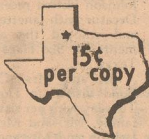

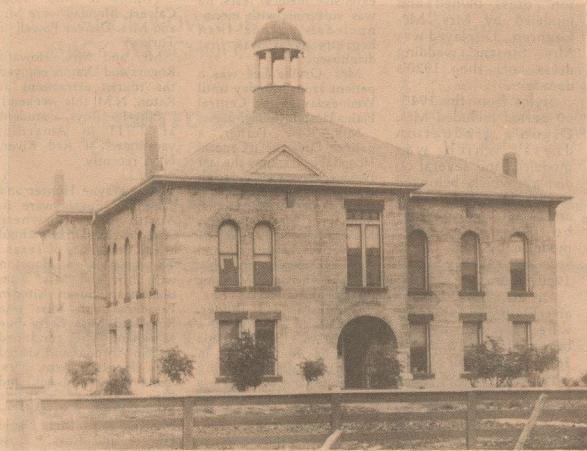

## Old Settlers Days Set For County

The 57th Annual Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion is set for August 28, 29 and 30 at the Old Settlers Grounds in Roaring Springs.

A western parade will kick off the activities at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday. Ribbons for different parade winners will be awarded immediately following the parade.

Texas State Senator Ray Farabee will be the principle speaker at the program, which will be held at the Tabernacle following the parade.

The rodeo is set for 8:30 p.m. each evening at the arena.

There will be two dances held each night. The Old Timers dance begins each night at 8:30 p.m. with music by Donnie Richards and the Young Folks dance begins at 9:30 each night with music by the Maines Brothers Band.

The 1980 Rodeo Queen will be crowned on Saturday night at the rodeo. The Queen is chosen by who sells the most tickets on the saddle to be given away Saturday night.

The oldest residents present will be recognized and also the person who traveled the farthest. The Memorial Service for persons who have died since the last Old Settlers will also be held at this time. A business meeting is set for 1:00 p.m.

The Predicta Study Club of Roaring Springs will hold a Barbecue at the Depot for the noon meal and Walter Jones will be selling barbecue and other items at the Concession Stand for the three day event.

A meeting will be held tonight (Thursday) at 7:30 p.m. in the Motley County Courthouse to discuss the TV reception here.

This meeting is for Matador residents and

also persons living in the rural areas around Matador.

## Knox City To Host SCS Field Day, Aug. 27

A field day will be held at the Soil Conservation Service Plant Materials Center at Knox City on August 27, 1980.

James Gillespie, district conservationist for SCS at Matador, said the public is being invited to the event. The center serves both Texas and Oklahoma.

Billy Carr, manager of University lands (surface interests), Midland, will be the principal speaker. Carr will speak at 12:30 p.m.

Guided tours will be conducted through the 90-acre center from 9:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. The center is located on FM 1292, 2 miles north and 2 1/2 miles west of Knox City.

A barbecue lunch will be available on a prepaid

basis at \$4 per plate. Payment should be sent to Ms. Doris Crownover, Chamber of Commerce, Box 91, Knox City, Texas 79529 by August 23.

Seed or rootstock from native plants that show potential for solving specific soil and water conservation problems are collected, then grown and evaluated at the Knox City Center. The more promising ones are then tested under field conditions. Selections which prove superior to commercial varieties are then released to seed growers. These products then grow seed and sell it to the public.

Several hundred strains of grasses, legumes forbs, and waddy plants are being tested at Knox City.

## EMS Slide Show Presented To Lions

Ed Paul, regional coordinator for South Plains Emergency Medical Services in Lubbock, presented a 10 minute slide show, Tuesday, to the Matador Lions Club.

He discussed personnel, equipment, training and cumminations, and stated that the more education or training a person gets the more lives he can save.

He also reported on coordinated record keeping, ambulance services, disaster planning, budget, and other topics pertaining to emergency medical training.

A medical emergency is sudden. It's frightening. And what happens in the first critical minutes can mean the difference between life and death.

A blocked airway, careless movement of a fractured spine, unchecked bleeding, an apparently lifeless heart - all can bring further injury... or death. That's why emergency

medical services are being improved throughout the South Plains - to help victims survive those first critical minutes before they reach the hospital and a doctor's care.

EMS volunteers provide the only emergency medical ambulance service available in many South Plains communities. Most of these volunteers are everyday citizens trained and certified in basic life support. Certified Advanced Life Support ambulance personnel are now available in Lubbock County and will be available in other communities in the future. Ambulances certified by the Texas Department of Health operate in 14 counties. More than 60 percent of the ambulance personnel are state certified.

