## 25 Million Cotton Acres Lost For Single-Year Record

### Pamla Perryman To Enter Pageant

Miss Pamla Perryman, age 11, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Perryman of Roaring Springs has been selected as a finalist in the 1982 Miss Northern Texas National Pre-Teen Pageant to be held at the Quality Inn, Amarillo, on July 17, 1982.

The Miss Northern Texas National Pre-Teen Pageant is the official regional finals to the Miss Texas Pre-Teen Pageant to be held in Dallas, August 28th and is affiliated with the Miss National Teen-Ager Pageant, now in its 10th year and nationally televised.

The winner of the regional pageant will receive a \$200 cash award, crown, banner and will be fully sponsored to the state pageant at Dallas, for the title of Miss Texas National Pre-Teen of 1982.

Contestants will be judged on 1/4 poise-personality, 1/4 appearance, 1/4 talent, and 1/4 interview. There is no swim suit competition.

Miss Pamla Perryman is being sponsored by Bigham Angus Ranch and Mr. and Mrs. Lonnie Perryman. Her hobbies include swimming, horseback riding and arts and crafts.

All time highs were set in 1981 for cotton acreage planted, acres harvested and bales produced in the 25 counties represented by Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. But low prices blocked benefits that producers might otherwise have enjoyed.

In 1982 records of another kind are topping. The largest acreage destroyed by a single hail storm occurred on Friday, June 18, when something like 500,000 acres were battered almost beyond recognition and certainly beyond recovery.

Losses before and after that debacle, the result of other hail storms, wind, disease and flooding, have now brought the area's total loss to another single-year record of perhaps 2.5 million acres or more. That's over 62 percent of the estimated four million acres planted, and the previous record acreage abandonment for an entire season on the Plains was 17.3 percent in 1974.

And without a drastic change in weather patterns and substantial outside financial help, at least two other records are in danger of falling this year.

The estimated 1.5 million cotton acres left standing will have to yield an average of almost 320 pounds per acre if the High Plains is to gin one million bales of cotton this fall, a figure the area has not failed to exceed since

1950, before the full development of irrigation on the Plains. And a 320 pound yield from a crop already two to four weeks behind schedule and none too healthy, without a quick reversal in Mother Nature's lack of cooperation, is far from certain. "In fact," notes PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, "some experienced crop observers are talking in terms of around 250 pounds per acre."

But the saddest part of all, Johnson notes, is that unless Washington intervenes quickly and dramatically, a record number of farmers in 1983 will be seeking another means to sustain their families.

"We are doing all we know to do to convince the Secretary of Agriculture that implementation of the emergency disaster provisions of the 1981 farm law is an absolute must; that payment of existing FmHA loans should not be demanded until producers have a chance to recover from this crisis; that new, low interest emergency loans should be made available, and that every other avenue to providing assistance should be explored and utilized to the fullest."

Even with all this help, spokesmen for financial institutions say many farmers will be unable to continue next year. But without help some say almost half may be out of business.

## Vo-Ag Teacher Attends Microcomputer Workshop

N. L. Moss, vocational agriculture teacher at Motley County High School recently attended a microcomputer workshop at Texas A&M University.

The 2 1/2 day workshop, sponsored by the College of Agriculture and the Department of Agricultural Education, focused on agricultural applications of microcomputers. Workshop participants were instructed in micro-

computer terminology and received hands on training in the use of various computer programs. The programs were designed to aid farm and ranch owners in making management decisions and in keeping records for small businesses or farms.

Dr. Gary Briers, associate professor in the Department of Agricultural Education and director of the

workshop, said Radio Shack TRS-80 Model II microcomputers, furnished by the Tandy

Corporation in Fort Worth, Texas were used throughout the training sessions.

## Michelle Bearden Is Lions Speaker

Details of the Visiting Nurse Service, Inc., of Lubbock were explained by Mrs. James (Michelle) Bearden at the Tuesday, July 6 meeting of Matador Lions Club. The guest speaker, a registered nurse and resident of Motley County, serves several of the counties in the 15-counties area which provide health needs to anyone requiring home nursing assistance.

