Matadors Win 38-0 Over Silvertown Owls

The Motley County Matadors, one of the state's top-ranked Class

1A teams, ran its season record to 6-0 Friday night with a 38-0 win over

Silvertown in District 2-1A action. Motley County had

seven penetrations to Silvertown's 0, and had a total of 396 yards to the Owls 96 total yards.

The Matadors hit quickly as Harvey Lee sprinted 62 yards to score on the game's second play from scrimmage, then came back on a one-yard dive in the first period.

In the second quarter, quarterback Shawn Bearden hit Charlie Campbell on a 32-yard scoring toss, then Bearden sprinted 19 yards to paydirt. Campbell's PAT kick gave Motley County a 25-0 halftime lead.

Bearden went to the airways again in the third quarter as he hit Dwight Campbell on a 17 yard pass for a score, then Gary Simpson closed out the scoring on a 2-yard run with Campbell booting the PAT.

Lee was the leading rusher with 162 yards in 16 carries.

The Matadors will face the Nazareth Swifts here Friday night before a Homecoming Crowd on Burlson Field. The game is scheduled for 7:30 p.m. Team warmup is set for 6:30 and Pregame Activities begin at 7:10.

Everyone is encouraged to attend the game and give the Motley County Matadors your support.


understanding through the exchange student program.

Host families receive a high school exchange student for three to nine months starting in mid December. They are to be enrolled in local High

Schools. Likes, dis-likes, hobbies, and personalities of the students will be fit as nearly as possible to the same qualities of the host families. The students bring their own spending money and are fully covered with medical insurance. "We do not want them to be guests in your home," the Jeffreys said, "but want them to learn about middle income American family life."

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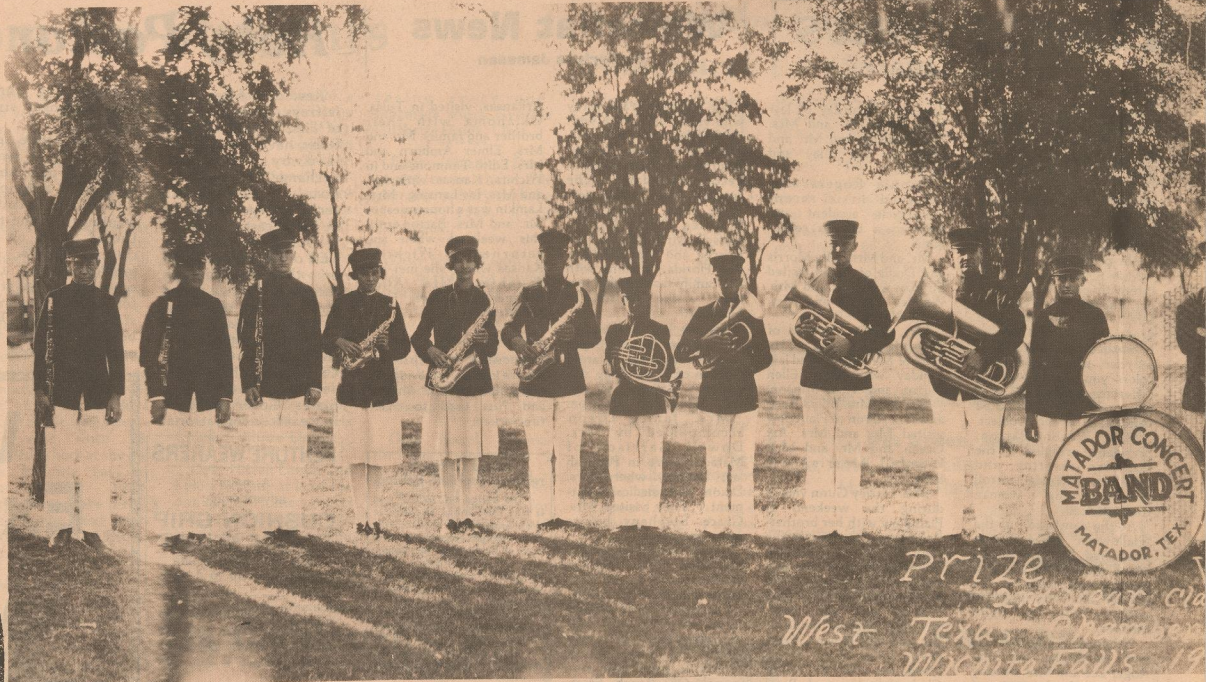

