Two Relay Teams and one individual will compete in the Girls State Class B Track Meet in Austin this week end. Sharlene Smith will compete in the 100 dash. She won 1st in the Regional competition at Levelland.

The 440 Relay composed of Derinda Cruse, Sharlene Smith, Gwen Calvert and Cindy Johnson will be running after winning a first place in Regional.

The 880 Relay, who also won first at regional will be running in that event. Girls on this team are Cindy Johnson, Sharlene Smith, Gwen Calvert and Pamela Pitts.

Accompanying the girls to Austin will be their coach Larry Neighbors, Teresa Manning and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Johnson.

Coach Neighbors said "We are hoping to win state and will certainly do our best."

## Citizens Reminded To Vote Saturday

The May 3 primary will be held this Saturday with a number of local races on the ballot.

On the Democratic ticket for Motley County Sheriff Alton Marshall is seeking re-election with Myron G. Bethard and Ewell Gene Martin also making their bids for the office.

For County Commissioner of Precinct 2, three men are running for the unexpired term of the late Malcolm Turner. On the Ballot are Ray Cruse, Bill Washington and Orville Lee. Bill Jameson is running unopposed for commissioner of Precinct 3 and John M. Russell is also unopposed for the seat in Precinct 1.

Howard Traweek is the lone candidate for County Attorney, while Randy Hollums of Floydada is running

unopposed for District Attorney, 110 District.

The Republican Primary will be held in the basement of the Motley County courthouse on Saturday. Voting places are for Precinct 3 (Box 3) at Northfield School and (Box 6 -- North Matador) at Motley County Courthouse. Voting places for Precinct 2 are (Box 2) Community Building at Flomot and (Box 5) at the old Whiteflat Grocery Store in Whiteflat. Precinct number 1 will vote at Motley County School. Precinct 4 (Roaring Springs) does not have a commissioner election this year.

County Clerk Lucretia Campbell reported 25 residents had submitted absentee votes by noon Tuesday, a good turnout according to Mrs. Campbell.

### Boy Scouts Attend Camporee

The Matador Boy Scouts of Troop 360 attended the Comanche Trail District Spring Camporee the week end of April 25-27. The annual event was held on the Woodward Ranch near Red Mud south of Spur. Scout Troops from the six county district were in attendance.

Each troop camped out in troop campsites and cooked all their meals for the three day event. The Camporee was a competition among the different troops in Scoutcraft skill events. Among them were contests in First Aid, Pioneering, Compass, Tent Pitching, Emergency Transportation and others.

Matador Troop 360 earned first place in the competition by outscoring

all other troops by a 117 point margin. Troop 360 also earned the highest percentage of accuracy with a 96.4% rating and a perfect 100% rating in the Campsite judging event, and were the only troop to do so.

Scoutmaster Ronnie Vandiver said that the boys worked very hard during the contests and did an excellent job in all events.

Scouts attending the Camporee were Alex Guerrero, Wade Vandiver, James Hal Bearden, Jeffrey Burkes and Cody Christian along with Scoutmaster Ronnie Vandiver. The Scouts would also like to thank Alan Bingham for helping with transportation to and from the Camporee.

The Motley County Youth Organization's summer baseball program continues to grow, as ninety-seven youngsters in the first through the eighth grade have signed up to participate in the program. There were eighty-one players in last summer's baseball program.

This Saturday, May 3, has been set as the final deadline for signing up to play baseball. No youngster will be able to join a team after this date. Forms may be obtained at school or from Bill Durham.

A plan to divide the players into two groups: Minor League (1st - 4th grade) and Major League (5th - 8th grade) with at least four teams per each

grade division was presented by Bill Durham. Members agreed this would be acceptable but left the final decision on the amount of teams to be decided by the Commissioner and Coaches at the Player Draft.

The meeting to draft players is scheduled for Tuesday, May 6 at 8 p.m. at Jo-Barb-Dees. A method of improving the drafting of players in order for teams to be more competitively equal was discussed. A plan which the Association accepted was: take the top four boys with comparable ability and have each coach draw from these four; then take the top four girls, and on down. A representative from the school will be asked to attend the draft to help analyze the youngsters into these groups. Players who have brothers or sisters playing in the same grade division, will automatically be drafted on the same teams. This was voted to become a Special Ground Rule of the Association.

