This major effort to "save the young eyes of Texas", as announced by Society president Clymer Wright, Jr., of Houston, is in commemoratin of TSPB's 25th birthday as well as being a Society contribution toward the International Year of the

"The Home Eye Test" is a simple-do-it yourself way for parents to check the vision of their preschoolers at home. It has proven a reliable indicator of vision problems," said Wright.

professional examina-tion. The screeners, moreover, follow up for at least six months to make sure the child gets that examination.

The program has been named the "Lazy-Eye Alert" because one of its primary purposes is the detection of an eye weakness known as ambloypia or "lazy eye". The Society warns that a lazy eye usually has no outward signs and that unless treatment for it is started by the age of six, a child can suffer permanent vision loss or even blindness in that eye.

"However, even with all the screenings and test distribution, some children will still be missed in the alert," said Wright and urged parents of these children to write for one of the

Lions Start Drive For Used Eyeglasses

By Lila Meador A drive for used eyeglasses by Matador Lions Club was announced last week by James Gillespie, president, at regular luncheon-meeting of the club at the American Legion Building

Building.
Lion Kirby Campbell is chairman of the drive, and collection points will be the Matador City Hall and West Texas Utilities office. Donations of all types of eyeglasses will be appreciated, and may be left at these places.

One of the principal projects sponsored by Lions International is aiding the blind and providing eyeglasses for those in need of them, according to 2-T2 District Governor N.K. Snodgrass of Lubbock, in his initial and official visit to the local club.

"Lions International provided 16,000 pairs of eyeglasses in South America last year," Lion Snodgrass told Matador Lions. These are distributed to people who do not have funds to buy them, and are fitted just by trying them on, he explained.

Preceding the district governor's address, a

film strip, "The Gift of Sight and Life," was shown by Walt McAlexander of Lubbock, District Eye Bank Chairman, who was introduced by Lion Frank Pohl. The film explained the process of donating one's eyes to the eye bank and the methods of storing the tissue for transplants. Two hundred eyes have been provided for transplants from this district since 1974, Lion McAlexander said.

"Time is the important factor in receiving the eyes following a death, but the greatest problem at this time is the lack of

donor material. Emotional trauma on the part of relatives is a factor to be considered," he said in explaining the proce-

Deputy Distruct Governor Forrest Campbell, of the Matador Lions Club introduced Dist. Governor Snodgrass, who expressed pleasure that the Matador club had transferred to District 2-T2 from 2-T1.
In addition to the

eyeglass project, he noted that one of the greatest projects of Lionism in Texas is the Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville, which has expanded to include a training program for blind adults.

"Permanently blind persons are taught to do the things which are normally done with sight, such as coping with electrical appliances, and working with hobbies.
And to live a life as normal as possible, with dignity," Lion Snodgrass detailed. "The program helps them fight depression and loneliness, socially, economically and politically."

Two members of the Matador Club received citations. Lion Larry Hoyle was presented a plaque of appreciation for his work as Zone Chairman by Lion Lynn Cherry of Amarillo, Lt. Governor of Dist. 2-T2, and Lion James Gillespie, Matador Boss Lion was presented a certificate for this club's participation in the Eye Bank Program. Lion McAlexander made this presen-

Other visitors at the meeting were Tom Butcher of Lubbock and Leroy Stone of Turkey.

With 7:43 left in the 3rd quarter Campbell took a punt and returned it 64 yards for another touchdown for the Matadors. After the PAT failed MC led 20-0.

Meredith tacked on the final MC points when he broke up the middle, shook off two tacklers and went 15 yards to paydirt. This score was set up by Zabielski when he recovered a fumbel on

the Dragon 18 yard line.
Motley County coaches praised the defense for a good game, pointing out that the defense had limited Paducah to an average of 3 yards per play, recovered two fumbels, intercepted one pass (by Meredith) and shut out the Dragons.

Defensive standouts were Glen Calvert, Dewayne Walker and Harvey Lee. Offensive linemen drawing recognition Tommy Ross, Jim Meador, and Bill Palmer. Campbell carried 20

times for 99 yards, Lee had 15 carries for 48 yards and Meredith 6 for






