Presented by program chairman Frank Price, the coach praised the members of the team for their good group efforts. "We don't use the pep-talk

strategy with the boys," he said. "We try to instill in them the advantages of good teamwork. They know what is expected of them and we think they should have enough intelligence and ambition of their own, to get in there and win."

Lion Alan Bingham presided in the absence of president Lion Ronnie Vandiver, and led the club in an expression of thanks to Lion Walter Jones for an enjoyable meal.

Tailtwister Lion Larry Hoyle announced that all Lions not present at the church service would be fined.

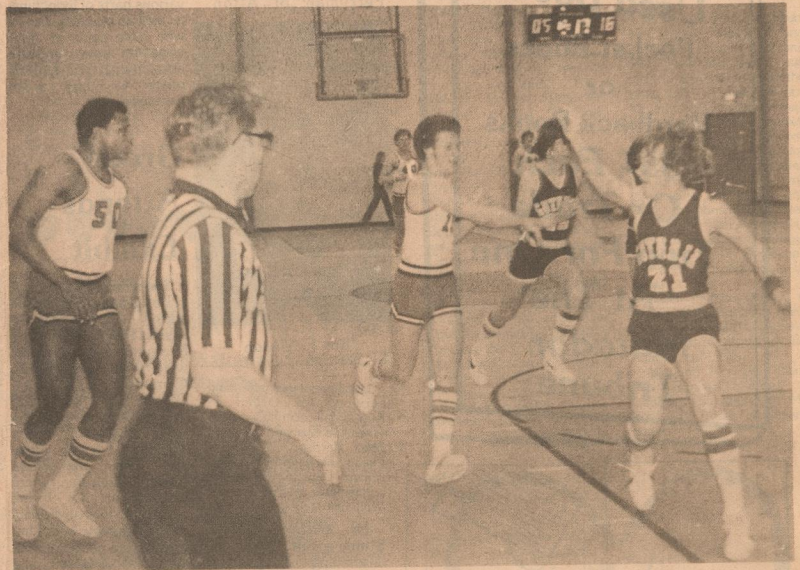
Tickets for the banquet

## Many Services Offered At Motley General Clinic

The Motley General Clinic, located in the old Traweek Hospital, is open five days a week with a full range of medical services. Roy Tippin, RN, Nurse Practitioner is available at the clinic Monday through Friday and Dr. Victor Chavez of Lubbock is in the clinic on Tuesdays and Thursdays for patient care.

Some of the services offered are full laboratory services, family planning, routine PAP test and OB care through the seventh month of pregnancy as well as other general services.

Prices at the clinic are comparative to prices charged elsewhere and the clinic will also accept Medicare and Medicaid as well as other insurance. Clinic personnel is available to help in filing insurance forms.

At the present time X-Ray services are not offered, but clinic personnel hope to have this service available sometime this year.

Roy Tippin said, "If more people utilize the clinic, more services will be made available for the health care of the people in Motley County."

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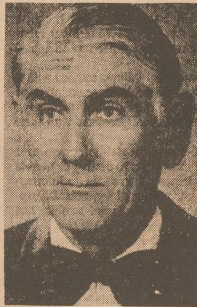
## Vinson Named To Scottish Rite Post

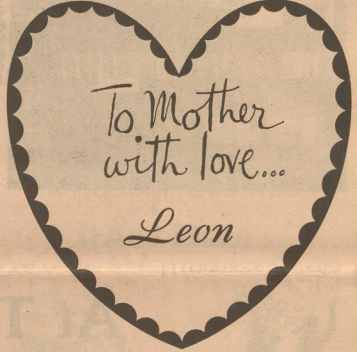

Fifty-two Americans (two of them women) spent 444 days in a foreign prison. They were arrested, thrown in jail by a gang of anarchists. They were beaten, some of them put in dungeons and treated more like animals than human beings.

But sir, it seems the suffering and mistreatment they endured did more to unite and bring the American people back together than any thing that has happened in the past 50 years. I heard one of them say he spent most of the time in solitary confinement and he never knew what freedom meant until this happened. But he knows now.

My fellow Americans, we had better stand up and take notice of what has happened to us and our country within the past 40 years. My friends, I love my country and my God because I was born free 83 years ago. There were no government regulations, no government forms to fill out. The only government official in the phone directory in a city the size of Lubbock was the Postmaster.