Twenty-three hospitals in the region provide various levels of immediate emergency medical care. Several of

them are staffed and equipped to provide intensive in-patient care for critically ill and injured patients.

## DPS Offers Tips For Labor Day Trips

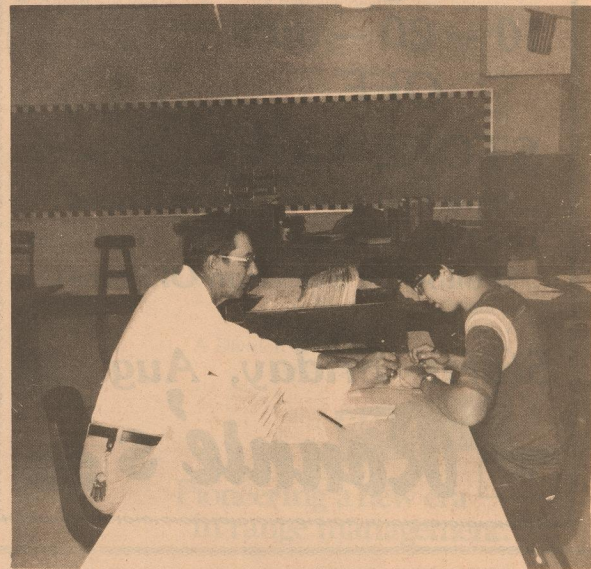
Major C. W. Bell, Regional Commander of the DPS said "The Texas Department of Public Safety is preparing to save lives and prevent injuries on the Texas highways this Labor Day. Are you planning to do the same?"

"If a Labor Day trip is on your schedule, plan ahead. Know your route and where the turn-offs are located. This is especially important on the interstate highways. Turning suddenly from the wrong lane, or trying to get back to a missed turn-off can be fatal. What the grim total will be the Labor Day weekend depends on each driver, each passenger and each

pedestrian in this state," he said.

The main hazards in Texas, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety, are driving too fast for conditions and the drinking driver. Drivers frequently overlook the fact that weather, traffic and road conditions dictate safe speed. The condition of the driver is often overlooked when returning from a party. It is best to obtain a sober driver for the trip home.

## Baptist Women Portray Century Of Missions

Baptist supported missionary work in foreign lands had been underway for 87 years when Texas women met in October, 1880 in Austin to organize their work, the beginning of Woman's Missionary Union of First Baptist Church, Matador is observing the 100th anniversary of Texas WMU and presented a fashion show and tea, August 5, at the home of Mrs. Larry Hoyle, as a feature of the observance.

Mrs. Hoyle served as narrator for the program, prepared by Mrs. Edgar Lee, which detailed not only religious activities, but social and political trends of the century.

The 100 years of WMU work was divided into 20 year periods. Popular and religious music of each period was featured in piano selections played by Mrs. Stuart Dixon and her daughter, Mrs. Fred Risser, as the models displayed fashions from each era. Special music included also a recording of "The Blue Danube" at the start of the program, and solos by Mrs. Ronnie Vandiver and Mrs. Stanley Martin, during the segments of the program.

The models were Mrs. Roy (Joanie) Stephens, Mrs. Dickie (Joanna) Garrison, Mrs. Larry (Debbie) Neighbors, Mrs. Bill (Judine) McCaghren, Miss Holly Hobbs and Miss Carla Christian. Garments were contributed by Miss Rachel Patton and Mesdames Stuart Dixon, Bill Dunning, Edgar Lee, Fred Risser, Douglas Meador, Alvin Stearns, Bill McCaghren, and Dickie Garrison.

Among the older garments was a gown in the trousseau of Ellen Virginia Garner when she married Jacob Orr Tatom (grandparents of Mrs. Mike Hoyle). The gown, circa 1860, was all hand-stitched and of pure linen. An early 1900 dress had belonged to the late Rosa Patton, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Patton. Several items were on display and included a baby dress belonging to Mrs. Patton, and several shirtwaists belonging to the late Mrs. T. B. Edmondson. Mrs. Larry Hoyle wore a black skirt

which had belonged to Mrs. Edmondson, (Larry's grandmother) in 1907 or 1908. Mrs. Dunning's baby dress and cap were also shown.

