**ATTENDS CONFERENCE-** Bill Lockett, president of the Motley County FFA was among approximately 150 FFA members attending the Area I Leadership Conference at Clarendon College on June 17-19. ## Senator Farabee To Modify Texas Insanity Defense

Senator Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls announced last week that he intends to introduce legislation to modify the insanity defense in the next session of the Texas Legislature.

"The public reaction to the Hinckley case

illustrates how the defense, as it is sometimes used, undermines public confidence in our criminal justice system," said Farabee.

"Another controversial example of the use of the insanity defense recently occurred here

in Texas," Farabee related. "In February of 1980, a woman in Wichita Falls cut her 4 year old child's heart out with a knife. The mother was found to be insane and committed to Rusk and Wichita Falls State Hospitals. Almost two years to the

day after her child's death, the woman was released because the hospital felt she was no longer dangerous."

"The average citizen has difficulty believing that if such a person was really insane, that she could be 'cured' so

quickly. Mental health care is not yet a precise science," Farabee said.

Farabee stated that "the details of the legislation have not been formulated, but that several options are available. Michigan adopted a verdict of 'guilty but mentally ill' in 1976 as an alternative to a finding of insanity, and three other states have followed suit. Idaho recently abolished the defense altogether. The American Bar Association is also working on a report on this subject."

Texas currently has a Mental Health Code Task Force to recommend changes in Texas' mental health laws. "I have asked the Chairman of the Task Force to include the insanity defense in the study," said Farabee.

## Needless Deaths Caused By Speed

Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "The two most dangerous things the driver of a motor vehicle can do is to speed or drink and drive. Those two violations will account for most of the traffic deaths during this July 4th holiday."

The population in Texas is increasing, so is traffic on the highways. More people are expected to be on our highways this 4th of July week end than ever before.

The Department will be conducting "Operation Motorcade" during the week end, trying to make everyone aware of the traffic problem. Every available trooper will be working, trying to help cut down on the needless traffic death but will need the help and cooperation of the entire motoring public to be effective in reducing accidents. "We don't have enough people to stop all traffic violations. We need the voluntary compliance by the motoring public,

in obeying the traffic laws, in order to be successful in reducing accidents," Major Bell stated.

"If people will just slow down and not drive if they have been drinking, many of the deaths that occur on our highways can be prevented," Major Bell concluded.

## Farm Bureau To Sponsor Local Fireman

The 1982 Texas Firemen's Training School will be held at the Texas A&M University campus, July 25-30. Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies and the **MOTLEY COUNTY FARM BUREAU** will jointly sponsor one fireman to the school.
