## Variety Store Celebrates Fifty Years In Business

One local store has been here long enough under one ownership to be one of the oldest businesses in Motley County. The store has seen good times, bad times, war years, times of peace, growth and decline, and has survived through all.

The Matador Variety Store, opened January 1, 1933, by the late W. F. (Jake) Jacobs, will hold Open House Saturday, January 8th in celebra-

tion of 50 years in business. Refreshments will be served and everyone is invited to come in a register for a door prize to be given away.

Mr. Jacobs and young son, Mack, came to Matador from Dalhart and Clayton, N.M., to close out the Hanna Brothers Department Store here. While here he purchased the present business from Dick

Speer of Spur. Mr. Jacobs and his son lived at the Motley Hotel until he married Vivian Estes in 1939. They had one daughter, Laura, who now resides in Farwell. Mack Jacobs now lives in Houston.

Jake, as he was called, was active in the United Methodist Church, serving as Sunday School Superintendent for nearly 20 years. He was also a past president of the

Matador Lions Club and active in other civic affairs.

Mr. Jacobs died November 4, 1960 and since that time the business has been operated by his wife, Vivian Jacobs. Mrs. Jacobs is active in the United Methodist Church and belongs to U.M.W., the Order of the Eastern Star, Matador Chapter No. 66 and El Progreso Study Club.

Current employees of the business are Mrs. C. M. Barton Jr., (Dan), Mrs. Scott Robbins (Louise), and Mrs. Marvin Vaughn (Earline).

## State Rep. Foster Whaley Installs New WATTS Line

State Representative Foster Whaley, Pampa, announced today that a toll-free incoming WATT Line telephone has been installed in his Pampa office. The WATT line will permit any citizen in the 84th Legislative District to call him at no expense to the caller. The TOLL-FREE NUMBER: 1-800-692-1389.

Permission was granted to Whaley to make this installation because of the large eleven and one-half county district which includes part of the Panhandle, Rolling Plains, and South Plains. The District covers North rural Lubbock County and includes Reece A.F.B., Shallowater, New Deal, Idalou, and the southern part of Abernathy.

Other counties include Crosby, Dickens, Floyd, Motley, Briscoe, Hall, Armstrong, Donley, Childress, Collingsworth, and Gray.

From January 11, 1983, until early June, Representative Whaley will be in Austin for the 68th Legislative session.

## Arthritis Treatment Available To South Plains Residents

Sometimes arthritis goes away by itself and victims enjoy remissions in which there are no symptoms at all for months, or even years. Unfortunately, though such cases do come along, they are the exception rather than the rule. For most, life with arthritis is a constant struggle against the pain and loss of mobility caused by the disease.

These so-called cures are doing only one thing; they are preying on people in pain for their own financial gain.

In fact, there are things that can be done to help arthritis sufferers. A planned program of medication, rest periods, prescribed exercises, posture rules, joint protection and rehabilitation can help relieve pain and keep joints functioning.

One of the major problems of arthritis victims is the onslaught of quacks with false claims of "cures" wrought by their various gadgets, diets, dietary supplements, drugs or "clinics". Because as many as 50% of the people get better no matter what they take and because arthritis has peaks and valleys sometimes the phoney cures seem to work. The truth is, however, that the purveyors of all

There are a number of rehabilitation services available to residents of the South Plains. All of them require referral from a physician, the only one qualified to diagnose arthritis and to prescribe treatment and medication. St. Mary of the Plains Hospital for example has 30 rehabilitation beds and provides the full range of rehabilitation services on both inpatient and outpatient bases and several staff physicians

admit for rehabilitation. A number of other area hospitals, both health spas in Lubbock and all physical therapists in the area will provide heat and exercise treatment for arthritis sufferers. Again, these services are performed only as recommended by a physician. The Lubbock YWCA offers an aquatics program for the handicapped and would like a special class for arthritis.

In addition to other physicians, the Internal Medicine Clinic at Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center has two rheumatology specialists who see patients and recommend appropriate therapy.

The Texas Rehabilitation Commission works with arthritis victims (as well as others) to secure treatment and therapy to assist them in securing employment. Goodwill Industries of

Lubbock has a professional rehabilitation staff who handle patients on an individual basis, helping them in their adjustment to jobs, home and family life.