Introduced by Lion Kevin Wright, program chairman, Mrs. Bearden first explained that Visiting Nurse Service is a private company and not funded by the government.

"This is a young company, formed in 1979 to provide home nursing care, especially for elderly patients," she said. "The company offers maximum service for lower costs (than normally charged for nursing care). It is concerned with all phases of community health, including blood pressure clinics, nursing procedures in the home on an intermittent basis, such as injections, dressings, catheter care and special personal care."

"Other areas of health care covered now include child abuse (of which there are several cases in Motley County) and hospice, or counseling for families of patients who are terminally ill, to enable them to meet this crisis in the home."

The employees are all R.N.'s, and work on a salary basis. The number of patients or frequency of visits do not affect the pay of the nurses, Mrs. Bearden said. She explained

further that payment may be made by private insurance, Medicare, Medicaid, Veterans Administration, Champus, or private pay. The VNS also accepts contributions to assist with care of patients unable to pay. Such contributions are tax-free.

Although persons of all ages who have health problems requiring home care are eligible to receive this service, care must be ordered by a physician.

Miss Jelen announced that former SS Field Representative of this area, Ray Purcell would be honored at an open house reception on Friday. Mr. Purcell will retire at the end of the month after a number of years with social security.

## Emergency Council Being Formed To Assist Weather-Stricken Farmers

National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan is inviting agricultural leaders in three states to join a special Agricultural Emergency Coordinating Council (AECC) to assist weather-stricken farmers and farm-based businesses in Texas, Oklahoma, and New Mexico.

"The series of weather disasters that

have struck our area's crops in recent weeks will exact an unprecedented toll on our agricultural economy, but we feel that much can be done to help," Breihan said.

"We are therefore inviting representatives of all agricultural organizations, financing institutions, and others to establish and maintain contact with

local, state, and federal governments and Congressional leaders to coordinate help for the victims of this tragedy. We have been assured by leaders of all agricultural groups in our area that they are agreed on the need to assist farmers and the farm-based economy."

Breihan said full details and names of

the cooperating organizations would be released as soon as he has received response from those invited to join the AECC. He indicated that he would also establish a technical resource subcommittee made up of research and extension personnel and other agricultural specialists to advise the AECC.

## Stephens Awarded WTSU Scholarship

James Hollis Stephens of Matador has been awarded a \$200 West Texas State University Student Foundation Honor Scholarship for the 1982-83 academic year.

Stephens is a graduate of South Plains College at Levelland.

The scholarships are made available through funds collected during the annual October phone campaign hosted by members of the WTSU Student Foundation.

The WTSU Student Foundation provided an endowment of more than \$2,000 and a fund of more than \$6,000 to provide the scholarships.

Scholarships are awarded to graduates

of accredited two-year community or junior colleges with Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degrees who plan to enter WTSU. They also must be members of Phi Theta Kappa, a national honorary scholastic fraternity for community and junior college students.

This is the second year for the WTSU Student Foundation Honor Scholarship to be awarded.

Recipients who maintain a 3.0 or better grade point average on a 4.0 scale are eligible to renew the scholarships during their second year at WTSU.

## Farmers Face Bankruptcy With Financial Assistance

The 1980s for farmers in Texas have meant high interest rates, rising costs and falling prices. These factors have combined to push many farmers to the brink of insolvency.

And this spring, nature has dealt another serious blow to our farmers, particularly those in West Texas. The damage caused by recent hail storms is almost incomprehensible. Preliminary estimates indicate that 75 percent of the 4.2 million acres planted in cotton was damaged. That means the loss of about a million bales of cotton. Figures still are being compiled on other crop losses, but it is clear that wheat production has been affected substantially, and the corn crop also suffered significant damage.

The impact of this loss of food and fiber will be felt throughout the economy of the region. But the real tragedy is the plight of the individual farmers, who face imminent bankruptcy if assistance cannot be provided.
