



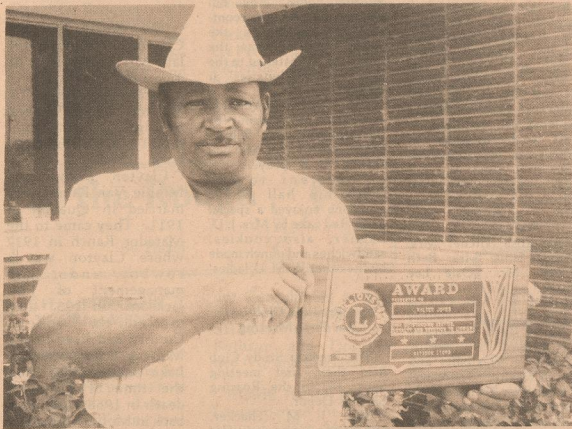

## Walter Jones Named Lion Of The Year

Local businessman, Lion Walter Jones last week received the Matador Lions Club's highest honor, the "Lion of the Year Award."

Presentation of a plaque designating Lion Jones as the recipient of the award, was made Tuesday night by Lion John M. Russell at the club's annual Ladies Night, honoring the Motley County School faculty members and their spouses, and wives of the Lions Club members.

Lion Jones was cited for his many contributions to civic activities. "He is always willing to do more than his part in any project, and his untiring efforts have been an asset, not only to the club, but to the community," Lion Russell declared.

The Lions and their guests assembled in the sanctuary of the First United Methodist Church for opening ceremonies, including the song "America," led by Lion R. E. Musical entertainment for the evening was by Charles Overstreet of Dougherty, with his violin, accompanied at the piano by Lion Gerald Pipkin, which was enthusiastically applauded by the audience. Benediction was by Rev. Gary Hillyard, pastor of First Baptist Church.

Officers and directors of the Homecoming Association met last Wednesday night, at the home of the president, Darla Cruse Gwinn, to make final arrange-

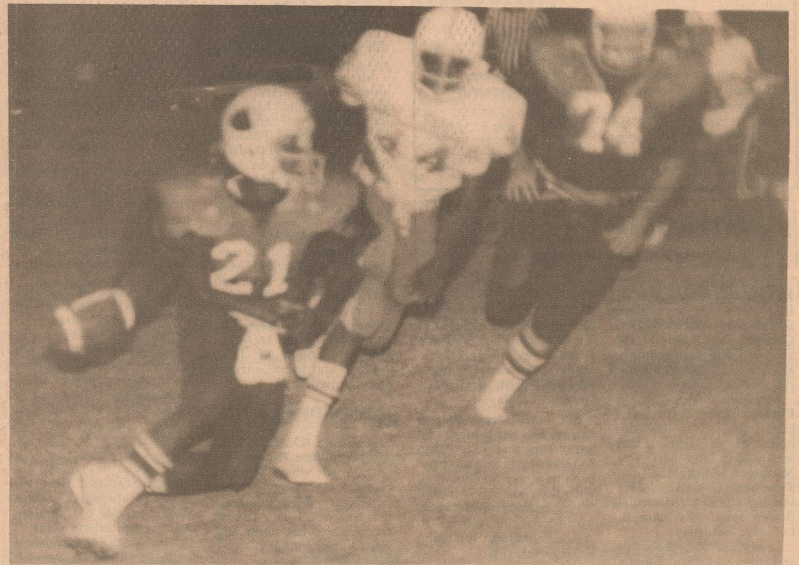

Motley County scored touchdowns the first two times they had the ball Friday night and went on to beat the Spur Bulldogs 27-8.

Spur received the opening kickoff but had to punt after nine plays. Six plays later Harvey Lee ran 38 yards to score. Charlie Campbell kicked the extra points, and with 6:30 left in the 1st quarter the Matadors led 7-0.

Stephen Zarate recovered a Spur fumble on the Bulldogs next play and M. C. took over again on the Spur 12 yard line. Two plays later Campbell ran a reverse and went in standing up for another TD. With 5:46 left in the 1st quarter, the score stood 13-0.

The Bulldogs tightened their defense and both sides had to punt for the next several possessions. With 2:28 left in the half Tim Shannon recovered a Spur fumble and two plays later Lee ran 46 yards to give M. C. a first down. Then Jerry Long completed a pass from Shawn Bearden and was tackled inside the one yard line. The referee ruled Long had fumbled the ball before he hit the ground, so Spur was given a recovery on the six inch line. Four plays later, Wesley Stafford recovered a Spur fumble on the 18 yard line, but the half ended before M. C. could score again.

Spur played a tough 3rd quarter and about the only thing the Matadors accomplished was a fumble recovery by Kelly Wilson with 2:26 left.

M. C. fumbled early in the 4th quarter and Spur put together an 11 play drive to the one yard line. Then the Spur quarterback fumbled into the endzone where a Spur player fell on the ball for a touchdown. A try for the two points extra was good, so with 6:09 left in the final quarter, it was M. C. on top 13-8.

Both teams fumbled the next times they got the ball. Glen Calvert got the ball back for M. C. on the Spur 13 yard line and that set up a one yard quarterback sneak by Bearden four plays later. The score was 19-8 after an extra point by Campbell.

Stafford recovered another Spur fumble with 1:40 left but M. C. could not move and punted. Spur fumbled

the punt and Dwight Campbell recovered it on the 15 yard line. With 15 seconds left in the game Lee ran in from 15 yards out to finish the game with M. C. winning 27-8.

The Matadors will face a tough Sudan squad here next Friday night. All fans are urged to attend and support the Motley County Matadors.

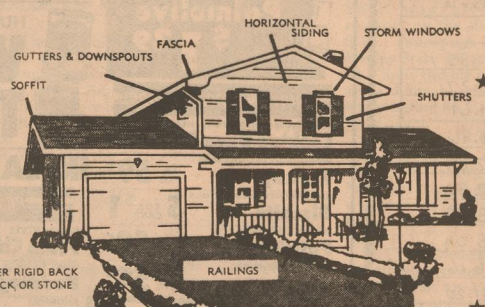

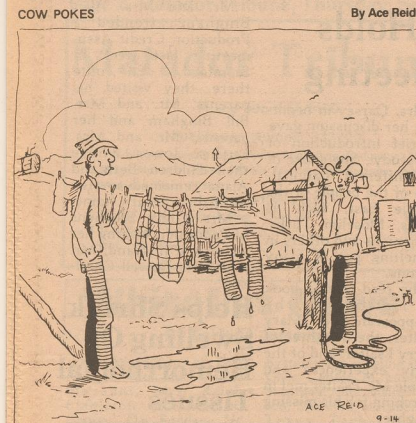
