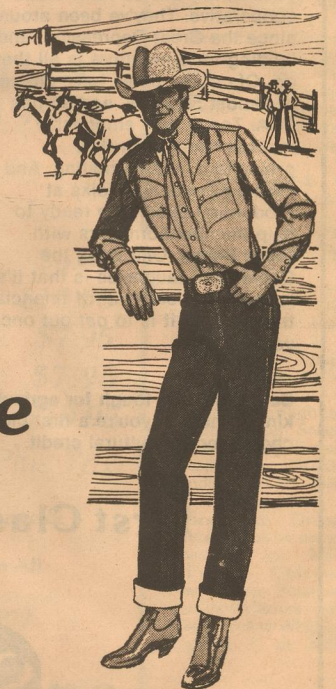

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You And Your Heart

New Help For Angina Patients

The term **ischemic heart disease** is characterized medically by an imbalance between the oxygen supply to the myocardium—the muscle of the heart—and that part of the heart's demand for oxygen.

The principal symptom of ischemic heart disease is what we know as **angina pectoris** or chest pain. The flow of blood to a section of heart wall becomes insufficient to maintain oxygenation and nutrition. Angina usually occurs during periods of exertion or stress, when the demand for oxygen is increased. A variant type occurs while the patient is at rest. This is known as **Prinzmetal's** or unstable angina.

Both types are treated by **nitroglycerin**, known for more than a hundred years to be useful for the prevention and treatment of acute angina attacks. There have been some drawbacks in administering the drug over the years.

When the tablet is placed under the tongue, the effect is immediate but with a short duration of action. When given orally, it is

A new drug offers quick and long-lasting action for sufferers of angina pectoris. absorbed through the gastrointestinal system, and quickly metabolized by the liver prior to exerting its maximum vasodilation effect.

A new drug that avoids the pass through the liver yet provides both rapid and prolonged action has been developed. It is placed under the upper lip (between gum and cheek). Tests have shown onset of action within three minutes and prolonged relief up to five hours. Known as **Susardin Transmucosal Tablets**, this new nitroglycerin preparation is from **Merrill Dow Pharmaceuticals**. People may eat, drink and talk while the tablet is dissolving.
