During the month of June, 573 books were checked out from the collection at Motley County Library. Of these 573 books, 191 were checked out to adults, 44 to young adults, and 338 to children. The 338 books checked out by children were due largely to an enrollment of 50 participants in the Summer Reading Program at the library. Audiovisual statistics during June include 31 films shown at the library or checked out from the library with a total of 216 viewers, and 7 filmstrips shown with 40 viewers. In addition, 36 reference questions were answered by library staff, and 7 interlibrary loan requests were called in to the major resource center located in Lubbock's Mahon Library. Scheduled activities at the library this week include the filmstrip STARWBERRY GIRL (for elementary through junior high at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, July 8. 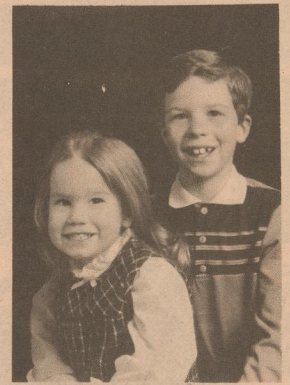

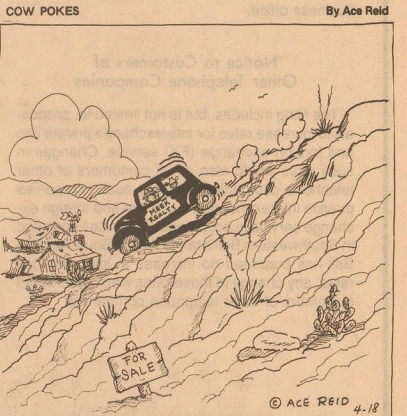

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Religious Leaders Join P&G In Fight

Several nationally prominent religious leaders today called for an end to the spread of "malicious and totally false" rumors about The Procter & Gamble Company. The release of the statements is the latest action by P&G to stop the spread of the unfounded rumors that its corporate "moon and stars" trademark is a satanic symbol signifying a company connection with satanism or devil worship.

The stories, which have been around for more than two years, typically report that a P&G executive discussed satanism on a nationally televised talk show. Producers of each of the programs mentioned in the stories have confirmed that no one from P&G has appeared on their program. In recent months the problem has escalated and P&G now is receiving more than 12,000 calls each month about the rumor. P&G said it has not been able to track down how the rumor got started, but it has received reports of the story from all 50 states. The company said it is taking the problem seriously and is prepared to take legal action if necessary to stop the spread of the stories.

Most people are satisfied that the rumor is false after they get

more information, and especially if that information comes from someone they know and trust, the company said. P&G hopes that people will believe the facts coming from religious leaders.

Reverend Jerry Falwell, host of the national television and radio program, "Old Time Gospel Hour," said, "It is unfortunate that such false accusations are made in the first place, but even more concerning that they can be spread as rumor by people who call themselves Christians. I have discussed these rumors with the Chairman of the Board of Procter and Gamble, who happens to be from my hometown in Virginia, and I am certain neither he nor his company is associated in any way with satanism or devil worship. Christians have a responsibility to know the truth before spreading stories and, in this case, the truth is there is no story to tell. I urge Christians everywhere to help put an end to these unfortunate rumors."

Reverend Jimmy Draper, President of the Southern Baptist Convention, said, "Southern Baptists always have stood for openness and integrity. We are a people who believe in and rely on truth. The rumors about

the Procter & Gamble Company are not based upon truth. This kind of reckless accusation on the part of alleged Christians is damaging to the cause of Christ, as well as the business of an excellent company. I implore all our Christian community to stand up and put an end to the unfounded and untrue rumors."

The Reverend Donald E. Wildmon, a Methodist minister and Executive Director of the National Federation for Decency, said, "The facts are that this is a vicious, unfounded rumor, and I hope we can help stop it. I ask my fellow ministers and others in position of influence to inform their people that the rumor is untrue and for those people to continue using P&G's fine products as they have in the past."

United Methodist Church Bishop Emerson Colaw said, "When I heard this rumor, I was amazed that anyone could even consider such a story about a company as responsible as Procter & Gamble. I spent many years in Cincinnati and came to know Procter & Gamble and its employees. These stories are totally false and unfortunate."

Reverend William G. Black, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Southern Ohio said, "I know the Procter &

Gamble Company very well. Many P&G employees are active in our church and have been generous church supporters, going all the way back to the founding fathers in the 1800's. I can assure those who do not know this fine company, that these rumors are

ludicrous."

The trademark is a circular design featuring a man-in-the-moon figure looking out over a field of thirteen stars. According to P&G, the trademark has been used since 1850 and was officially registered in 1882. The symbol evolved over the years

from simple markings on crates of Star Candles, an early Procter & Gamble product, and evolved to a formal design showing a man-in-the-moon, a popular figure of the 1800's, and thirteen stars representing the original colonies.

From the digging of the foundation to the laying of the last carpet square! Have you and your wife ever put up a ridge board by yourselves only to learn that it usually takes one carpenter and two helpers - or is it two carpenters and one helper? We might not have started such a project as adding onto the house except that we needed the room and God supplied the needs every step of the way. 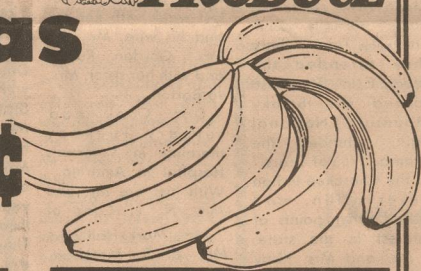
