Lazy Eye Alert Annual Goal

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness will put the state on a two-pronged "Lazy Eye Alert" during September, Prevent Blindness Month, in an effort to reach the more than 600,000 youngsters who have an eye problem that can be best treated in the preschool years.

This major effort to "save the young eyes of Texas", as announced by Society president Clymer Wright, Jr., of Houston, is in commemoration of TSPB's 25th birthday as well as being a Society contribution toward the International Year of the Child.

"The first prong will consist of special vision screenings held from Houston to El Paso by volunteers trained by Prevent Blindness," he said.

"While the program is an ongoing one during which more than 36,000 children are screened each year, special emphasis will be given this year to expand general awareness of children's vision needs as well as to increase the

total number screened." Second prong of the "Lazy Eye alert" will be distribution of 200,000 of the Society's "Home Eye Test for Preschoolers." 100,000 of the tests have been printed as a public service project of Soroptimist International of Houston and will be sent to industrial and professional sites for distribution among employees. The second 100,000 have been printed by the Zale Corporation for distribution during September in the pharmacy departments of their 123 Skillern's Drug Stores.

"The Home Eye Test" is a simple-do-it-yourself way for parents to check the vision of their preschoolers at home. It has proven a reliable indicator of vision problems," said Wright. "If the child fails the test, we advise the parents to then take the child for a professional eye examination."

"Similarly, the trained screeners also notify parents whose children fail their vision tests that these children need a

professional examination. The screeners, moreover, follow up for at least six months to make sure the child gets that examination."

The program has been named the "Lazy-Eye Alert" because one of its primary purposes is the detection of an eye weakness known as amblyopia or "lazy eye". The Society warns that a lazy eye usually has no outward signs and that unless treatment for it is started by the age of six, a child can suffer permanent vision loss or even blindness in that eye.

"However, even with all the screenings and test distribution, some children will still be missed in the alert," said Wright and urged parents of these children to write for one of the

The Texas Society to Prevent Blindness was established in 1954 as an affiliate of the National Society to Prevent Blindness.

Matadors Slap Paducah, 26-0

Charlie Campbell scored three touchdowns and rushed for 99 yards Friday as the Matadors shut out Class A Paducah Dragons 26-0.

Also scoring a touchdown was Randy Meredith, and Harvey Lee

scored two touchdowns which were both called back because of penalties. Motley County also had a field-goal nullified by a penalty.

Paducah received the opening kickoff but the Dragons gave up the ball

on downs. Motley County also had to punt on their first possession. On the Matadors second possession, starting on their own 39 yard line, Motley County put together a 19 play drive that covered 61 yards. The drive was finished off with 11:09 left in the second quarter when Campbell, with 4th and goal on the 3 yard line, plunged off right tackle for the score. The point-after-touchdown failed but the Matadors had struck and led the ranked Dragons 6-0.

On the next MC drive, after the team drove to the Paducah 22 yard line, Quarterback Julian Zabielski hit Campbell with an 11 yard pass to the 11. Then Harvey Lee

carried to the 3, where Campbell punched it in again. Zabielski hit Campbell with a pass for the PAT and with 3:01 left in the first half MC led 14-0.

With 7:43 left in the 3rd quarter Campbell took a punt and returned it 64 yards for another touchdown for the Matadors. After the PAT failed MC led 20-0.

Meredith tacked on the final MC points when he broke up the middle, shook off two tacklers and went 15 yards to paydirt. This score was set up by Zabielski when he recovered a fumble on the Dragon 18 yard line.

Motley County coaches praised the defense for a good game, pointing out that the defense had limited Paducah to an average of 3 yards per play, recovered two fumbles, intercepted one pass (by Meredith) and shut out the Dragons.

Defensive standouts were Glen Calvert, Dewayne Walker and Harvey Lee. Offensive linemen drawing recognition Tommy Ross, Jim Meador, and Bill Palmer.

Campbell carried 20 times for 99 yards, Lee had 15 carries for 48 yards and Meredith 6 for 29.

Zabielski completed 3 of 5 passes for 40 yards, averaging 13.3 yards.

The Matadors will meet Rochester, here at 8:00 p.m. Friday night.

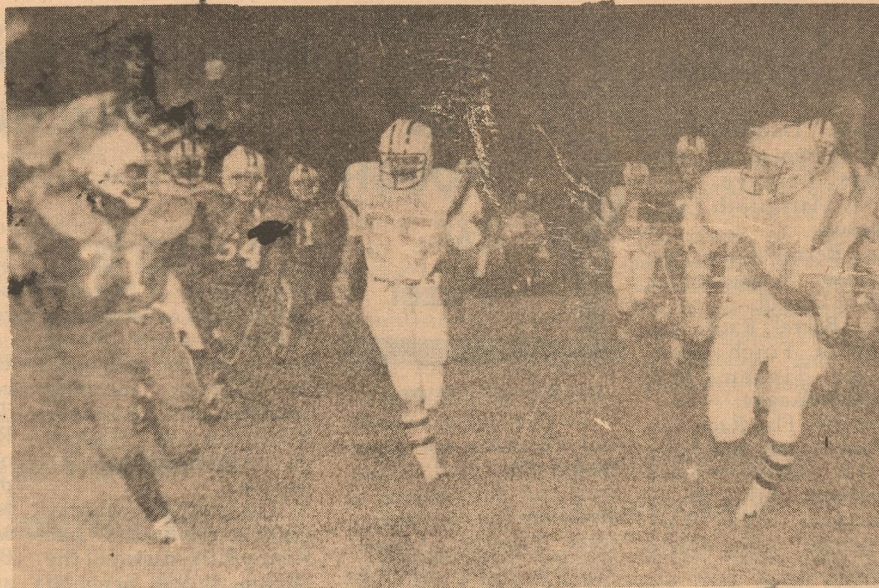

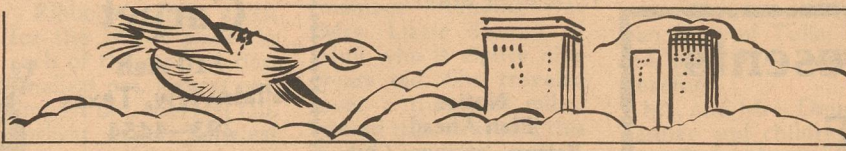

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1979

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the appointment of notaries public for the state and for a term of not less than two years nor more than four years as provided by law."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
