Motley County Is Cited For Heart Fund Contributions

Motley County has been cited for outstanding contributions to the American Heart Association and is scheduled to receive state recognition, according to information received by Mrs. H. R. Jameson, Special Events Chairman of AHA for Motley County.

The awards, which will be presented at a designated time and place to be set, by a representative from the state office of the Heart Association include two certificates and a plaque.

Motley County merits the awards for having exceeded all fund raising records, according to its population, Mrs. Jameson explained, quoting a regional director.

Mrs. Jameson, who serves also as Motley County representative for South Plains Health Systems Corp., has been active in alerting the public to symptoms relating to heart disease, through films describing proper diets, exercise and how to relieve job tension problems. These have been shown to the science classes at school as well as various

organizations such as senior citizens groups, Lions clubs in Roaring Springs and Matador. One showing in Flomot was attended by residents from adjoining communities of Turkey, Quitaque and Lockney.

"Although Motley County is listed as one of the counties in Texas with less pollution, and geographically the altitude is neither too high nor too low to cause blood pressure problems, yet according to popula-

tion there are more cardiac and cardiovascular patients here than in any county in the South Plains area," Mrs. Jameson said. "The American Heart Association appreciates all the support it has received here."

Program Features Isometric Exercises

Isometric Exercises was the program presented by Carly Hayes of Abilene, Wednesday, September 10 at the regular meeting of the Flomot Homemakers Extension Club. The meeting was held in the Community Center Building in Flomot.
Mrs. Wilson Barton, president, introduced Mr. Hayes, who is an ex-pro football and basketball player, 4-H leader and associated with the West Texas Utility Co.

"You can buy a new car, house and clothes when they are needed, but you cannot buy a new body," said Mr. Hayes in introduction. "A Doctor can repair your body, but he cannot give you a new one, so it is the individual's responsibility to take care of the one he has."

This is where Isometric exercises can be a benefit, he stated, because they do as much good as strenuous ones and you can lose weight and firm muscles, without weight lifts of dumb-bells, when doing your housework, driving a car, watching T.V. and other everyday activities. With Mrs. Roger Lee assisting him, he

demonstrated 27 exercises that would improve muscles throughout the body.

At the conclusion of the informative and enjoyable program, Mr. Hayes said the lack of salt in the diet would cause muscle cramps rather than over exertion as many think. Also, though milk is an important part of the diet, you should not drink it before participating in sports or other strenuous activities.

Mr. Hayes' interest in Isometric exercises began when conducting classes for members of 4-H Clubs. He gives demonstrations throughout Texas and due to the volume of requests, he had a book published on Isometric Exercises.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1980

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 35 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to permit banks to establish and operate unmanned teller machines within the county or city where the banks are located and to share the use of teller machines on a basis consistent with anti-trust laws, if it finds such operation will serve the convenience of the public. The Legislature has already passed enabling legislation (H.B. 1510) for this proposed amendment.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting the legislature to authorize banks to use unmanned teller machines within the county or the city of their domicile on a shared basis to serve the public convenience."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 97 proposes a constitutional amendment that would grant the State and the accused the right to an interlocutory appeal from the following trial court rulings in criminal cases: pretrial rulings on the constitutionality of a statute; on a motion to quash, dismiss, or set aside an indictment; and on a motion to suppress evidence. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing appeal of certain pretrial rulings of a trial court in a criminal case by either the state or the accused."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 98 proposes a constitutional amendment that would require a single appraisal of all property subject to ad valorem taxation and would provide for a single board of equalization within each county. The con-

stitutional requirement that the county commissioners court sit as a board of equalization would be eliminated, and elected officials of the county or governing body of the taxing unit would be prohibited from serving as members of the board of equalization.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment requiring a single appraisal and a single board of equalization within each county for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 18 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to authorize the conduct of bingo games by certain specified groups for charitable purposes, subject to the limitations that operation of the games must be approved in local option elections and that all proceeds must be spent in Texas.

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize bingo games on a local option election basis if the games are conducted by a church, synagogue, religious society, volunteer fire department, nonprofit veterans organization, fraternal organization, or nonprofit organization supporting medical research or treatment programs and if the proceeds are to be spent in Texas for charitable purposes of the organizations."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 86 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Legislature to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of certain appropriated funds, subject to any conditions and limitations provided by law and subject to the ap-

proval of a budget execution committee that would be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House of Representatives, Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, and Chairman and Vice-chairman of the Committee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to grant the governor power to exercise fiscal control over the expenditure of appropriated funds as provided by law."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeals and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the Governor who appointed a previously confirmed official to remove that official from office subject to the advice and consent of the Senate, and if the Legislature is not in session, to call a special session of the Senate which may last no longer than 2 days for consideration of the removal.

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 121 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize counties with a population of 5000 or less to construct and maintain private roads if they impose a reasonable charge for the work. The Legislature by general law may limit this authority. Revenue received from private road work may be used only for the construction, including right-of-way acquisition, or maintenance of public roads.

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing counties with a population of 5000 or less to perform private road work."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would change the jurisdiction and authority of the State's appellate courts. The amendment would change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals to Courts of Appeals and provide that these courts have intermediate appellate jurisdiction over both criminal and civil cases. The amendment would change titles for the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court to Justices and would require members of the Supreme Court to be attorneys licensed in this state while holding office.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to change the name of the Courts of Civil Appeals and the names and qualifications of the Justices of the Supreme Court and to prescribe the jurisdiction and authority of the appellate courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 54 proposes a constitutional amendment which defines separate property owned by either spouse as all property, both real and personal, of a spouse owned or claimed before marriage, and that acquired afterward by gift, devise or descent. Persons about to marry and spouses, without the intent to defraud pre-existing creditors, may by written instrument from time to time partition between themselves all or part of their property. Spouses may exchange a community interest in property owned or to be acquired for a community interest in other community property. The amendment would allow spouses to agree in writing that income or property arising from any separate property is to be separate property rather than as community property as it would be in the absence of an agreement. The amendment proposes that a gift from one spouse to another is presumed to include all income or property deriving from such gift.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing spouses to agree that income or property arising from separate property is to be separate property."
