Heart disease has been declared the nation's No. 1 killer, and the funds are used for research in combatting all phases of cardiovascular diseases. These include blood clots and strokes which are often contributing causes of death.

"Money is needed for this research," Mrs. Campbell pointed out. "One way to help your heart is to help the people who fight the disease that can stop it. Your contributions during our drive will be appreciated, and may prove a life saver for you or some member of your family."

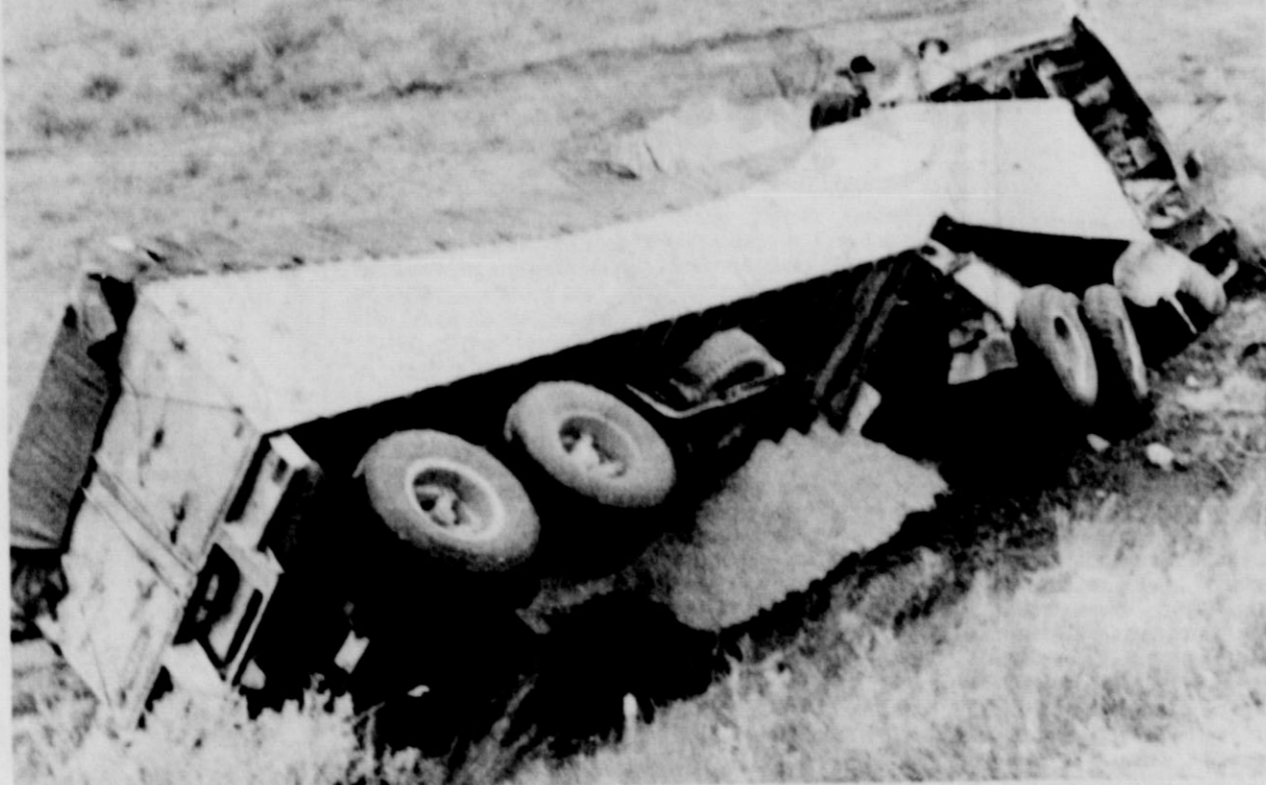
Mr. Cude will show a film giving details of Social Security benefits. The meeting is open to the public, and a cordial invitation is extended everyone, to attend.

