

A number of fields may have completely different conditions, therefore, each field should be scouted separately to determine presence of bollworms. Bollworms On Increase In Area Cotton

other insects and the right weather conditions these eggs will hatch in about 3 days. The small worms will start feeding in the terminal of the plant and start moving from square to square and into bolls as they increase in size. These worms can cause damage to as many as seven squares or bolls in its life cycle. Tontrol of these insects should be based on various conditions. Such things as yield potential, age of cotton, beneficial insect popula-tion, percentage of damaged squares, and worm numbers and size Cotton bollworms have increased over the past several weeks in area cotton. Very low populations are being found in the dryland cotton but higher numbers are being found in irrigated fields. Bollworms can cause severe damage to a cotton crop in a very short period of time. The bollworm moth usually lays its eggs singlely on the upper side leaves in the top 1/3 of the plant. These eggs are small white to tan eggs with ridges running vertically along them.

New Funeral Laws **Outlined For Lions**

New laws passed by e State Legislature

The law now requires that a complete record must be kept by funeral homes, showing that they presented the overhead cost of each funeral, and that they must show all caskets stocked, with the price list, Lion Freeman said. A new law on embalm-ing, he said, does not require a body to be embalmed if buried within 24 hours of death. However, if it is moved to another state, it must be embalmed or sealed in an airright container. Under the new law a funeral director must have permission from the deceased's family, to embalm, but if the family cannot be contacted within two hours, he may proceed without the consent. This informa-tion must be kept on file for two years, Lion Freeman said, and if it is Freeman said, and if it is not on file when checked, or the consent is incorrect, the funeral director is subject to a fine of \$1,000.00. Other data set forth concerned the Veterans

Administration's allow-ance for service-related Administration's allow-ance for service-related deaths or disability, and Social Security allow-ance. Finally, Lion Freeman explained, the director must place a card in the casket showing itemized cost of the funeral, if selected by the funeral, if selected by the funeral if accepted as offered with the selec-tion.


