## Mats Shoot For Playoffs At Aspermont Friday

The Motley County Matadors blasted Chillicothe last Friday 55-14, and will face Aspermont this week. If the Matadors win this week they are automatically in the playoffs.

"The Aspermont game this Friday will be a real tough game," Coach Danny Williams said. "We are both playing for a chance to get into the state playoffs. If we beat Aspermont they are out and we are in the playoffs."

Last week Knox City whipped Aspermont 41-6 and should have no problem getting into the playoffs, so the real battle in the district will be at Aspermont Friday.

"We did not play as good Friday night as we have in other games this year," Williams said. "But we still had a pretty easy ball game. The Chillicothe players never did quit, but they just could not stop our offense. We had a little trouble stopping their passing game, as they did a real good job of throwing the football."

Tim Shannon opened the scoring with 2:37 left in the first quarter on a 12 yard run, and he kicked the point-after-touchdown (PAT) to make the score 7-0.

Darrell Moore also

scored in the first quarter with 1:14 left on a 12 yard run. The PAT kick failed.

Chillicothe scored early in the second quarter on a one-yard pass, then passed for the two point PAT. With 11:13 left in the first half the score was 13-8.

Shannon scored his second 12 yard TD with 9:01 left in the first half, and Moore ran in for the two point conversion. On the next drive Shannon again broke away and scored on a 32 yard run with 6:17 left. His PAT kick made the score 28-7.

Before the first half

ended MC struck again when Shannon Winn scored from the one. The PAT failed. Motley went in at halftime leading 34-8.

Bill Luckett hit paydirt first for MC in the third quarter with a one-yard run with 8:46 left. Max Bearden kicked the PAT, and that made the score 41-8.

Chillicothe scored on a 20 yard pass play with 7:00 left in the fourth quarter but their PAT kick failed. MC 41, Chillicothe, 14.

Shannon scored again for MC with 5:30 left in the game on a one-

yard run. His PAT kick made the score 48-14.

Shawn Bearden intercepted a Chillicothe pass with 3:00 left in the game and returned it 47 yards for a TD. Shannon's kick made the score 55-14.

Shannon picked up 183 yards on 23 carries while Moore had 35 yards on four carries. Luckett carried six times for 35 yards, and Cody Christian carried two times for 35 yards. Shawn Bearden carried three times for 30 yards. Shannon Winn and Max Bearden each carried for one yard.

S. Bearden connected three of three passes for 105 yards. M. Bearden completed two for 81 yards and Brent Campbell completed one for 24.

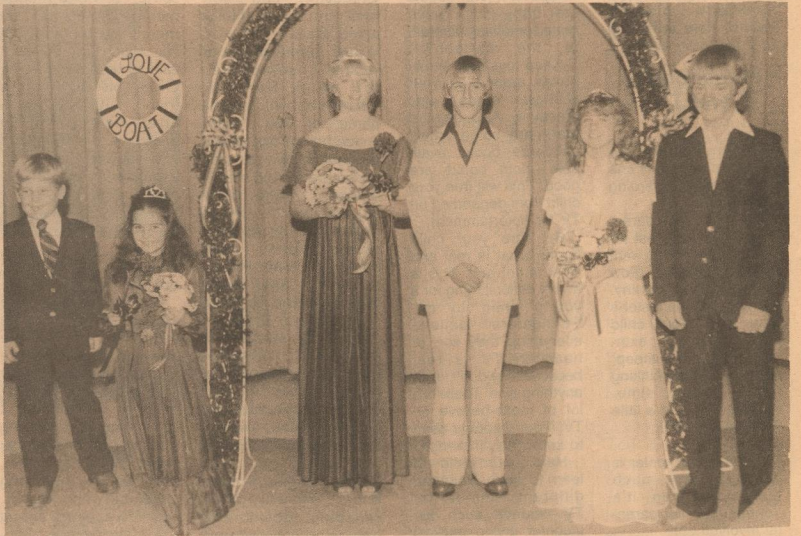
Roy Thompson blocked one punt and Craig Turner recovered it for MC. Besides S. Bearden's 47 yard TD on the interception the Matadors picked off two more Chillicothe passes. Alex Guerrero intercepted one and Clayton Sims got the other.

All MC fans are urged to travel to Aspermont this Friday and back the Matadors in this important clash. Game time is 7:30.

