

TxDot hosts preconstruction meeting to discuss improvements to FM97

The Texas Department of Transportation hosted a preconstruction meeting on Thursday, May 13, 1999, at 10:30 a.m. at the Motley County Maintenance Facility. The purpose of this meeting was to discuss the upcoming project for the complete re-habilitation of FM 97 in Motley County. This project will begin at the Floyd County line east and continue to the intersection of FM 97 and SH 70 in Matador, for a total of 9 miles.

Construction efforts on the \$1,051,211.00 project started May 13, 1999 with Nobles Road Construction being awarded the contract. The completion date will be approxi-mately November, 1999, with the anticipated time line being approxi-

mately 109 working days. "Widening this road will make a safer road for the citizens of Motley County" said Gary Mizer, P.E. Munday Area Engineer. "The con-tractors will work at full width during the day with traffic diverted to the ditch during the daylight hours. The

road will be open to traffic at night."
