Matadors Defeat **Crosbyton Chiefs**

Motley County Matadors edged past Crosbyton Friday night by a score of 22 - 19 to keep an unblemished record. The game proved to be the expected tough test for the Matadors as Crosbyton's offense stopped Motley County's ground game and forced them to take to the air.

Jerry Lee accounted for all of Motley County's touchdowns, two of which were pass plays from Harold Dempsey. The final touchdown was a "clutch-grab" catch in the last minute to pull out the victory. Offensively, Lee led in rushes with 70 yards.
Crosbyton's running game proved formidable as they

rambled for eight first downs and one touchdown on the ground. Defensively, the Matadors secondary, which was crippled in the first half, allowed two touchdowns in the air. Mark Wason's sterling performance at safety position accounted for two interceptions and a fumble recovery that stopped Crosbyton drives.

"The game was a good one for the Matadors because they had to show a great deal of drive and determination to come back and win in the fourth quarter," said Coach Randy

Flomot Gins First Bale

First bale of cotton ginned in Motley County for the 1977 fall crop was produced by Alfred Martin and ginned by the Caprock Gin at Flomot, Sept. 17. The cotton weighed 2120 pounds on the trailer. There were 975 pounds of seed and the bale weighed 604 pounds. This was the first cotton ginned with the new hydraulic suction equipment that has been installed recently at Caprock Gin.

The gin paid Mr. Martin 60 cents per pound for the cotton and \$60.00 per ton for the cotton seed, according to Rex

The first bale was ginned free, and area merchants made up \$310.00 premium for Mr. Martin, making the first bale worth



NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

(S.J.R. 5)
S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemp-tions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preserva-

tion of cultural, historical or natural history resources. The wording of the pro-posed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional

amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve cer-tain cultural, historical, or natural history re-sources."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19) S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as "The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refund-able assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non discriminatory basis.

follows: "The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of elec-tronic devices or ma-chines."


