Gerald Piper and his son, Steve of Paducah suffered severe injuries when involved in a truck accident at 5:00 p.m. Sunday in Menard County. They were returning home from the Valley with a campers' van on the back of the truck when Mr. Piper lost control of the truck in a rainstorm. Mr. Piper was cut from the wreckage and has a broken neck and ribs and a back injury. Steve was thrown through the windshield of the truck and suffered a brain concussion and head lacerations, it was reported. They are patients in the Shannon Hospital in San Angelo. Another passenger in the truck, Steve Paschal of Paducah, escaped serious injury. The vehicles were totally demolished.

Mrs. Piper, (Doris Stephens), formerly of Motley County, is in San Angelo with her husband and son. After learning of the accident, Mrs. Dowell Garrison went to Paducah to be with her sister, Mrs. Grace Stephens, mother-in-law and grandmother of the injured men.

TV Satellite Dish Adds New Stations

Roaring Springs Cable TV Company, owned by Grady Swaringen of Graham, has added two new channels via RCA Satellite to Cable Subscribers in Roaring Springs.

Cable Subscribers now receive KTVU, Oakland/San Francisco, Channel 2 and WGN, Channel 9 in Chicago as well as the three channels from Lubbock. Roaring Springs residents began viewing the two new channels on July 4.

These two new sta-

tions are received from an RCA Satellite parked 22,300 miles in space which enables them to receive stations located on the east and west coast of the United States.

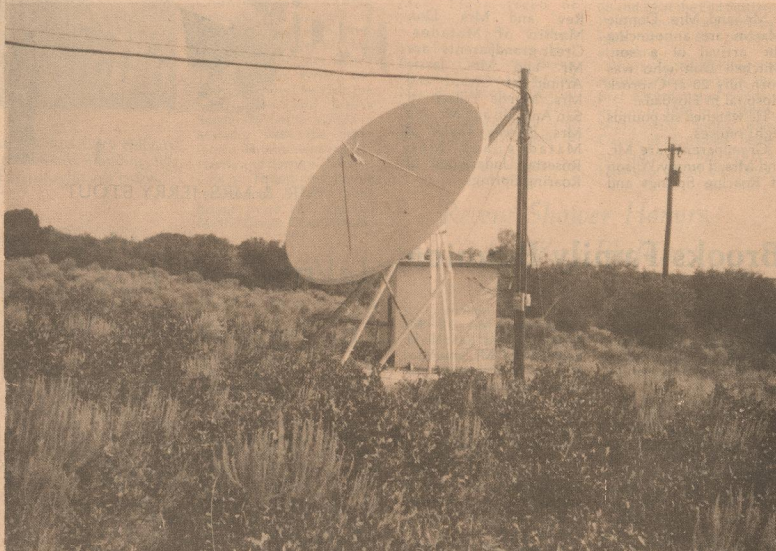
WGN in Chicago carries a well-rounded format featuring movies, sports, specials and syndicated programs. It is Chicago's leading independent television station.

KTVU, Oakland/San Francisco, Channel 2 features around the clock family programming. The Roaring Springs

Cable has been advised that the Oakland station will be taken off the satellite December 31, 1980. When this happens it will be replaced by another channel that is available from the satellite at that time.

In a letter to cable subscribers Mr. Swaringen said, "We hope that you will enjoy programming not only from Lubbock, but now by the use of the RCA Satellite, be able to tune you set to television stations located on the east and west coast of the United States.

Cable Subscriber Jeff Thacker said, "because of the time difference in California, their 8:00 p.m. movie comes on at 10:00 our time. We have lost a lot of sleep watching movies since the new channels were placed in operation."

Volunteer Firemen Attend Recent Training School

Darrel Marshall, volunteer fireman on the Matador Volunteer Fire Department attended the 51st Annual Texas Firemen's Training School, July 20-25. The school, attended by nearly 1,880 students representing about 700 cities from more than 20 states, was held on the Texas A&M University campus recently.

Also attending the fire fighting school from Motley County were Vaden Hays, Dude Speed and Alan Bingham.

Firemen chose their course at the school from a list including Fire Fighting, Fire Prevention, Fire Department Officer Training, Fire Department Pump Maintenance, Specialized Fire Protection, and Disaster Rescue Training.

Fireman Marshall was sponsored by Motley County Farm Bureau and Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies by contributing toward the cost of the school. Since volunteer firemen are

interested in attending this school to help do a better job of fire fighting and fire prevention, 100 County Farm Bureaus and the Texas Farm Bureau Insurance Companies in the statewide program have sponsored 100 firemen at the school.

"The Farm Bureau Insurance Companies believe volunteer fire departments have been very effective in reducing the amount of loss involved by fire in rural areas," said President

Carrol G. Chaloupka of Dalhart. "It is our hope in sponsoring this program that the firemen will help

the Matador Volunteer Department to better serve the residents of Motley County."

New Brucellosis Regulations To Affect Cattle Owners

All cattlemen should be aware that July 1 was the effective date for new Texas Bovine Brucellosis Regulations. The Texas Animal Health Commission with John B. Armstrong as Chairman and John W. Holcombe as Executive Director has spent many months in preparation of these regulations.

The regulations will effect Texas cattlemen in several ways. All breeding cattle over eighteen (18) months of age sold through Livestock Market Auctions will be tested for brucellosis at government expense at the market. All cattle shipped direct to slaughter are required to

be tested thirty (30) days or less before movement. All cattle will be tested at slaughter regardless of origin.

The Texas Animal Health Commission had divided Texas into two brucellosis control areas, West Texas, Class A Area and East Texas Class B Area. These areas were designated because of a much higher infection rate in West Texas compared to East Texas. Cattle moving from East Texas are required to have a test thirty (30) days or less before movement to a Class A county and forty five (45) to one hundred twenty (120) days after arrival.

Any time cattle change ownership the buyer should ask the seller the

brucellosis status of the herd and require a test thirty (30) days before movement. To reduce the risk of spreading the disease the buyer should have past purchase test forty five (45) to one hundred twenty (120) days following purchase.

Vaccination with Strain 19 Brucella Abortus Vaccine is recommended to increase protection for calves that may be sold or exposed to brucellosis in the future.

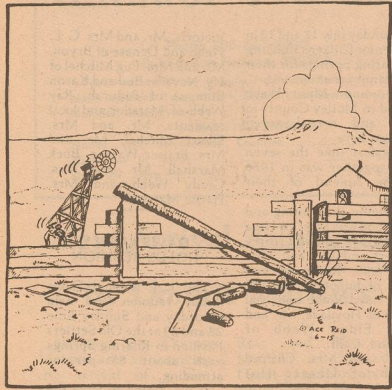