The Arthritis Foundation, 1926 -- 34th Street in Lubbock, will soon be offering self-help workshops for victims of arthritis and their families. These workshops are taught by registered nurses.

The Arthritis Foundation is the clearinghouse for information on arthritis: the disease, the treatments, and the help available. # Letter To The Editor

December 29, 1982

Dear Editor:  
Chances are, a clean-tilled field is becoming a rare sight in your part of the country as more and more growers look to reduced tillage to solve erosion and moisture problems.

But, while it's true that the trash cover and standing stubble can provide many benefits, it also creates new problems of its own. Weeds must be controlled, residue must be managed correctly and planting techniques must be modified. To meet these needs, there are new kinds of

machinery and improved techniques that will help farmers achieve success with less, and sometimes, no tillage.

On January 14, Monsanto will recap the latest progress in reduced tillage at a special session of the National Association of Wheat Growers convention in Houston. Entitled "Reduced Tillage: New Techniques Advance the Trend" the session will bring together some of the leaders of this vital movement to discuss methods for success.

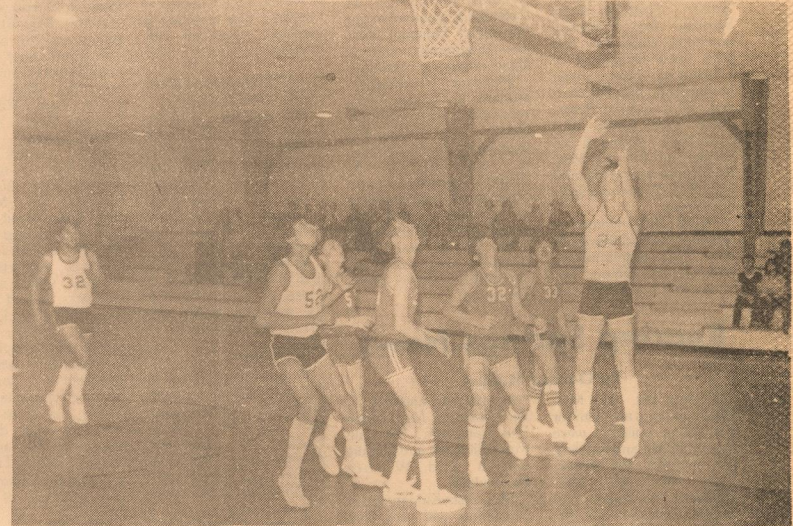

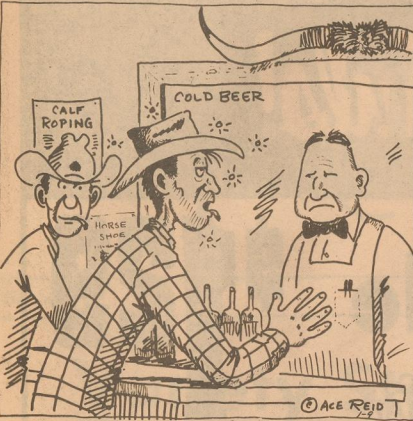

**Foot Facts**

**Ankle Sprains**

Everyone has heard the term "ankle sprain" used but probably only a few have a good understanding of just what this means. An explanation must start with the ankle joint ligaments which are band of fibrous tissue used to hold the joint together. Ligaments are living tissue and so have a blood and nerve supply like any other tissue. However, their blood supply is sparse and this means that they will heal slowly after an injury.

Anyway, back to the ankle. The joint itself is formed by the two leg bones (the tibia and fibula) which form the bumps on the inner and outer part of the ankle. Inside the joint is a third small bone, the talus, which is normally too deep to be felt. These three bones form a joint which is held together, as are all joints in the

body, by strong ligaments.

If someone takes a misstep or twists his ankle, the body weight becomes a force that tries to move the ankle joint in a way it can not go. If the force is sufficiently violent a fracture of the bone may occur. If a less severe force occurs, damage to the ligaments may ensue. Ankle sprains, by definition, are injuries to the ligaments about the ankle joint. Sprains are classified as Grade I, meaning a bruising of the ligament; Grade II, a more severe injury with tearing of some of the ligamentous fibers; and Grade III, a partial or complete rupture of the ligament. Treatment must be based on the grade and extent of the injury as well as on the patient's general condition.

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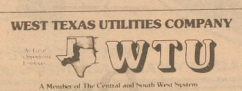
