Two of Williams' uncles were Rangers in Texas about 90 years ago and through his family he learned of the pits which the greatly out-numbered Rangers made of native rock in case of a surprise attack. The above picture was made about three miles west of the Matador Ranch headquarters. At this point a hill rises from the creek valley and could be defended from all sides. Altho there is no living water at this point now, it is believed the streams may have afforded running water a century ago.
