On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Sin-gleton ruled that the chil-

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Sin-gleton ruled that the chil-dren in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase prais-ing God in their school song. That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song vio-lated constitutional provi-sions of separation of church and state. On July 3rd, the Su-preme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child por-nography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as com-planing this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech. If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is be-cause it *is* strange. The ACLU is constantly wor-ried about the "free speech" rights of pornogra-phers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence