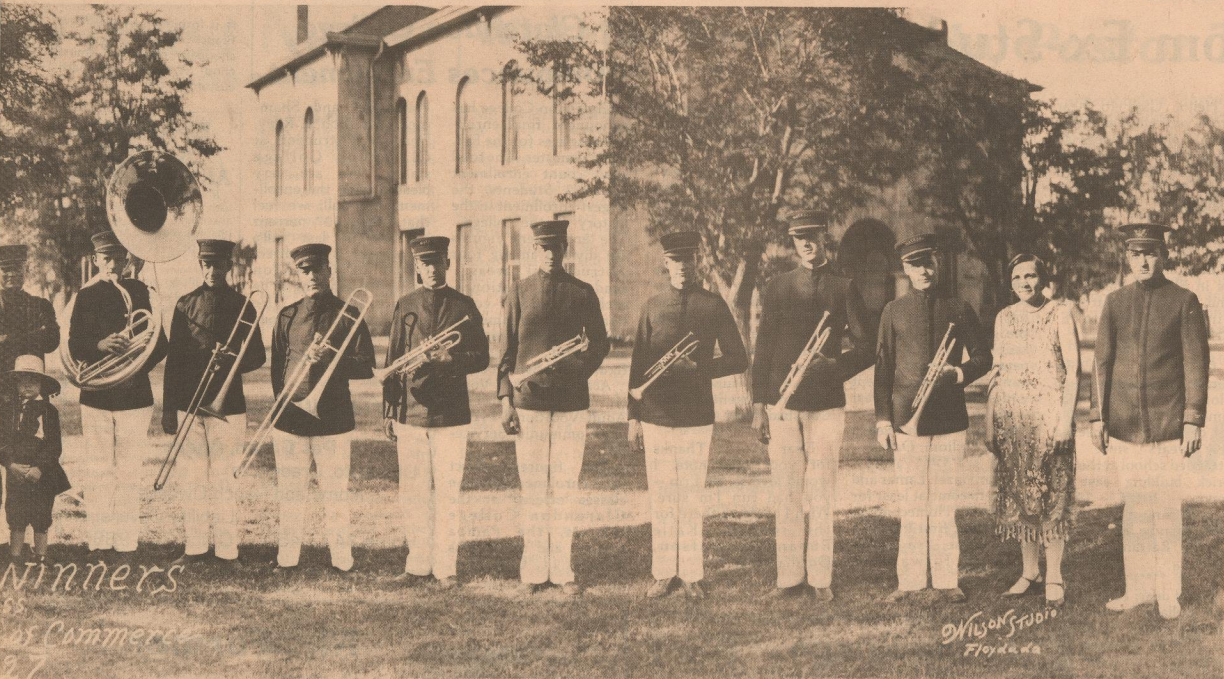

THE BANDSTAND THAT ISN'T HERE -- For many years the bandstand in this picture stood at the southwest corner of the courthouse grounds. No one seems to remember when it was constructed, or when it was razed. In 1944 a Memorial Board containing the names of all Motley County servicemen, was dedicated in Armistice Day ceremonies. The board was erected on the south side of the bandstand and the top of the bandstand is visible in a Tribune photo printed at that time. It is believed that this structure was torn down sometime in the late 1940's or early 1950's.

It was voted also to provide toothbrushes for Girlstown residents and these are to be taken to the spring convention. These and other matters were passed upon during the general assembly in the church sanctuary, where organ music was provided by Mrs. Frank Pohl. Mrs. Campbell called the meeting to order and led the women in the Club Collect in unison, for the invocation. Pledge of Allegiance was led by Mrs. W. E. Welch of Quanah, and the National Anthem was led by Mrs. Joe Singer of Iowa Park. After Pledge

to the Texas Flag led by Mrs. Worth Shawver of Seymour, Mrs. Singer directed the singing of the state song "Texas, Our Texas," and "God Bless America." Welcome was by Mrs. Furman Vinson, Matador, with response by Mrs. T. E. Long, Paducah, 2nd vice president. A business session for reports followed, and afterwards the women adjourned to the Fellowship Hall to study the exhibits. Workshop displays included Texas Heritage, Home Life, Education, Public Affairs, Arts and Conservation. This method of conducting departmental features met with enthusiasm by the clubs. Music by the Estes Sisters of Matador,

Mesdames W. F. Jacobs, Robert Darsey and R. E. Campbell Jr., opened the second session of the morning. Their first song, "Yellow Rose of Texas," was dedicated to the district president, Mrs. Campbell. This was followed by "San Antonio Rose." Accompaniment was by Mrs. Pohl. The remainder of the session was devoted to reports with Mrs. Erwin Soell, President Elect of Iowa Park, presiding. El Progreso Club hosted the luncheon. Grace was offered by Mrs. John Hamilton and introduction of those at the head table was by Mrs. Joel Ellett, 1st vice president, of Burkburnett. Mrs. Earl F. Watson of Iowa Park, past president, presented a film on Community

Improvement, stressing the theme, "Women Make the Difference," distributed by the Sears Foundation. Accordion music during the meal was played by Mrs. Una Simpson. Reports by departmental chairmen comprised the afternoon session, after assembly singing led by Mrs. Singer. A roll call by the president revealed an attendance of 52 clubwomen, including the 30 board members, six club presidents and one life member. Towns represented were Burkburnett, Iowa Park, Memphis, Paducah, Quanah, Seymour, Vernon, Wichita Falls and Matador. Door prizes were given at both morning and afternoon sessions.
