Our luncheon days are second Tuesdays and fourth Tuesdays of each month, ship evening with us at anytime.



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



Wild Turkeys **Had Poor Nesting Year** In 1988

AUSTIN -- Hen-poult counts con-

AUSTIN - Hen-pount counts conducted by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists indicate spring 1988 wild turkey production was the lowest in recent history.

Extremely dry weather during the critical early spring period cut into nesting success and poult survival, according to Don Wilson, upland game program leader.

However, hunters still should see enty of turkeys during the upcoming fall and spring hunting seasons. "This year was a bad one for production, but 1987 was outstanding," Wilson said. This means there are enough holdover birds to keep overall populations fairly, high, he

The statewide average count of poults per hen this year was 0.25, compared to 2.67 poults per hen in 1987. Wilson said that of the 6,021 hens observed during 1988 surveys, only 469 were seen with

This lack of production was consistent throughout the state's turkey range. Counts averaged less than one poult per hen in the five major ecological regions that comprise most of the state's turkey

The fall turkey hunting season runs concurrently with the white-tailed deer season. In most of Texas the regular season is Nov. 5 - Jan. 1. In South Texas, the whitetail season is Nov. 12 - Jan. 8.

--more realistic estimates using the

worker's anticipated future earnings and recent unposted earnings, as well as in-

cluding projected real wage growth.

-- the number of credits the worker needs to be insured for each type of bene-

People who complete the new request form are asked to provide information about their recent earnings (which are not yet on record), their expected future earnings, and the age at which they plan to

retire. This information is used in calculating the benefit estimates.

People can get a Form 7004 to request the new statement by calling toll-free 1-800-937-2000 or by writing to Consumer Information Center, Department 55, Pueblo, CO 81009.

The new statement serves as a tool for workers to verify their posted earnings and to learn the amount of estimated FICA taxes paid on the earnings. It also explains what they may expect in the way of Social Security protection so as to aid their planning for their future financial security. And, it demonstrates that Social Security is a continuous producer of their planning for their future financial security. 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