I don't like to pay income tax any more than you but as long as it is the

law, I will abide by it and pay every dime I owe. My Bible tells me to be honest with my government. When the Congress stopped using the Constitution, the great majority were liberals and by using the income tax to collect money they thought they could set up a utopia and completely do away with poverty. But Jesus told Judas that the poor would be with them always. Read John, chapter 12 verses four through seven.

# Highway Litter Pick-up Tops \$10 Million Mark

AUSTIN—Picking up litter along Texas roadsides cost over a million dollars more in fiscal 1980 than in 1979.

"Litter pick-up by our maintenance crews cost \$10.3 million from September 1, 1979, through August 31, 1980," said Mark Goode, engineer-director of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. "During fiscal 1979, the price tag for cleaning up highway rights-of-way was \$9.2 million. That was a larger cost figure than ever before, but it has been surpassed handily this year."

"Litter costs are spiraling and we want Texas taxpayers to know about it," Goode said. "Littering is an irresponsible, illegal and thoughtless action. It's unbelievable what some of our maintenance crews find lying alongside the roads—old furniture, auto parts, diapers and household garbage."

The department does its best to keep Texas roadsides clear of rubbish, but it is a frustrating and costly task. The agency is in the business of keeping Texas traffic

moving, yet its crews must spend many thousands of valuable man-hours picking up motorists' trash. Litter picked up one day is often replaced by more the next. "It's a disgrace—and littering is so unnecessary," he said.

Highways are just one area where litter presents problems in Texas. Trash along beaches, lakeshores, in parks and other public places upsets tourists and locals alike. City streets share in the litter problem, too.

What's to be done about it? Mark Goode says his department believes education is the key.

"With the help of the media, newspapers, television and radio, and through our own offices, we are trying more intensively than ever before to educate youngsters and adults alike about the costliness, ugliness and needlessness of littering," Goode said.

During 1980, the department sent out several news releases to the press concerning the litter problem. It also produced four film public service announcements for television which have been provided periodically to all Texas TV stations.

A total of 56,000 colorful folders have been distributed to remind Texans that littering costs everyone hard-earned tax dollars and mars the beauty and grandeur of the state.

"Our 16mm motion picture, 'A Litter MESSage,' has been viewed by over 300,000 Texans and is the most popular film in our free loan film library, particularly with schools," Goode said.

Litter bags are available at the department's 12 Texas Tourist Bureaus around the state and several thousand roadside litter barrels are maintained for convenient use by travelers.

"We hope Texans take heed of our anti-litter program," Goode said. "After all, being a Texan isn't just a state of mind; it's the privilege of preserving our heritage and taking pride in our state's progressiveness. We must all take care to keep Texas clean and attractive, for ourselves and for future generations. Preventing litter is a good way of saying, 'I'm a Texan and proud of it,' and an excellent way of freeing millions of tax dollars for a more productive purpose," he said.

## Revised Income Guidelines For Free and Reduced-Price Meals

Recently enacted Federal legislation made some changes in the income scale used at the beginning of the school year to determine students eligible for free and reduced-price meals. The income scale below will be used from January 1, 1981 to September 30, 1981. If your income has changed since you filed your application at the beginning of the school year, and if you believe your children would be eligible under the new income scale for free or reduced-price meals, please contact the school for an application form. The new Income Scale removes the hardship provisions previously allowed, and places a standard deduction into the new scale. Therefore, in determining a child's eligibility, the school shall compare the family's income to the guidelines without allowing any hardship deductions. The family of each child whose eligibility for benefits is reduced or terminated shall receive written notice of the reduction in benefits at least 10 days prior to the date of the reduction.

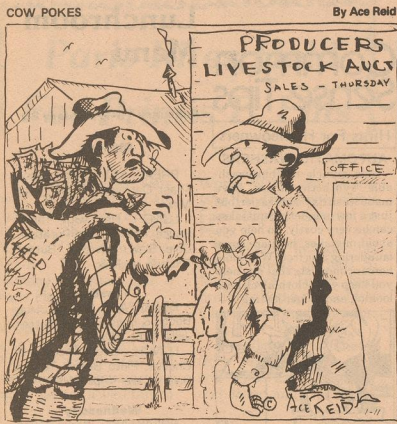
