Social Security In Motley County

The laws and regulations on Social Security programs are similar to the frequently used saying about the weather. It goes something like "If you don't like the weather here, just wait around awhile—it will change." Sometimes Social Security policies seem to change in this same

manner.

A few weeks ago, we discussed the government pension offset. An important element of this provision is the exception. That is, the conditions under which conditions under which the offset will not apply. Well, on January 12, 1983, the President signed into law a measure that affects this exception. In general, the

government pension offset calls for reducing a spouse's benefit by the amount of any government pension

received by the person.

Previously, the government pension offset would not apply if:

eligible for government per before 12-82 and,

before 12-82 and,
2. The beneficiary
met the eligibility
requirements for the
Social Security benefit
as they were in 01/77.
The new law extends
the exception to July,
1983. However, those
meeting the exception
for the new period
(12/82 through 6/83)
are subject to different are subject to different requirements. All beneficiaries, whether male or female, must have been receiving one-half support from the wage earner. On the other hand, the provision included claims for all types of spouse's benefit. As we said, the original law required that the beneficiary meet the requirements for spouse's benefits as

they were in 01/77.

Therefore, divorced spouses who could not meet the original exception because exception because
20 year marriage
requirement, may be
able to take advantage
of the new provision. It of the new provision. It should be noted that the individual can still take advantage of the "old" exception. The new law however, provides an opportunity to avoid the offset for those who become eligible for the government pension after 11-82 or could not otherwise meet the exception as it was

written.

Payments Due Before Checks Can Be Issued

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said recently he has \$1.5 million worth of state checks he can't give the people they're made out to because these people owe money to

the state.
"The law says I can't issue a state check to anyone indebted to the state and I intend to collect every penny due before I turn loose of this money," Bullock

About 71 percent of

the 5,000 checks Bullock is holding can't be sent to the payees because they are behind in their sales or franchise taxes. If these delinquent taxpayers would pay their overdue taxes, Bullock would release checks worth \$899,000

Bullock said there's almost \$63,000 frozen

almost \$03,000 frozen-because people haven't repaid loans obtained under the Hinson-Hazelwood and National Direct Student

retired state employees who have a total of \$40,448 coming to them if they'll pay up," Bullock continued. "There's also \$516,019 due 866 retired teachers and \$31,089 due 67 state employees."

He said \$5.3 million owed Texas has been collected since 1978 when the law became effective.



Over 4 Million Acres Planted In Cotton In Area

Cotton acreage bases in the 25 High Plains counties repre-sented by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. total 4,874,512, according to figures from the state office of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in College

tion and Conservation Service in College Station.

That will be the starting point in attempts to estimate 1983 planted acreage, PCG officials say, once the extent of payment-in-kind (PIK) program participation is known. Understandably, speculation on the subject is widespread already, although the final PIK sign-up is four weeks away on March 11. It will be important to have a reasonable estimate of planted acreage as early as possible, especially to ginners and other allied industry people making plans for 1983 operations, points out PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson.

Acreage planted to cotton in the 25 PCG counties in 1981, the highest ever, totaled 4,644,900, only 95.3

counties in 1981, the highest ever, totaled 4,644,900, only 95.3 percent of the 1983 base. A county-by-county review of county review of underplanted bases underplanted bases indicates that they occurred more frequently in counties where farms have both grain and cotton acreage bases, probably because some farms have aggregate bases greater than total cropland.

It is reasonable then It is reasonable then to assume, given adequate planting moisture, that acreage bases remaining after satisfying conservation use requirements under the regular acreage reduction program (ARP) and PIK programs

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in 1983 will be fully planted.

If so, 100 percent participation in both the ARP at 20 percent diversion and PIK, which would require 30 percent diversion and PIK, which would leave about 2.44 million acres devoted to cotton production. And, it follows that each percentage point that participation falls below 100 would add another 24,400 acres to the planting potential.

Area-wide program participation at 90 percent therefore should result in 2,684,000 acres planted to cotton in 1983, about 58 percent of the estimated acreage planted in 1982.