## TV and Your Child Tips From TSTA

**The Texas State Teachers Association urges parents to examine their children's television viewing habits. Here is Part III of a four-part series.**

### Preschoolers and TV

Congratulations on being a parent. It is one of life's most rewarding experiences. Part of being a parent is selecting the best for your new child. You want your youngster to grow up happy and healthy. Plan your youngster's time well. Your child needs fresh air, exercise, hugging, sleep, food, play time, thinking time, family time, reading time and a little TV time.

If your preschooler is watching too much television, then it's "prime time" for parental involvement!

Make certain your children watch TV for information and entertainment. Television should not be a babysitter.

Watch TV with your child—after you have carefully selected a good program.

Discuss what you watch on TV with your child. Point out colors, animals and common objects around the house. Ask questions! This teaches youngsters to look more closely at what they see. Ask your child, "Did you like the program we watched?" This helps your youngster to evaluate feelings and to think clearly.

Stretch your child's imagination. Ask how else a character could have acted, (e.g. "Could the baby duck have done something different in the cartoon?")

Keep toys and empty boxes around so your youngster learns to play creatively. Also, be sure there are some small, baby-size books available—cloth books are good. This will free your child from depending on TV for entertainment.

Be sure your child learns what is real and what is not real. This is a very difficult thing for a young child to do. Youngsters believe everything they see or hear on TV is real because they don't know anything else. There is a lot of make-believe on TV. Young people need to know the difference.

Help your child to learn to listen. Point out different sounds on TV—sounds such as: laughter, crying, musical tones, animal noises and traffic, etc. This helps your child learn to listen carefully.

Read to your child as soon as possible. Reading soothes children and helps prepare them for school days ahead. Reading every day is not too much, and most children love stories at bedtime.

Caution young children not to sit or play too close to the TV set. Be sure a light is on in the same room where the TV set is on. Improper lighting can be harmful to eyesight.

## Program On Family Genetics Given For El Progreso Club

Mrs. Harry Hamilton of Lubbock was guest speaker on October 22, when El Progreso Study Club met at the home of Mrs. John Hamilton for a program on Family Genetics.

The speaker is coordinator of the Lubbock Regional Genetic Screening Counseling Service in connection with the Texas Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation program. She told of the work being done by that agency, as she showed slides demonstrating the extent to which genetics plays a part in the lives of families, and especially those which contribute to birth defects.

Mrs. Hamilton distributed pamphlets containing startling statistics revealed by genetics, or the study of heredity, and confirming the program quotation: "The genes and chromosomes are the oldest and the most burdensome of all human afflictions."

According to the literature, "There are around 3,000 known genetic disorders," and "More than 12 million Americans are affected with genetic disorders. Nearly half of all infant deaths are caused by genetic disorders." The bright side of the

picture, however, is that help is available through screening and counseling services. Certain types of mental retardation can be prevented if detected and treated early. This is achieved through the Newborn Screening Program of Texas.

Mrs. Hamilton is well qualified for her position as clinic coordinator of the Lubbock Regional facility. She has a B.S.W. degree from Florida State University and M.S.W. in social work from Tulane University. She worked four years with the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology at Texas Tech Health Science Center and has held her current position for four years, having begun her employment there in 1978 when the Lubbock Clinic opened. The former Adrienne Smith and Harry Hamilton were married in 1969 and are the parents of two children, Charles, 9 and Cary, 2.

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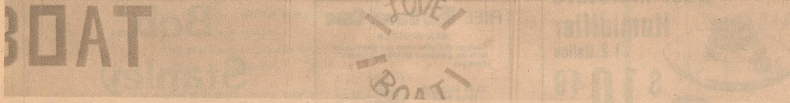
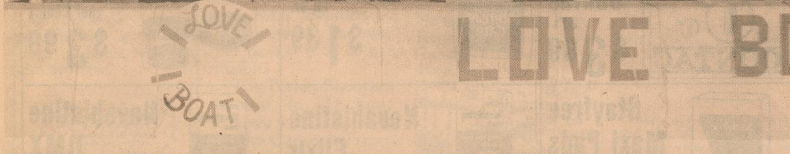

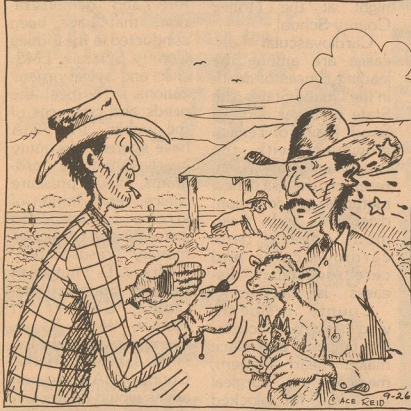
