

Calvert Signs At SPC

This year's state champion discus thrower, a 6-3 powerhouse from Motley County High School, has signed for the 1982-83 track season with the South Plains College Texans.

Glen Calvert hurled the discus for a best throw of 174' 5" at state and was both state and regional district discus champ in 1981 and 1982. He's also a three-time district discus champ (in 1980-81-82).

Calvert is equally at home with the shot put, according to SPC track coach James Morris. "Calvert was second in the shot put at the state track meet this year, with a best throw of 56' 2," said Morris, who tabbed Calvert as "A great prospect and outstanding addition to the SPC track team." His coach at Matador was Gene Griffin.

Calvert was a three-time district shot put champion (1980-81-82) and a two-time regional winner (in 1981-82).

The 18-year-old trackster also was active in both football and basketball during his high school years at Motley County, where he graduated in the

spring of 1982.

He was named all-district lineman three years on offensive and all-district defensive lineman for two years,

was named All South Plains one year and All-District in basketball.

Calvert's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Calvert of Flomot.

Two graduates of Motley County High School at Matador have been awarded \$200 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarships to attend West Texas State University for the 1982-83 academic year.

These honor scholars from Matador are Jeanette Moore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Glynard Moore, and Rhonda Stephens, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Stephens.

More than 350 students who will enter WTSU as freshman students for the fall semester which begins with registration on Wednesday, Aug. 25, have been designated as Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars.

The Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholarship program has grown since 1979 with five gifts each of \$200,000. The Don and Sybil Harrington Foundation of Amarillo added the fifth gift in June to bring the scholarship fund total to \$1 million.

Of the 328 Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars in 1981-82, 87 percent will return for this year and 51 percent of those who will return have maintained a 3.0 grade point average on a 4.0 scale to be eligible for a scholarship the

second year, said Keith Winter, director of development. The latest gift expanded the program for students to be eligible for the third year.

Don and Sybil Harrington Honor Scholars who score a 28 of a possible 36 on the American College Test and 1,220 of a possible 1,600 points on the Scholastic Aptitude Test college entrance examinations also are designated as President's Honor Scholars and receive an additional \$100 scholarship each academic year.

Matadors Aim High As Season Nears

The Motley County fans as well as players are still thinking about last year's emotional football season, and it may take a long time to get over the tension, nail biting, stomach tumbling and head busting season.

But excitement of the new season is in the air and all eyes are on this year's Matadors.

Workouts are underway and new head coach Danny Williams is encouraged with what he has seen so far.

Top-O-Texas football yearbook says a number of district 3-A coaches are not expecting Motley County to be a district contender because of their heavy loss to graduation, but Top-O-Texas said they can see a division finish.

The Matadors had a very successful season last fall, reaching the state semi-finals before being defeated by Aspermont.

Returning from last fall's squad are six offensive and defensive regulars. Three of these were All District selections last year. They were Tim Shannon (5-10, 165) senior tailback, Shawn Bearden (5-9, 165) senior quarterback and offensive tackle Roy Thompson (6-3, 210) senior.

Shannon is an all state candidate, and gained over 1400 yards rushing last season. Joining Shannon and Bearden from last fall's backfield is Darrell Moore (5-9, 160) junior wingback.

Returning starters Bill

Luckett (6-0, 165) senior, John Russell (5-10, 250) senior, and Craig Turner, will join Thompson in the forward wall.

Brent Campbell and Coke Barton are returning with starting experience with last

falls split-4 defense. Clayton Sims is also expected to add depth and speed to the backfield.

With these and others returning with a taste for victory still lingering, and the determination to live up

to the name "Matadors", and with three quarters of the backfield returning, this should lay a solid foundation for another successful season.

FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools, outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACLU is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut, but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. After the wedding, the couple will reside in Houston.

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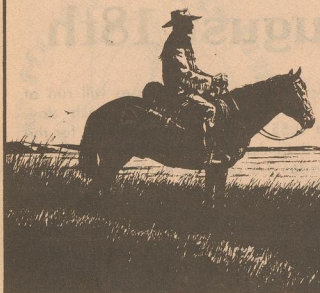