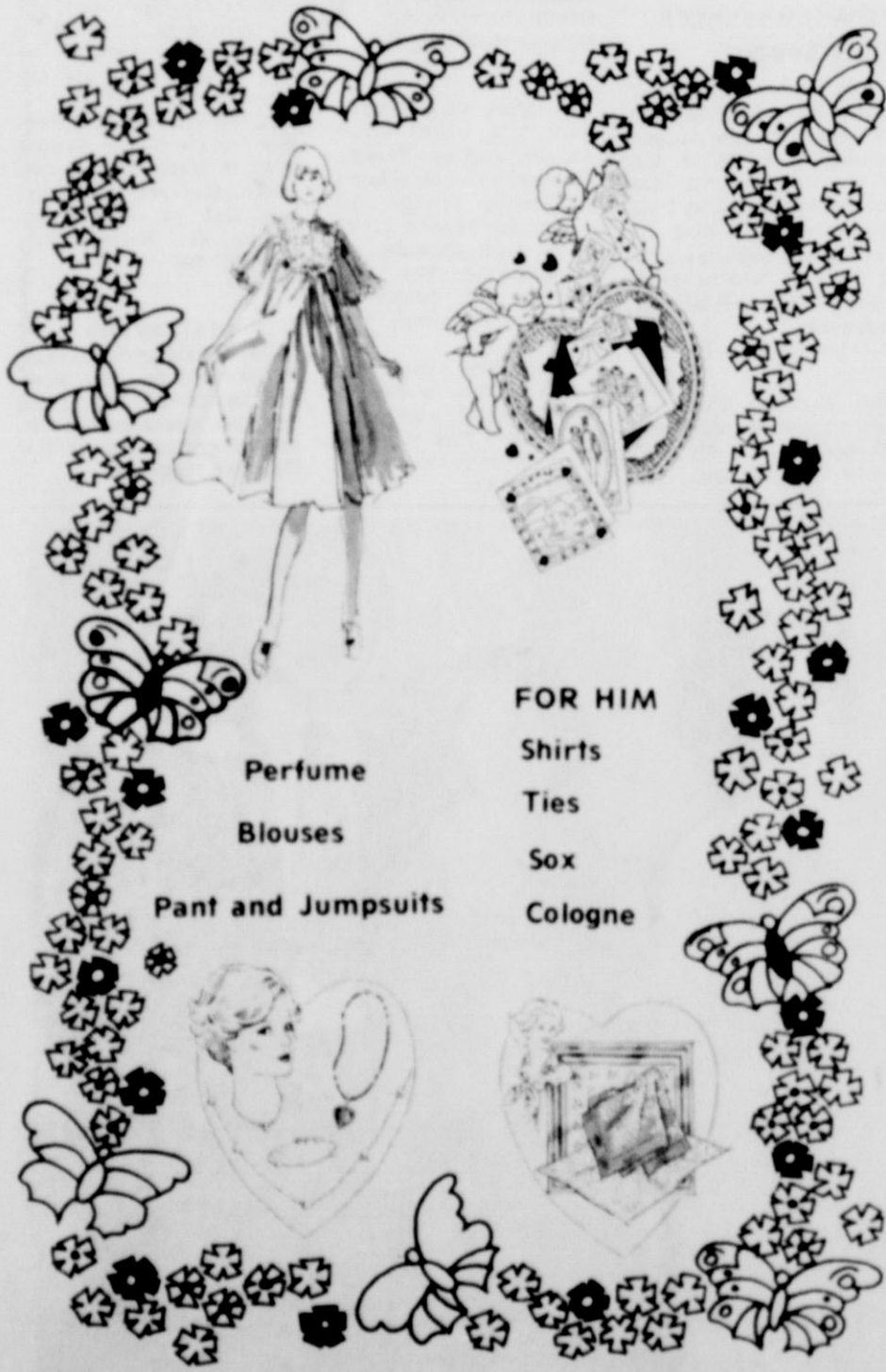

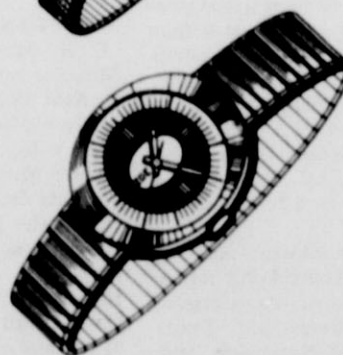

Parallel Terraces Improve Production

In recent years a new system of designing terraces on farmland was developed. This system provides a means of installing the terraces parallel to each other on as much of the slope as possible. This design eliminates many "point rows" and makes the terraces easier to farm than conventional terraces. In addition, properly installed parallels do a better job of spreading rainfall and increasing production, according to Mike Isbell, Soil Conservationist.

Many farmers in Motley County have gone to parallel terraces as a means of controlling water erosion on farmland. Individuals include Sonny Russell, 22,000

feet; L. M. Cox, 58,000 feet; Wade Martin, 30,000 feet; and Charles Gwinn, 56,000 feet, with an additional 200,000 feet planned in Motley County in the future. Also, Johnny Thomas will install 20,000 feet of conventional terraces in 1977. "As we design and build terraces that make farming easier and more efficient today, we must remember that future generations will benefit also," Isbell said. "The real reason for today's conservation is to insure that tomorrow's farmers will have something to farm."
