Prof. Grub, in reporting on composting waste both in a drum digestion system and in open composting, concluded that this too, is a feasible solution but "requires skilled management to obtain satisfactory results."

Most waste now is piled in open composting without any system for stabilizing it, the researchers found. It could be treated in specially designed digesters or in exposed compost piles turned at regular intevals. When stabilized the compost could be stored in a wet or dry state without danger of heating, attracting insects or causing noxious ordors. While feasible, this also represents added cost to feedlot operation.

Working with Grub in this study were a graduate student, J. D. Martin, and Instructor L. L. Keeton

Keeton also presented a paper on the effects of manure depth on runoff from southwestern cattle feedlots. This research was done in association with Grub, Wells, Meenaghan and Albin.

"For Food and Fellowship, Thank God", says the simplest of all graces, and of these two blessings there has never been any lack at Christmas time. A vast dinner of roast turkey, with all its trimmings, plum pudding and mince pies appear every year on countless tables throughout the world. Turkey, though now traditional, is a comparative newcomer, unknown in Europe before about 1542, and appearing then only as one among a variety of festival dishes. Goose or beef for Christmas pies were the ear-ly favorites in ordinary families, while in great houses there were swans, venison, peacocks and the boar's head.

Boar's head was eaten during the Scandinavian Yule in honor of the Sun-boar. At the great medieval Christmas ban-quets the head was garlanded with rosemary and bay, and an orange or an apple was thrust between the teeth. Christmas puddings, as we know them today, d ate only from about 1670, and began as a stiffened form of plum great medieval Christmas ban-

as a stiffened form of plum porridge. This was made of meat broth, raisins, frult juices, wine and spices thickened by bread crumbs.

### PETTICOAT TREE

Use a gay petticoat to replace the cotton at the base of your Christmas tree this year.

The "petticoat" can be made quickly with felt and pinking shears. Cut a hole in the middle of the felt and slash from outer edge to fit around the tree.

### **Christmas Seals** Came from Denmark

Slightly newer than the Christmas card is the Christmas seal.

The Christmas seal was originated by a postal clerk, Einar Holboell, who ordered the first Christmas seals printed and sold at regular post offices in Denmark. While stamping letters and Christmas cards in 1903 in the post office in Copenhagen, the idea occurred to him. Why not have a special stamp printed for the many tuberculosis sufferers who need hospital treatment? The first year more than four million stamps were sold, yielding some 18,000 dollars.

The movement for adopting the stamp in the United States was greatly strengthened through the efforts of Miss Emily Bissell of Willmington. Delaware. She designed the Great Christmas coal barself first Christmas seal herself. It had a half wreath of holly and a cross, with "Merry Christ-mas" in the center and "Happy New Year" at the bottom.

### PLANT HOLLY

Holly can be grown in any sunny spot. Although a slow growing tree, a Holly will pro-duce ample Christmas trim in a few years. Holly likes well drained soils and should never be planted closer than 15 feet from a house from a house.

### **USE TREE**

Erect the tree in the backyard after Christmas and convert it into a bird feeder. Pieces of suet, popcorn, peanut butter, and all other morsels of food are tied to the outer branches. Do keep

### OUTDOOR TRIM

Pines, fir and spruce around a house can be safely decorated with lights, and add a Christ-masy touch to the entire neigh-borhood. Bulbs of 15 wattage are suf-ficient for outdoor glow. Hang outdoor sockets downward to prevent water and snow from collecting in them and rubber-jacketed cord should connect the lights.

### THE FIRST GIFTS

The first Christmas gifts were those which the Wise men carried to Bethlehem to lay becarried to Bethlehem to lay be-fore the Christ Child in the manger. Their gifts given in adoration, were precious items of the day — gold, frankin-cense, and myhrr. The latter two were gum resins used in medicines and perfumes. But, then as now, it is the spirit of giving rather than the gift itself that makes it most appreciated.

### TREE LIGHTS

Decorating the tree need not confusion. Straighten the strings of lights, and remove all kinks, along the floor. Test the bulbs and replace bad ones. Then, if you are using more than one color bulb, they can be arranged alternately.

Starting at the top, string lights around the tree. Place lights on the inside bows first. Disconnect light strings before hanging ornaments.




