## Motley Co. Jr. Rodeo Plans Are Set

Everything is in readiness for the Motley County Junior Rodeo, Friday and Saturday, June 13th and 14th, at the Old Settlers Arena in Roaring Springs. Performances will be held at 8:00 p.m. each evening and an open dance will be held both Friday and Saturday starting at 8:30 p.m. each night. Music will be provided by Kent Parks of Dumont. The rodeo is sponsored by the Motley County 4-H Club.

Prizes will include buckles and one-half entry fee for the Junior and the Senior divisions and buckles for the Pee Wee division. The number of places paid in each event will depend upon the number of entrants in the event.

A stick horse race for preschool children will be held nightly. Contestants will be divided into two age categories; ages four and under and ages 5 and 6. Prize money will be awarded to the first three winners each night.

Events will include barrel race, flag race, pole bending, and bareback riding in all three divisions. The Jr. and Sr. events will also include bull riding, girls goat tying, and heading and heeling. In addition, the Pee Wee contestants (age 21 and under) may enter goat tying and calf riding. The Jr. division is ages 13-15 and the Sr. division is ages 16-19.

A queen's contest will be held in conjunction with the rodeo. All contestants will receive ten percent of their sales on chances sold for a pair of handmade boots. The contestant selling the most tickets will be crowned during the Saturday night performance. In addition to the money, she will receive a belt buckle.

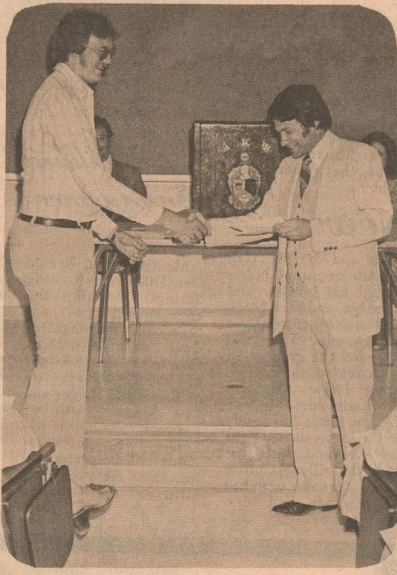

Featuring a 15-member cast and nearly 50 classic and contemporary country/music hits, "Golden Years" is a spectacle of music, lighting, costumes, skits, and staging. In its debut

last summer, "Golden Years" was seen by more than 10,000 people as it toured 20 cities throughout West Texas and parts of New Mexico. The two summers before that, SPC put on its first road show, "Texas Cradle of Giants."

In this year's show the first half will focus on the early years of country music, from the

30's through the prime of Johnny Cash. Music will include a fiddle medley, a Carter Family medley, and songs made famous by such entertainers as Bob Wills, Hank Williams, Elvis Presley, and Buddy Holly.

The second half will bring country music up to date with music made famous by Eddie Rabbitt, Crystal Gayle, Tom T.

Hall, the Gatlin Brothers, and many more. Elegant costuming,

multi-levels of staging, and multi-colored lighting also will add to the effect of a polished, professional country music show, says the show's writer, Helen Roberts, SPC assistant professor of speech and drama.

Ed Marsh teaches fiddle and mandolin for one of the world's few college degree programs in country and bluegrass music and he doubles each summer as a performer in "The Golden Years of Country Music". Both the show and the degree program are the brainchild of South Plains College in Levelland.

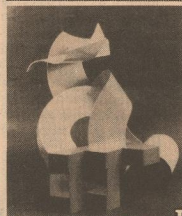
But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you. Matthew 6:33.

## New Tax Laws Reviewed At Lions Club Meeting

Matador Lions Club members were given a look at the new tax laws at regular meeting Tuesday, May 20, when Lion Forrest Campbell outlined their rights, remedies and responsibilities as taxpayers.

Although the changes in the property tax system will not become effective until 1982, Motley County has been in the process of making preparations the past 18 months. Campbell, as Property Evaluation Engineer, Supt. of Schools Charles Johnson and Board member J. M. Russell, were among lay leaders in the state in starting the preliminary work, and a survey of all properties in the county was made the past year under supervision of the State Property Tax Board, county-wide appraisal board and review board.

"If you don't like the value placed on your property, you will have to appear before only one body, the appraisal review board, to contest," Lion Campbell said. He pointed that under the present system, assessed values mean nothing since a different value is placed on the School, County, City and Hospital district levels. He also stressed that property owners must apply for homestead

exemptions every year from January 1 to April 30, in order to receive the \$5,000 allowed. "Those over 65 years of age are entitled to an additional \$1500, but you must apply every year." He explained the difference between land value and market values and how these will be affected under the new law. He distributed a tax guide prepared by the State Property Tax Board, and also a Soil Survey of Motley County.

Boss Lion James Gillespie announced that incoming officers of the club will be installed at the June 17 meeting when District Governor Marshall Cooper, Dist. 27-2 will serve as installing officer.
