Caution Urged For Customers Who Use Butane And Propane

In local communities, liquified petroleum gas (LPG) continues to be a main source of fuel for heating homes. winter approaches, the Railroad Commission's LPG Division has issued a warning to LP gas users and dealers concerning unprotected and improperly posi-tioned regulators on home propane and butane tanks.

The regulator should be located underneath the protective dome cover of the tank. Each regulator has a small vent opening which

Whenever the regulator vent is blocked by an accumulation of debris or frozen precipitation it can be disabled, allowing 200 pounds of pressure from the tank to shoot into home

to shoot into home appliances.

This sudden force causes 34" flame to become a two or three foot torch igniting walls, furniture, drapes, or whatever is nearby.

months, the tank's
dome area provides a
perfect nesting spot for
wasps, hornets, and
mud daubers. These
pesky insects are

readily noticeable and can be dealt with rather easily.

remove any obstruc-tions they have manufactured when he is checking the pressure gauge on the tank. But, during the winter months, frozen precipitation is not so easily detected and precau-tionary steps must be taken to keep this from

If the tank regulator is located outside the dome cover, it must be protected from adverse weather conditions.
Placing an inverted tin

can or the bottom half of a plastic container over the regulator helps eliminate the possibility of moisture collecting in the vent opening and

the vent opening and freezing.

This method is inexpensive and the material readily avoilable. Or, have the regulator properly installed. These safety precautions will help prevent future loss of property, and in many cases, loss of lives.