The games, tentatively scheduled to begin at the end of the school year, will be played on Monday, Thursday and Friday nights beginning at 6:30 p.m. The second game will be played fifteen minutes following the first game which will be approximately 8 p.m.

Bill Durham was appointed to draw up the

summer schedule. It will be printed in the Tribune as soon as it is completed. A Championship Playoff will be held at the end of the regular season to determine the team standings for the year. "The game for first place (Championship game) will be the only game that will be a double elimination game." This rule was adopted as a Special Ground Rule of the Association.

Another Special Ground Rule adopted was "In the event a game is called because of Rule 9 (3 full innings constitutes a game in the event of rain) or Rule 10 (Run rules in the event of lopsided score) ... then Rule 6 (Players must play in field and bat one time in full game) will be eliminated as a Special Ground Rule of that particular game."

The following people have volunteered to coach: Major League (1) Bill Durham, Hd; Deanna Durham, Asst. (2) Ricky Lawrence and Billy Osborn (3) Tony Rose, Hd; Charlie Campbell and Shawn Bearden, assts.; (4) Ricky Turner Hd; Banni Zabielski Hd; Linda Palmer, Asst. Minor League: (1) James Stephens and David Green. Three volunteers are needed to serve as head coaches for the Minor League. The following assistant coaches will be assigned to these teams. Vaden

Hays, Donnie Buckelew and Kenneth Marshall. Any father will be assigned to coach or assist the team on which his child has been drafted. Anyone wanting to volunteer to coach one of these Minor League teams may contact Alan Bingham.

The players will be furnished caps and T-Shirts by Sponsors of each team. The cost of sponsoring a team will remain at \$50 per sponsor and two sponsors will be needed per team. Any cost above the sponsors donation for uniforms will be paid for by concession profits of the M.C.Y.O. Two businesses that have asked to sponsor a team are: Kelly Jackson Trucking and Spray Auto. Businesses wanting to sponsor a team may do so by contacting one of the officers of the association.

Bids were submitted by the Sports Center of Lubbock and Melinda's T-Shirts of Matador to provide the uniforms. Members voted unanimously to keep the money "at home" and awarded the job to Melinda's T-Shirts. Jean Phillips, treasurer, reported the M.C.Y.O. had a bank balance of \$591.27 from the previous baseball season. This profit was mainly a result of the baseball concession stand. It was decided to

replace some much needed equipment, light bulbs, and absorb excess cost of uniforms from this remaining balance.

Trophies will be awarded to each individual player at the end of the season. In order to help defray the cost of this expense, members discussed holding another baseball BBQ.

The M.C.Y.O. will be responsible for the maintenance and use of Forest Park during the summer baseball season. Because of the residential section of town, a 11 p.m. time limit was set for use of the field by outsiders. Outsiders may contact Alan Bingham, baseball commissioner, for use of the field. Outsiders must reimburse the M.C.Y.O. a small fee for use of electricity. Outsiders are asked to furnish their own equipment, balls and bases.

The following officers were re-elected for the 1980 baseball season: Alan Bingham, BB Commissioner, Kenneth Marshall, President; Dell Bearden, Asst. Commissioner and V.P.; Wilberta Jackson, Secretary and Jean Phillips, Treasurer.

The volunteer support of parents and other workers has been tremendous, according to Kenneth Marshall, president of the association. Work schedules will be made out and these workers will be notified before each game.

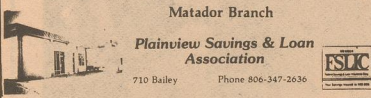

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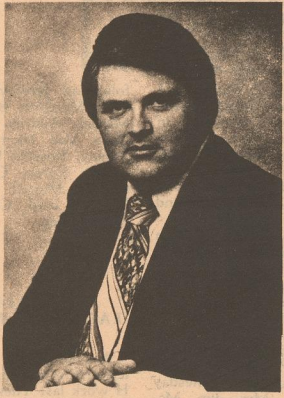

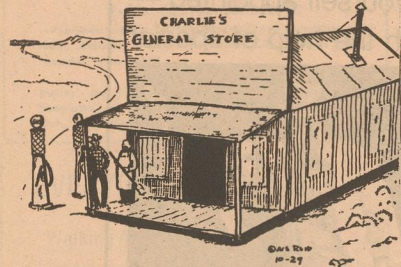
