A Second Glance

Have you heard from the IRS lately. Chances are if you are late with your taxes or it is messed up in some way the IRS will contact you.

What will he say and do? Will he be nice and understanding?

The following is an IRS memorandum written by a Group Manager and sent out to the Field Agents who deal with taxpayers.

"My basic and minimum expectation of all members of this group is the performance of a day's work for a day's pay. I expect all revenue officers to carry their fair share of the workload and to dispose of their case assignments as quickly and efficiently as possible.

Those revenue officers who perform above accepted standards will be recognized and rewarded. Those revenue officers performing below accepted standards will be counseled and afforded an opportunity to improve. I intend to propose adverse actions and disciplinary actions where unacceptable performance continues.

I expect and demand a high standard of integrity in your dealings with taxpayers. You should always conduct yourself in accordance with the Handbook of Employee Responsibilities and Conduct. It is my responsibility, as well as yours, to bring any known violations to the attention of the Inspection Service.

I expect timely and effective case actions. The objective of every contact should be to bring the taxpayer into full compliance with Internal Revenue laws as quickly as possible.

I expect cases to be handled in the following manner:

1. Tell the taxpayer what you want.
2. Tell the taxpayer when you want it.
3. Tell the taxpayer what will happen if you don't get it.
4. Make it happen.

Even while IRS Commissioner Jerome Kurtz was assuring Congress that his agency strictly forbids abuse of taxpayers' Constitutional rights, his agents were reading the above instructions issued just barely two months ago.

Slain Deputy Sheriff Was Matador Native

A Hemphill County Sheriff's Deputy who was slain early Saturday morning while answering a burglary alarm, was a native of Matador and a nephew of Mrs. L. H. (Loyd) Dirickson.

Marion Lee "Corky" Guthrie, 52, was killed about 3:45 a.m. Saturday while answering a silent alarm at Lad's Pharmacy in Canadian, about two

blocks from the sheriff's office. He was hit by three blasts from a 12-gauge shotgun. He died later at the Hemphill County Hospital.

A preliminary autopsy report showed Guthrie was hit twice at close range, once in the head.

Paul Berry Bush, 27 of 3407 S. Harrison, Amarillo, has been named in a warrant

charging capital murder in the slaying.

According to the Amarillo Sunday News-Globe, Bush was arrested about 7 p.m. Saturday at a Dumas apartment complex. The arrest ended a sweeping 15-hour search by lawmen that reached from Amarillo eastward past Canadian into Oklahoma and north to Dumas.

The land and air search began after Deputy Guthrie radioed a dispatch, "I'm shot."

Area officials began searching for Bush after Potter County Sheriff's deputies received a tip he may have been involved in the slaying. Bulletins were broadcast for three cars the man was known to drive.

Guthrie, who lived at 905-B Main Lane in Canadian, joined the Hemphill County Sheriff's Office in April 1979. He had previously been a policeman in Perryton.

Born April 24, 1928 in Matador, Marion Lee Guthrie was the son of the late Lee Guthrie and Laura Wimberly Guthrie. In the early 30's the family moved to Wheeler, where he was reared.

Funeral services were conducted at 10 a.m. Monday at the First Baptist Church in Wheeler.

Survivors include his wife, Lydia; three sons, Bobby of Amarillo; Joe and Steve, both of the home; two daughters, Rose Milburn of Canadian and Melinda of the home; his mother, Mrs. Laura Guthrie of Wheeler; and one grandchild.

L. H. Dirickson of Matador and other relatives, including Mrs. Lillie Guthrie Edmondson of Tipton, Okla., and Lamar Guthrie of Hollis, Okla., attended the funeral for their nephew.

Death Of Plainview Woman Investigated

Plainview police are seeking a motive and suspects in the death of a prominent city woman whose bloody and battered body was found in the basement of her home there early Monday.

The woman was the wife of a former Matador man.

According to the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal, Mabel Piper Knight Eiring, 79, was found lying at the bottom of the basement stairs in her southwest Plainview home about 8:15 a.m. Monday by a maid entering the home for

work. The maid told officers the body had several cuts and bruises and that she "found the house disorganized and blood on the bed and floor."

Plainview Justice of the Peace Glenn Stone had not ruled on the death late Monday but said "it's pretty obvious it'll be a homicide." Mrs. Eiring was last seen alive by the maid Saturday afternoon, but police speculate the incident probably occurred sometime Sunday night and that it appeared to have been motivated by robbery.

Mrs. Eiring's husband,

Frank Eiring, a former cotton buyer who moved to Plainview in 1934 from Matador has been in ill health and hospitalized during the past year. He was hospitalized during the week end.

The incident is the latest in a string of occurrences at the Eiring residence, according to police. The house has been the target of several break-in attempts over the past few years, including one in which the maid was tied up by an intruder, police said.

Services were pending Tuesday at Lemons Funeral Home in Plainview.

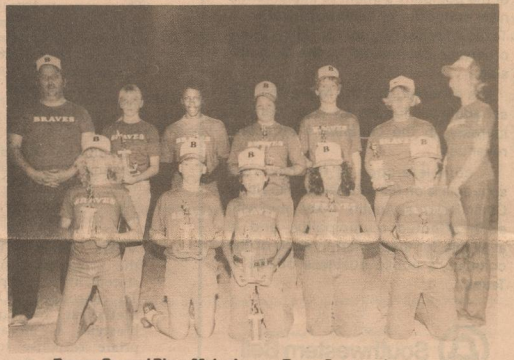
The plan outlines social services programs and priorities for the coming fiscal year.

Both Gina and Mike graduated from Motley County High School.



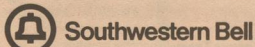

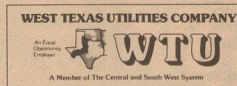

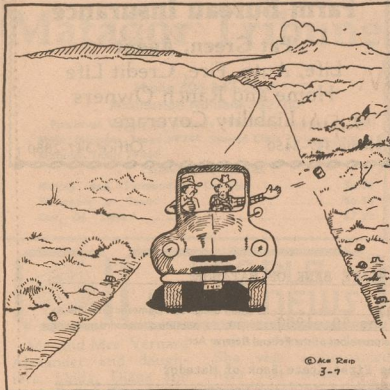