Dresses of the 1920-40 era included a 1920 graduation dress belonging to Mrs. Dunning's grandmother, a 1926 graduation banquet dress belonging to Mrs. Meador and a "Charles-ton" dress owned and modeled by Mrs. McCaghren. Displayed was Mrs. Stearns' wedding dress of the 1920's decade.

Styles from the 1940-60 period included Mrs. Dixon's graduation dress, which was modeled, and several on display which belonged to Mrs. Lee. A mini skirt and vest, worn with boots, owned and modeled by Mrs. Garrison represented the 1960-80 era.

On display during the afternoon was a spinning wheel which was brought to Texas in 1871, from Mississippi by Mrs. M. L. Patton Sr. It had belonged to her father, Daniel Boone Cutworth and later was purchased by Mrs. M. L. Patton Jr., and is still in the possession of her daughter, Miss Rachel Patton.

The progress and importance of Southern Baptist work in foreign missionary fields was emphasized throughout the narrative which Mrs. Hoyle concluded with this thought: "As we start the next 100 years, we invite all of you to join with us in reaching thru with us in reaching the whole world for Christ."

Approximately 30 women and girls attended the program and were served tea, coffee, cookies and canapes from an attractively appointed table, by members of the Baptist Young Women's group.

**AREA LUTHERAN AGENCY ANNOUNCES ADOPTION INTAKE**

The Panhandle South Plains Office of the Lutheran Social Service of Texas is inviting couples interested in adoption to contact the agency during the month of September. Each of the eight LSST offices opens "INTAKE" one month per year for families interested in adopting Anglo children, ages 0-8 years. The number of families accepted for study is determined by the volume of referrals anticipated for the following year for Anglo children. Couples seeking to adopt should have no more than one child in the home and be under the age of forty. The agency accepts inquiries from couples of all racial, religious and ethnic backgrounds.

It should be noted that intake is always open to families wishing to adopt Anglo children over the age of eight. Mexican American school-age children, Black or mixed Black children of any age, including infants and children of any ethnic or racial background who are slow learners, emotionally disturbed or physically handicapped. For such adoptions there are no restrictions concerning family size or age.

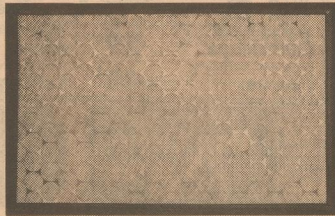

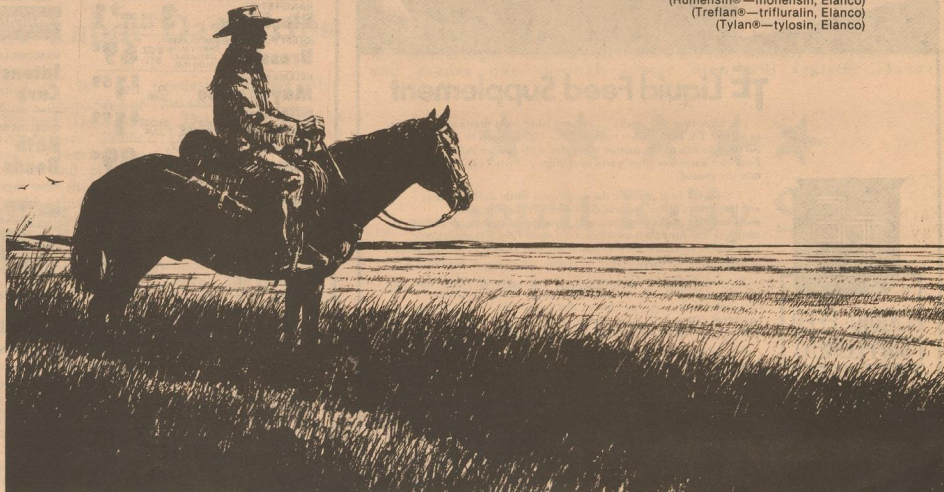

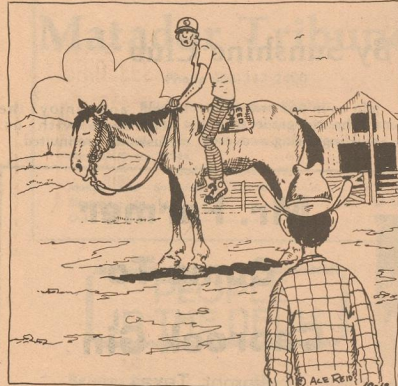

Modern automatic dryers have well designed lint filters to help eliminate any "lint picking" problems. However, even the most efficient lint filters need some fabric sorting help from the homemaker.
