Election Results

Alton Marshall won the Motley County Sheriff's seat for four more years with a landslide victory over two opponents in the May 3 Primary held here. Marshall received 600 of the 715 votes cast in the sheriff's race, winning over Ewell Gene Martin and Bud Bethard.

The voting in all other races last Saturday showed much closer totals and indicated the county was divided

among the candidates. A close race for the County Commissioner of Precinct 2 has forced a runoff between Orville Lee and Bill Washington. Washington had 71 votes to Lee's 48 and the third candidate, Ray Cruse, had 36. Since Washington did not receive 51 percent of the votes he must face Lee in the November election unless Lee concedes.

In the two other Commissioner's races Sonny Russell, Precinct 1 and Bill Jameson,

Precinct 3 were re-elected. They both ran unopposed.

The County was equally divided in the Presidential primary race. Jimmy Carter received 298 democrat votes but 240 more democrats were listed as uncommitted. Ted Kennedy received 63 votes to Brown's 19.

On the Republican side Ronald Reagan was a clear winner with 23 of the 24 Republican votes cast. George Bush got the other vote.

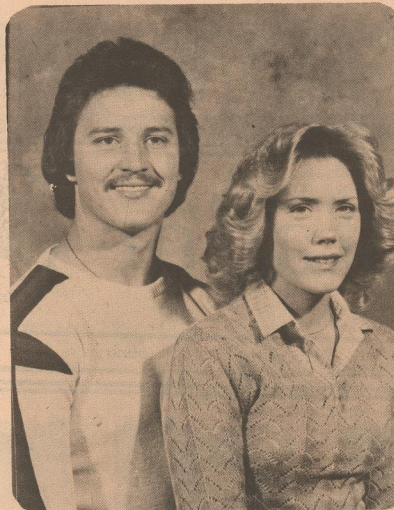

Judge Whitaker Speaks To Club On Survival

Motley County Judge Bill Whitaker was guest speaker for a program on Survival, Thursday, April 24 at regular meeting of El Progreso Club. Mrs. E. A. Day was hostess for the meeting and also served as program leader.

Mrs. John Hamilton presided in the absence of the president, Mrs. Franklin Price. A report by Mrs. Phil Green, Department chairman for FREE, reviewed President Carter's sanctions against Iran. Mrs. Green also reported on the program presented by John R. Bush, Director of Development for M. D. Anderson Hospital in Houston at a meeting of Eternas Junior Study Club, April 17, to which El Progreso Club members were invited.

Mrs. Carl King introduced the program, "Survive - Can YOU?" and told of her personal experience in a survival exercise during World War II when she served in the Women's Army Corps.

"Survival is a basic instinct," Mrs. King said. "In event of an invasion, you have nothing but the basics of nature. We are going to have to get down to basics in this country if we are to survive ... the only groups who know about survival are the Amish and the Mormons."

Judge Whitaker outlined a survival plan for Texas in event of a nuclear attack and subsequent fall-out. He displayed a map showing the high risk areas in the nation, with designated regions. Region 5, he explained, includes Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, with the Department of Public Safety in Lubbock as area headquarters.

He described what comprised adequate

shelter and shelter management and suggested food rations be on hand to be carried to cellars or basements in homes, and that living equipment be available to last for several days, until special crews from Strategic Air Command could arrive for clean up operations.

"Our concern," he said, "would be subsequent radiation burns, and these could be caused by prevailing wind currents bringing fall-out particles. Winds from certain directions could bring dust from a nuclear attack. This area will host Tarrant County in event of attack."

Mrs. Ted Elliott gave the Inspirational Thought, offering positive thinking, patience and prayer as aids to preservation.

Motley County, Roaring Springs Senior Citizen For 1980



Mrs. Minnie Dye was born January 27, 1907, in North Dakota during a blizzard of 48 degrees below zero temperatures, without the aid of a doctor. The family moved 9 months later to Wall, Texas, out from San Angelo, where they homesteaded.

Minnie finished high school at Floydada, Texas, May 1926. She attended Abilene Christian College two years. She taught four grades of the Darden Canyon School of Motley County for two years then began doing substitute teaching in Roaring Springs school during World War II and continued until 1963.

She married a farmer, Alfred Dye, December 1928. They bought a small farm in 1933 in Teepee Flat and brought up four sons and one daughter, all of whom finished high school at Roaring Springs. The children all went on to work their way through college with bank accounts accumulated through county 4-H projects and the first bale of cotton, money from the Dye farm. One son, A.J. (Amos Jim) Dye, went on for his Ph.D in agronomy. Dr. Dye taught in the graduate

school of Texas A&M University a number of years before serving in the U.S. Department of Agriculture in Washington, D.C. as International Training Administrator.

Mrs. Minnie Dye is proud of the diamond 4-leaf clover pin she received for the 20 years she worked as adult leader of 4-H clubs. She also served as president of the Home Demonstration Club in her community and of the Motley County Council during the 40's. She assisted her husband as Democratic Chairman of Precinct 4, and after his death, she became Democratic Chairman of Precinct 4 until 1977 when she resigned to serve Motley County as a Vista worker. In the 50's she served on Motley County's first mixed (men and women) jury, the served on Grand Jury, and Petit and District Courts.

After the death of her husband in July, 1972, she had the farm house moved into Roaring Springs where she could have a telephone. She was elected President of Roaring Springs Senior Citizens, Inc. when it was organized in 1975. With the encour-

agement of Betty Shannon, she obtained the vacated school lunchroom for a meeting place. With the help of everybody in town, the Green Thumb, and S.P.A.C., the lunchroom was renovated and now is enjoyed by the Senior Citizens. She was also instrumental in obtaining a mini bus for the Motley County Senior Citizens to use.

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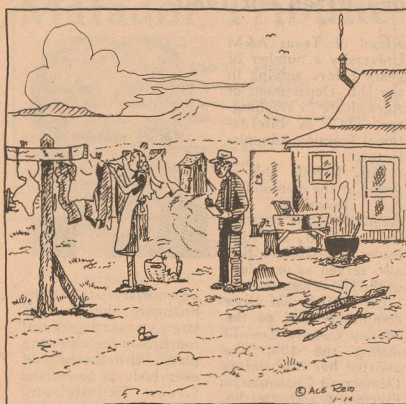

They left the ranch after lunch for a tour of the Pitchfork Ranch and planned a tour of the Waggoner Ranch Wednesday on their way home. This group said they had been making these three for four day tours for about ten years. They were a nice bunch and we enjoyed having them as our guests.
